ADVANCED STREAMER TACTICS

Dan LeCount

Merry Christmas! Happy Holidays! Another year is coming to a close, and I hope all of you had a great 2015 and spent some time fishing your favorite waters.

Our guest speaker this month comes to us from the North. No, it is not old St. Nick.... Our guest speaker resides in Truckee, CA, and has fished the Sierra and Northern CA for many years.

Dan LeCount is a fly fishing guide with a passion for the natural world. He actually grew up on the northern CA coast near Half Moon Bay. He started fly fishing 25 years ago at around age 11 on an annual pilgrimage to the eastern Sierra with his family and he hasn't stopped since. Dan is a Contract Fly Designer with UMPQUA Feather Merchants, a rod builder, published author, photographer, and artist.



Dan has worked in the fly fishing industry for over 17 years and is very active in many of the local watershed conservation programs for the north Tahoe region. Dan is the Secretary of the Board for the Truckee Trout Unlimited Chapter #103, the "Tahoe Trout Bums". He is a 4th generation fly fisher and comes from a long line of teachers.

Dan's program is called "Advanced Streamer Tactics", and he will show us how to target fish using one and two handed rods from a boat, as well as from shore. He will show us how to seek out fish, how to present the right pattern, how the fish acts as a predator, and proper fish management. Dan is also an excellent fly tier and will share with us some of his best streamer patterns.

Pyramid Lake Outing March 14th,15th, and 16th 2016

In what has become an annual event, this year's Pyramid Lake outing will be Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, March 14th, 15th, and 16th. In an attempt to miss the bulk of the weekend crowd which usually clears out by Sunday afternoon we again will fish during the week, those of you who went last year know this worked out well for the most part. If fishing is off the charts all bets are off as the number of people will triple during a hot bite!

If you have never done this trip before you are missing out on a chance to catch what may be the biggest trout of you life. The lake's native Lahontan Cutthroats *average* 3-5 pounds, with many fish pushing 10 pounds or more. **In the past a fish 10 pounds or bigger was considered a trophy. Now thanks to the introduction of the longer living Pilot Peak strain that is much longer living fish over 20 pounds are being caught!** If you are new to fly fishing the techniques are simple and easy to learn. We normally fish from ladders placed in the water at the proper distance from shore. There usually is nothing around you, but water. There is nothing to interfere with a back cast and nothing on the bottom to snag. You do not need to be a long distance caster as fish are sometimes hooked right at you feet.

Equipment that is appropriate for both kinds of fishing is usually two rods. **A 6-7 weight rod with floating line for indicator fishing and a 8-9 weight rod for streamer fishing** (a Rio DC 24ft. 250 gr. line is perfect). I will provide a more extensive list of what to bring that includes equipment, lines, flies, leaders, tippet and clothing in an upcoming e-mail.

Daytime temperature will likely be around 50 degrees F. This is a very variable temperature as we have experienced 30-75 degree temperatures in past years

You make your own travel arrangements to Reno, fly or drive. It is best to arrive by Sunday as we start fishing EARLY on Monday. Please let me know that you have arrived safely, Jim Wright (714-679-6638). I will be staying at the Silver Legacy Resort in downtown Reno. Others have stayed the Atlantis Casino (800-723-6500). Rob will be providing breakfast and lunch on Monday and Tuesday breakfast on Wednesday, as well as step ladders to fish from. Cost of the trip is \$225 per person for 3 days of fishing. I will e-mail a list of all attendees so you can communicate as to carpools, car rentals and lodging.



COLORADO OUTING

Planned for May 1-7, 2016

Lyman Kennedy, Streamkeeper



In the past we have had both Pat Dorsey and Landon Meyer speak at our club regarding fishing the famous blue ribbon tailwater streams in Colorado. Having just returned from a trip, I am excited to announce a club trip to that area next year.

We are fortunate to have a club member, Mark Spowart, living in Monument Colorado and he was host for myself and two others on a week long trip to Colorado recently. Our outing next year will start in the Colorado Springs area, requiring a plane trip to Denver, about 3 hours and then an hour drive south to Colorado Springs and Monument. Participants will stay at the Fairfield Inn in Colorado Springs, 2.8 miles from Monument.

We will stay in Colorado Springs for three days, with opportunity to fish such famous trout streams as Cheesman Canyon, the Dream Stream, Elevenmile Canyon, Deckers as well as the Arkansas River. We will be using guides from Blue Quill Anglers who are all experts at fishing these streams.

After our exciting days on the water, Mark and his lovely wife, Liz, will be hosting our evening meals at their beautiful home in Monument.

Places for sight seeing for those interested include: Garden of the Gods, Air Force Academy, Pro Rodeo Museum, U.S. Olympic center, and Manitou Springs (cannabis capital of Colorado, if that is your cup of tea).

Then we will make a three hour drive southeast to Gunnison where we will stay at the Altmont Resort and fish the Gunnison River and possibly Taylor River. The Altmont Resort has cabins reasonably priced that can house 4-6 people with kitchen and living room. Fishing the Gunnison River is best done on a float trip with guides through some beautiful country, casting to browns, rainbows and cutbows. These fish are brightly colored, fat, and healthy and love to make long runs. Nearby Taylor river is a tailwater stream that is easily waded and is renown for its large 10-20 pound rainbows (and difficult to catch) up near outlet from the dam. The lower river in the public areas is very wadable and has good insect hatches and has riffles, long runs and pocket water.

At the conclusion of our trip, we have a four hour drive to Denver to return rental cars and check in at airport for our plane trip home.

Volunteers Needed for TIC Program

For those new club members who are not familiar with TIC or Trout in the Classroom. This is one of the outreach programs that FFCOC participates in to give back to our communities. TIC is a science class in environmental study. It is not a hatchery program. Students from grades K – 12 learn the importance of our natural resources through the lifecycle of the trout. Classrooms are provided with specialized refrigeration trout incubators. The California Department of Wildlife provides rainbow trout eggs. They are an important teaching aid for the instructor. They help the students understand the various stages of trout development and the importance of our water quality, forests, and the trout's ecosystem. In addition, the student will have an opportunity to release their fry at a local lake or stream approved by the California Department of Fish and Wildlife.

Fly Tying

FLIES THAT KEEP ON GIVING

Inspiration, a fish of my dreams and a knowledge of past large fish landed drive me to create flies even though I have more than I will ever use for this bucket list trip coming up to Largo Storbel (Jurassic Lake) in Southern Argentina. Thank you Cindy Hubbard for introducing me to these wonderful hooks, the fish hate her. I only tie a sampling of six and should they become the fly of choice I add it to my list of favorites. I have had great success with the holographic blue and copper buzzers on several different trout and that led me to this. In that theme I have created a fly that is appealing to me and I hope is to the big trout of Argentina. Let me introduce you to **Jurassic Dream!**

Hook:	Owner Cutting Point SSW All Purpose Bait Hook #6
Bead:	Rainbow Hued Tungsten 7/64"
Thread:	UTC 140 Black
Anchor Glue:	Super Glue
Body Wrap:	UTC Mirage Tinsel Opal
Wings:	Yellow Goose Biots
Body Finish:	UV Clear Fly Finish Thin



1. Place the bead on the hook inserting the point in the small hole first. The barb will slow you down but push with your thumb nail to force the bead over the barb or smash it first. Then push the bead to the eye.
2. Place the hook in the vice leaving as much of the hook exposed as possible.
3. Place a slight smear of super glue just behind the bead.
4. Start your thread in the super glue and wrap back six or seven wraps to secure the thread and the durability of your fly.
5. Tie in the tinsel and wrap with thread deep into the bend of the hook then return the thread by wrapping it back up to the tie in point.
6. You should have the tinsel at the bottom of the hook deep into the bend, wrap it up to the tie in point and tie off with a few wraps.
7. Now fold the tinsel to the rear and wrap back ten wraps of thread and leave the tinsel to the rear.
8. Tie in a goose biot on either side of the body facing to the rear and at an approximate 15 degree angle on either side.
9. Wrap the thread forward to just behind the eye and fold the Tinsel forward and tie off behind the bead with a couple of wraps of thread.
10. Fold the goose biots forward crossing behind the bead and make a couple of wraps of thread to secure.
11. Fold the biots back to the rear and secure with several warps of thread and whip finish.
12. Smear all sides of the hook with the UV finish, include the body and thread whip finish. DO NOT UV the wings.
13. Cure the resin and enjoy your work.

It really is an easy fly to tie after a couple. I like the iridescent body against the yellow wings and rainbow bead. Truly an Attractor.
