

Crowley Lake Fly Fishing Tactics

with Ernie Gulley

One of the places many fly fishers from southern California go every year is Crowley Lake, which is up Highway 395, just southeast of Mammoth Lakes. This lake is large in area, but home to lots of trout! Many clubs in the area schedule outings to this lake and many fly fishers journey to fish there more than once a year. Crowley has consistently been listed as one of the best stillwater fisheries in the West and has even revolutionized the way good fly fishers look at indicator fishing for trout.

Do you want to learn the best places to fish on the lake depending on the month you are there? Do you want to see a great map of the lake and learn the migrating patterns of the trout from opening day to the closer? Would you like to understand how to fish the lake from a float tube ... or a boat ... or a pontoon craft ... or from the shore? Do you want to see what patterns of flies work best and when? Would you like to see leader set-ups that are deadly for indicator fishing, either for shallow water or deep water? And would you like to know that all this information is applicable to stillwaters anywhere in the world? If you answer, "Yes" to any of the above questions, well then, this is the presentation for you!

Flies That Keep On Giving

This fly was released to you many years ago and I still use it today for a still water mayfly imitation. Originally Jeff Hensley a friend invented this fly and shared it with me as I was headed on a trip to the Sierra's, WOW it worked great on the High Sierra lakes.

I have used this fly all over the west coast with equal success. This is an easy fly to tie but so effective.

Wonder Nymph



Hook: Daiichi 1560 #16-20

Thread: Black UTC 70

Tail: 4 Wood Duck fibers

Rib: Ultra Fine Gold Wire

Abdomen: Olive or Black Marabou

Wing Case: Pheasant Tail fibers

Thorax: Peacock Herl

Start the thread at the eye and run it back to the start of the bend. Tie in the four Wood Duck fibers as the tail and let extend the hook shank beyond the bend. Tie in the fine gold wire at the bend and leave it to the rear for now. Tie in four to seven marabou fibers depending on how large of a hook you are using by the tips forward and then wrap forward to the $\frac{3}{4}$ point forward and make several securing wraps and cut off butts. Counter wrap the fine gold wire to the $\frac{3}{4}$ forward point and secure with several wraps and cut off excess. Tie in four to seven strands of Pheasant tail fibers depending on the hook size and let lay to the rear. Tie in two peacock feather herl and wrap them to an eye space behind the eye and tie off then cut off excess. Fold the Pheasant tail fibers over and tie off just behind the eye then cut off excess and whip finish. Head cement and go fishing.

This fly works well fished just above weed beds under a dry as an indicator. Pay attention to the dry and don't forget to set the hook when it moves.

SAN JUAN RIVER TRIP REPORT

Nine club members recently made the trip to Navajo Dam, New Mexico to fish on the San Juan River. Some members elected to fish the river in drift boats with their guides and others waded the river, with guides or on their own. Rainbow and Brown trout were caught although the majority of the fish were rainbows in 16 to 18 inch range. All fish were very fat, healthy and good fighters. Larger fish were caught as well, and many were in their spawning colors. The largest fish of the trip was caught by Carl Thompson with a 22 inch, 6 pound rainbow trout on a size 22 midge while wading. The weather conditions varied from sunny and mild to brutally cold with driving rain and wind gusts to 20-40 mph. We experienced rain, snow, hail, and strong winds, but the weather conditions did not deter us from having a great fishing experience. In fact on the colder overcast days, we had the best insect hatches and the best fishing. We stayed at the Fisheads Lodge on the river. The lodge had spacious rooms, a restaurant, fly shop and provided us with guides for drifting or wading the river. Lyman Kennedy, Streamkeeper


Our guide for all this knowledge is Ernie Gulley. Ernie was born in southern California and started fishing with his Dad as soon as he could walk. At age seven Ernie moved to New Orleans where he learned how to fish Lake Pontchartrain for speckled trout. Later he moved back to SoCal and began fishing Crowley, Bridgeport Reservoir and many lakes in Utah, Idaho and Nevada. Ernie currently resides in Riverside with his wife Shannon and two children, Logan age eight and Aidan age four.

In 1998 curiosity about those long rods with thicker lines won out and he tried fly fishing. Well, a love affair was born and he has never looked back. In 2006 Ernie joined Deep Creek Fly Fishers, where he became a principal instructor for fly tying and classes on stillwater tactics. In 2007 he won the "Double Haul in the Fall" tournament at Crowley, both individual and team division and in 2008 and 2009 Ernie placed second in the "Stillwater Classic" team trophy. In 2008 Ernie joined the High Desert Fly Fishers where he has served as Vice-President and President. You can see why Ernie is "The Man" to show and tell us about how to be successful on this fishery.

So if you have never fished Crowley Lake, or think you are an expert on this stillwater fishery, you need to be at our next meeting. Ernie is a hard core stillwater fisherman and is always eager to share his knowledge and expertise with the novice as well as the seasoned fly fisher.

Hot Creek Ranch July 13-16, 2012

Hot Creek Ranch has been a club outing for at least 40 years I'm sure of. There was a time when we had trouble filling all the cabins but with a Saturday night BBQ that brings this wonderful group together in celebration of great fishing and the troubles of work and home at a distance, everyone relaxes and has fun. The privatization of Arcularius Ranch and Alpers Ranch also added to the demand on Hot Creek, there is a long waiting list to get any dates at the ranch. We are fortunate to have acquired dates in July that are carried forward from year to year by the ranch. This year I tried to accommodate as many possible on the ranch, there is quite a demand so understanding with the cabin assignments, some have as many as four in a cabin. Kevin Peterson is working with us to accommodate as many as possible since we are booking the whole ranch.

- **Hot Creek is a private ranch and we are paying guests, please abide by all the ranch rules or you will be asked to leave.**
- Check in time is 4:00 p.m. on July 13 and not before!
- Check out time is 12 noon on July 16, you must be out of the cabin by noon but you may fish the ranch the rest of the day if you so choose. It is customary to leave a \$5 tip per person staying in the cabin for the cleaning staff.
- Dry fly fishing only, Catch and Release using barbless flies, No Wading.
- California fishing license required.
- The ranch has 9 housekeeping cabins with complete kitchens that contain microwave, stove/oven, pots and pans, silverware, dishes, and BBQ grill outside. Bring your own food Friday night, Saturday breakfast and lunch, Sunday all meals, Monday breakfast and lunch.
- We will have a BBQ steak dinner on Saturday evening at 4:59 p.m. this will give us time for dinner and still time to catch the evening hatch or grab a cigar on the porch. Everyone is invited who is staying on the ranch and Kevin and his wife "the ranch managers" are our guests for dinner. **Please be on time, we will not wait for you!** Please bring your own silverware, plate, knife, fork, beverage of choice from your own cabin and remember to return it where it belongs after dinner.
- Hot Creek Ranch website is **www.hotcreekranch.com** there is helpful information on the site.
- Productive flies on the ranch are: M&M caddis #18-20 tan, #10-14 hoppers, Parachute Adams #16-20, Brooks sprout midge #18-24, Black beetle #16, Red & black ant #18, Griffith gnat #20-22, CDC caddis #18, PMD #18-22, #16 Hot Creek Hot Butt. There is a fly shop on the ranch that is well equipped with flies, shirts terminal tackle, floatant.
- Equipment: 4-6 weight rods, afternoons tend to be windy, 9-15' a leader with 6x tippet works well.
- This is a demanding fishery that requires drag free drifts on a stream with many seams in the current. A helpful suggestion, practice you're casting and mending on moving water prior to this outing. There are many nice fish and I want you to catch your share.
- If you should have any question about this outing or any fly fishing related item please feel free to call me, **John Williams** at **951-236-0862** my cell phone.
- While at the ranch, please ask if you are having trouble catching fish, I or someone experienced will help you.
- **Thank you for your compliance with the ranch rules, we do have fun!**
