

“The Best Fly Fishing in Utah” with Spencer Higa

A couple hours by airline, or 10 hours by driving, is located a fly fishing mecca just waiting for all of us here in SoCal. Eastern Utah is filled with crystal clear water and that water is filled with explosive trout, and we are going to learn the intimate details of six great rivers that are not only conducive for catching fish, but also fun and scenic to be on.

Our guide on this journey is Spencer Higa, who has been fishing the waters of Utah for more than 16 years. He is a Utah native whose father put a fly rod in his hand when Spencer was 12 years old and he's been fishing the lakes and rivers of his native state ever since. In fact, he has been fishing the Provo since early in his fly fishing career when his mother used to drop him on a section of the river in the morning and then pick him up eight hours later. Still, Spencer never seemed to be able to fish enough. Even after he got a

Where do fly tiers get their inspiration? Some copy those of others; some find inspiration in other people. I have met on a few occasions an inspirational person to me, Hutch Hutchinson an Orvis representative who enjoys life, shows respect for others and works hard at his chosen profession. He could be a plumber or street sweeper and I'm sure he would be devoted to his work with as much enthusiasm but I realize he truly enjoys what he does. After coming home from Orvis days at Marriott's this weekend which catered to the all our dreams of fishing, I realized how much fun I had and I can't wait until next year if asked to tie as a demonstrator. I was inspired to name a variation of one of my favorite flies in Hutch's name. The bead head flash back has caught so many fish for me I have changed it's characteristics a bit. First of all Hutch has a bald head and is represented by the bead head. Next it has a durable and segmented body which is created with Vinyl rib material. It has a flash back of Holographic yellow tinsel because it's not bashful. Lastly it uses super glue as the binder for durability. Notice the top view has a darker abdomen and the bottom view shows off a different much brighter view. I'll see how it does real soon



Tongariro Lodge

My wife and I spent three weeks New Zealand; two weeks on the south island and a week in the north island. My brother and his wife accompanied us on the travel, also. Part of our time was spent at the Tongariro Lodge. I had purchased the 2 for 1 offer at last Septembers auction. I have spent a fair amount of time on the south island, However, Sharon my wife, has never been there, as well as my brother and his wife. I have a nephew that lives in Christchurch. He and I have been close for over twenty years, he works for Air New Zealand, which brings him here two to three times a year.

Tongariro Lodge is a superb destination. We had great meals and stayed in great accommodations. The lodge is very, very nice!. The fishing can only be described as superb.

We fished two days. One day we fished on Tongariro, and the other day, I believe, Mohaka. Tongariro was both a walk in, and drive to an access point river experience. The rivers were flowing gin clear water populated with quality fish. Down side for me was the large rocks - I have an artificial right ankle which does not do well with anything but flat land. Still I wouldn't give in just yet, and that day as well. Did I say the fishing was great!

The second day, we booked a helicopter to access another part of the river system. Both my brother and I are helo and fixed wing pilots - so seeing the landscape from the air is always the best way to put the miles behind. The river was smaller and the rocks not as "mean". Again we experienced excellent fishing with 4 to 6 lbs. fish. I never got any huge fish but I am sure they are around. I think the bite could have been better but that's fishing.

I would recommend to anyone as well as all club member to make at least one trip to New Zealand. By the way, the North Island fishing was getting red hot while we were there, I could only dream since we were so close.



One Surf Fly Dockweiler Beach Classic April 21

"Where the heck did all of these cars come from?"; was what the gate attendant repeated to any of the city beach service person she ran into. Where the hell did everyone come from? This was the beginning of the 5th installment of the One Surf Fly Beach Classic at Dockweiler benefiting Casting For Recovery LA. I got to see Jack Davis early on and then the rest of the gray roaring morning blew by in a wash. By the start of registration there was a buzz of anglers chatting it up with new and old friends hushed by the roar of departing jetliners, as well as the obligatory "fish wise" tales. Even predictions were bantered about amongst the anglers. The anglers queued to register and put their one fly into the bag. With registration over flies were drawn and final notes compared, 65 anglers walked to the beach. Tick Tock the Bell has Run, and the first cast was sprung. That first cast turned into the first fish of the tournament. All up and down a quarter mile of beach stood fly angler after fly angler casting like mad, and stripping even madder. With the tide coming in new rip structure began to form and reform as more water came in. This fluid action of the rips, meant that the fish were constantly on the move too. In the end of 2 hours and 15 minutes of casting, catching for some and heart break for others, it was over. The most productive angler ended up with 10 fish, and the biggest fish was a 12" barred surf perch. A few corbinas were lost and a 11" smelt was landed. Once this was done we all proceeded to the Fishermen's Spot for the Raffle, Casting for Recovery presentation and awards. The raffle was a great success in raising \$2600 for Casting for Recovery to be able to sponsor 2 women to their retreat. NEXT GENERATION KIDS ACADEMY

The West Fork San Gabriel Conservancy is holding a Next Generation Kids Academy for kids in the age range of 10 -17 on May 5 -6, 2012. They currently have 5 opening for new kids to attend.

Here is just a little about what the Next Generation Kids Academy is all about:

So what is this youth program all about?

The ideal age range for eligibility is 10 to 17 years old, however we are flexible. The academy is comprised of 3 weekend sessions throughout the year at the West Fork San Gabriel River's Glenn Campground.

Each weekend has a different curriculum designed to educate the participants about the various aspects of fly fishing and conservation. Repetition and various training methods are used to instill the knowledge as each subject is approached through a classroom setting, a practice setting and the real thing.

The first two weekends are the Next Gen Basics and the Next Gen Entomology Academies. Basics, and Entomology must be completed (in either order) before a student can be entered into the final step which is Next Gen Competition Academy.

One of each Academy is held every year, and the dates are spread out to facilitate completion. If scheduling is a problem, the student can always pick up where they left off the following year.

driver's license and Spencer was able to expand the territory he fished on his own, he was always looking for more and more water to explore.

Spencer began tying flies at 14 and actually became a commercial fly tyer at 16. He has created several patterns that work well on all his home waters, but one in particular, Higa's SOS, is known to be extremely effective and the Orvis Company has picked it up and it's now a top seller, catching fish around the western United States.

He began his formal guiding career at age 21 and he's been guiding waters throughout Utah since then. He managed an Orvis company-owned store from 2001 to 2005 and there he taught classes in fly fishing, fly casting and fly tying. He then began managing an Orvis-endorsed lodge in eastern Utah. Spencer competed for a spot on the USA Fly Fishing Team in 2007 and 2008 and has appeared on local and national television shows, the most recent being "The New Fly Fisher."

He enjoys sharing his love of our sport with others, but his true passion is seeing people enjoying the waters he grew up fishing. Spencer lives in Provo, Utah, just 50 feet from the Provo River. When he's not guiding, he can be found fishing waters throughout Idaho, Wyoming, Colorado and Montana. He truly loves fishing and exploring new waters, whether it's a creek, a river or a lake.

Spencer is currently the fishing manager at Falcon's Ledge, which has just received the 2012 Fly Fishing Lodge of the year award from Orvis.

SAVING YELLOWSTONE LAKES CUTTHROATS

The Problem...

The iconic population of Yellowstone **cutthroat trout in Yellowstone Lake has been decimated** by the introduction of non-native lake trout and needs your help! While the Yellowstone Lake/Upper Yellowstone River system was once home to an estimated 4,000,000 Yellowstone cutthroat trout the size of the current population is unknown. The latest estimates place it at no more than 10% of historic levels, likely less than five percent, and potentially **as low as 1-2%**.

The History of the Problem

The unique environment of Yellowstone Lake was once considered a stronghold for genetically pure Yellowstone cutthroat trout and relatively safe from the impacts of climate change. In addition, Yellowstone cutthroat trout are noted as a keystone species for this entire ecosystem with over 40 other species dependent on them for survival. While theories as to the time and means of the illegal introduction of lake trout in Yellowstone Lake vary they were officially discovered in the lake in 1994. Of the main threats to Yellowstone cutthroat trout subsistence that have been identified lake trout are overwhelmingly recognized by fisheries biologists to be the most significant. To combat invasive lake trout the National Park Service has been employing gill netting on Yellowstone Lake since 1995 and currently spends approximately \$1,000,000 annually on the effort. To date a total of over 800,000 lake trout have been netted; 220,000 in 2011 alone. The lake trout population is now estimated at 300,000 - 400,000 adult fish.

Working Towards Recovery

The key to Yellowstone cutthroat trout recovery is major suppression of lake trout while, at the same time, cutting off recruitment into the lake trout population. The first step in cutting off that recruitment is gathering information on lake trout spawning beds and travel corridors. To accomplish this goal a hydroacoustic study on Yellowstone Lake was initiated on August 16, 2011. A total of 141 hydroacoustic tags were surgically implanted into lake trout. The movements of these fish are currently being monitored by 40 strategically placed receivers. This three-year telemetry effort requires a significant National Park Service, US Geological Survey (USGS) and nongovernmental organization commitment of money, research time, and support. Nongovernmental organizations such as Trout Unlimited have already donated \$40,000 to get the project started in 2011 and committed to raising, as a minimum, an additional \$85,000 by spring 2012 to support the second year of the study. The National Park Service has committed to assisting with this study and to continuing the expanded lake trout suppression program while the USGS has committed to research staffing and project coordination. To more accurately assess the situation, the USGS would also like to increase the scope of the study by doubling the number of receivers and hydroacoustic tags and adding 50 depth-recording telemetry tags.
