This Month's Speaker

HORSE PACKING IN SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA

with Rick Ferrante and Gary Scott







The success of the TV series YELLOWSTONE has led to a renewed interest in horse riding nationwide. How appropriate that our two November presenters will be saddling up and taking us on a horse ride to the most beautiful spots in our state. Leave your SUV at base camp, jump on to nature's four-wheel drive and head to the Sierra Nevadas.

In the words of Rick Ferrante and Gary Scott: "There is just something about a clear stream dancing over sharp grey granite, under a canopy of pines, at 10,000 feet in the Sierra Nevada mountains. Even without the spectacular fishing - a day in the backcountry will make anyone feel completely alive and in the moment." Even if you have equinophobia (look it up) or have not been on horseback since the pony rides at Griffith Park, there is always room for more adventure in your life. Your horse awaits you.

Their presentation is about fly-fishing trips done via horse pack. In this visually exciting show, they will go over the planning and preparation needed for this kind of trip as well as what it is like to travel by horseback and camp in the wilderness. And they will of course discuss the fishing. There will be detailed coverage of the techniques, strategy, and gear they have used to get the most out of this special trip right here in California. Let's meet our two trail buddies for the evening:

Gary Scott

Gary's passion for fly fishing began at age 10 on the lawn of the family home in La Habra, CA with a bamboo rod once owned by his grandad. He caught his first trout in the middle waters of the San Joaquin – from then he was hooked. Every summer he would return to Reds Meadow for a family camping trip and learned to explore the surrounding Sierra Mountains. Many years later after college degrees, marriage, raising children, running a landscape business, he realized that he had left something

on the back burner – his passion for fly fishing!

In 1996, a disappointing trip to the East Walker led him to sharpen his skills by joining the Canejo Fly Fishers where he met like-minded anglers and new friends. As an active member of the club, he wanted to give something back to the sport, and for twenty years ran the Trout in the Classroom program, teaching thousands of students to appreciate our State's valuable environmental resources of streams, lakes, fish, and wildlife. He also learned to tie flies and build fly rods – his friends call it more of an obsession than a hobby. Gary's latest hobby is to instill in his five grandkids the same passion he has for the outdoors and fly fishing. "I thank God for my wife of forty-three years who has allowed me enough time to enjoy some serious cold-water therapy and I've passed on to my 3 kids our love for the outdoors and fishing while on camping trips through the Sierras. My latest task is to train up my five grandkids with the same passion I have for the outdoors and fly-fishing - a task I am looking forward to." Gary looks forward to sharing with you the option to fly fish the Sierras from the back of a horse.

Rick Ferrante has been fishing for most of his 56 years and has been fly fishing for the last 10 years or so. A native of Southern California, Rick was born and raised in Burbank, CA and currently makes his home in Santa Clarita with his wife Alison. 

FREE FLY FISHING CLASSES 2023 FFCOC On The River Classes and Clinic (aka Fly Fishing 101)

The Fly Fishing Club of Orange County's (FFCOC's) On The River Classes and Clinic program is in it's eighth year. It is a perfect way for new, and less-experienced, fly fishers to learn the art of fly fishing. The program which is open to Club Members intro-

duces participants to the fundamentals of fly fishing including the equipment, techniques and science of catching fish. The program is a great introduction to a sport you can enjoy for the rest of your life.

Joe Libeu, a member of the FFCOC, is a Fly Fishers International Certified Master Caster Instructor and professional guide. He developed and instructs Advanced Nymphing Clinics on the Owens River. Several experienced club members assist Joe providing hands-on training during the On The River Clinic.

The program includes everything needed to plan and prepare for a successful fly-fishing trip. Classroom training subjects include equipment, insect life cycles and how flies imitate them, how trout behave, clues as to what fish eat, stream care and etiquette, reading the water, nymph rigging and much more.





The On The River Clinic is held on the Kern River near Kernville. Many of the items discussed in the classroom setting are covered in the field. In addition, the on the river clinic includes reading the stream, entomology, casting, mending, setting depth of flies using indicators, and numerous demonstrations. The program includes fishing one-on-one with one of the more experienced club members.

Kootenai River Montana and Fernie British Columbia A Fish Tale by: Tom Sakai


Club members Tom Sakai, Steve Watanabe, Satoshi Kamada and Gary Haun had a great trip to the Kootenai River in Montana and Fernie BC. We flew from Orange County to Spokane on September 16 and drove a rental car to our Airbnb in Libby MT, a small town located between Coeur d'Alene Idaho and Kalispell MT. Fished the Kootenai River for two days with guides from Linehan Outfitting. All

guides were very experienced and professional. Had two days of catching [

"catchable" rainbows with a few lunkers. After those two days we spent a half day on a small mountain stream, finding some fish, but not up to our expectations. We found the Kootenai River to be too big for fishing on our own, with limited access, given the four people in our group.

We then left Libby and drove to Fernie BC and stayed at another Airbnb, right on the Elk River. Fernie was great, with good fishing for

cutthroat and a few bull trout. We booked 3 days with Kootenay Fly Shop for fishing the Elk River from driftboats and an additional day wade fishing a local (limited access) creek. We also fished a couple of days on our own with some success.



After our stay in Fernie, we drove back to Spokane for our flights back to Orange County. Would we do it again? Definitely, although combining the Kootenai in Montana with Fernie was a little tough, given the 4½ hour drive from Fernie to the Spokane airport.

October Fishing: Pyramid Lake, Eagle Lake, and Kern River A Fish Tale by: Eric Kramer

Fishing report for Oct. 5-15. Day one, fished Pyramid Lake with Hans Grotwald from Sierra Drifters Guide Service. It was myself, Club member Sam Snyder, and future Club member Lance Rangheim. We fished deep on the east side of the lake in cold water, but lots of algee, huge mats of it. Dropshotted streamers in 80 to 120 feet, with almost all fish caught between 60 and 65 feet. 40 fish landed with 13 over 10 pounds, led by Lance's 19 and Sam,s 15. Day two we added former club member Jim Sharky to the crew. Only 21 fish to the net, but I got a double, a 20 and a



12 at the same time and Jim got a 16 and a 10 at once. Day 3 the boys went home and I was alone with Joe Contaldi who will handle the March ladder trip. I did 12 fish, including a 17 and a 26 pound double. Sunday I fished alone with Glen Lemon and had 10 fish, while former member John Cancilla got a 20 and a 17 with Joe. Monday, my last day I was with Glen for 12 fish including a 12 pound Summit strain which is very large for that breed. Almost all of the big fish are Pilot Peaks.



Travel Trailer Fishing AdventureA Fish Tale by: Janna and Terry Roznos



On Friday, September 1, we hit the road with our travel trailer on a 7-week Fall Fly Fishing Adventure. We successfully circumnavigated the Western States of California, Utah, Colorado, Montana, Idaho, Nevada, and return to our home in Whittier via the Eastern Sierra route on October 19; almost a 5,000 mile trip. Our travel map with our overnight stops is shown here. We fished the waters of the Gunnison River (CO), the Colorado River near Glenwood Springs (CO), the Green River (UT), the Provo and Weber Rivers in the Heber Valley (UT), the Madison River (MT), Soda Butte Creek in Yellowstone National Park (WY), the Clark Fork River (MT), the Bitterroot River (MT), the forks of the Tuolumne River (Yosemite National Park), the Middle Fork of the San Joaquin River (Devils Postpile National Monument), and the East Walker River.

All in all, this was a great trip; no calamities on the road and good fishing at every stop. We left our home in California in the heat of summer, and quickly found the refreshing temperatures of Fall beginning in Colorado. Some interesting memories of our trip included:

- The free range of animals (donkeys, goats, pygmy pigs) at our Gunnison RV park. The animals were rounded up at put into their pens for the night.
- The crazy tourists of Yellowstone. Tourons (Tourist + Moron). These folks chased a male moose to get a closeup picture. Countless times these folks approached bison for photos. We experience road gridlock in the Lamar Valley; by the time we got to see what the attraction was, it was a coyote in a meadow hunting burrowed vermin. A coyote! Are you kidding me, don't you people have these at home??



The Spirit of Dame Berners - Drag-Free Drift

This month we are talking to Greg Cooke about the importance of a drag-free drift. Greg is a long-time member of the Club. He was born and raised in Southern California and started fishing in the surf with conventional tackle at ten years old. In the early 1970's as a young teen he was introduced to fly fishing in the Eastern Sierras. At 14, he learned to tie flies and became a commercial tier for Dale's Hackle and Tackle so that he would have money to fly fish, camp, and backpack. Later, he started teaching fly tying and tying custom orders for Mike Scott. He has tied flies at various fly shows and occasionally teaches classes for the Fly Fishing Club of Orange

County. He always enjoys the camaraderie, the spectacular scenery that the sport brings and continues to fish both new and old destinations when he has the time.

Greg, I recently watched you catch a very nice, picky Cutthroat on Slough Creek, do think your drift was different from the others who were not catching fish?

Greg: Yes, I made sure that I mended the line to avoid drag and I placed the fly far enough above the fish, so that I had a drag-free drift when the fly entered the fish's vision. Proper positioning and choice of cast are equally important in delivering a drag-free drift to the fish. Reach casting down and across, or a Drag and Drop method can both be incredibly effective in presenting a fly-first, drag-free offering.

Is drag-free more important that fly selection?

Greg: In almost all cases, drag is more important than fly selection. You might have a fly that is close in size and color to what the fish are feeding on. Your success, however, depends on your ability to manage the drift in a drag-free way. The only time I have seen some micro drag not affect the feeding, is during a large hatch where the fish are in a feeding frenzy.

How do you prevent drag?

Greg: With various types of mending. For example, the reach mend can allow you to create some slack in the line between you and the fly. The choice of making slack upstream or downstream depends on how the current behaves. The stack or anchor mend is also a very effective method. In some instances, high sticking and leaving very little line on the water works best. It all depends on the current lanes that you must cross with the fly line.

Fly Fishing Educational Series (Con't)

Is there something I can practice to improve my drift?

Greg: Yes, it is best to practice in a stream if possible. You can watch videos online or hire a guide to teach you various mending techniques on the water. Simply put, your dry fly or strike indicator must be drifting the same speed as the current.

Is drag on the surface different from drag underwater?

Greg: No, it is not. When you use a strike indicator you need to treat the indicator just like a surface fly. The indicator must have a drag-free drift, otherwise the subsurface flies are being pulled in unnatural directions.

Do you ever drag or move the fly on purpose?

Greg: Yes, there are several applications where drag is applied. When you swing the fly at the end of a drift, the fly will rise in the water column and has drag. This motion often induces a fish to take the fly. I may simulate a nymph rising to the surface. Skating a caddis fly during a caddis hatch is another important application. Essentially, you just need to imagine different tactics when drag-free drifts are not working.

It all boils down to fooling the fish by making the fly move in a way they expect a natural fly to move.

Flies That Keep On Giving!

Damsel Nymph

By John Williams

My first experience fishing a damsel fly nymph was in Utah. Once I felt the tug and the race of the fish I knew I had to have this pattern when fishing a lake. This is my version.

Materials:



Hook: This is a size 10 Nymph

Eyes: Small Bead Chain cut to form a pair of eyes

Thread: 8/0 Olive

Rib: Fine Gold Wire

Abdomen & Tail: Olive Marabou

Thorax: Peacock Hurl

Thorax Cover: Pheasant Tails Fibers

Legs: Small Olive Rubber Leg
Cement: Super Glue Gel Formula

Instructions:

- 1. Place the hook in the vice upside down.
- 2. Start your thread behind the eye one eye space. place a slight smear of super glue on the thread and place your eyes at this point and secure with several crossing wraps, figure eights.
- 3. Place the hook upright in your vice now.
- 4. Cut a piece of fine gold wire and secure with a few wraps of thread and wrap rearward to just before the bend.
- 5. Select 10-12 marabou fibers and align the tips. Tie in the marabou leaving the tips to the rear forming the tail about a body in length.
- 6. Wrap the thread forward to the thorax area.
- 7. Wrap the marabou forward to form the abdomen and thread wrap it at the thorax.
- 8. Counter wrap the gold wire to secure the marabou and for the ribs and tie off at the thorax.
- 9. Cut two sets of legs and tie in at the thorax area, one on each side as shown.
- 10. Gather ten to twelve pheasant tail fibers and align the tips and tie in by the tips at the back of the thorax with the tips facing forward.
- 11. Select two peacock tail fibers and wrap around the thorax to the eyes.

Flies That Keep On Giving! (Con't)

- 12. Fold the peacock fibers over the thorax and secure with a few wraps of thread behind the eye of the hook and in front of the eyes.
- 13. Wrap your thread rearward to just in front of the legs and fold back the pheasant tail fibers and secure with several wraps of thread.
- 14. Smear a slight amount of super glue on 1/4" of your thread and wrap.
- 15. If you wait a minute there is no need to whip finish.
