

This Month's Program:

Fly Fishing the Spectacular San Juan with Larry Johnson



Not too far from southern California is a river that is world famous . . . world famous, that is, among fly fishers. In the northwest corner of New Mexico is where the San Juan River flows out of Navajo Dam, and there are very few fly fishing waters that can compete with this stream for numbers, size or the strength and fighting abilities of these trout.

The San Juan is a tributary of the Colorado River and became famous as a trout fishery after the Navajo Dam was built, which made the San Juan a tailwater. Construction began on this earthen dam in 1957 and was completed in 1962, originally designed for water storage in the newly created Navajo Lake. It is 402 feet high and more than 3,600 feet in length. Before the dam, the river was a relatively small one in the arid western foothills of the Rocky Mountains with not much to attract hordes of fly fishers.

But after the dam was in operation, with water flowing at a constant temperature of 42 to 44 degrees year-round, and the initial stocking of brown trout, the world began to take notice and for good reason. The trout average 17 to 19 inches, with many much larger. The fish took to the San Juan perfectly and the stocking of browns actually stopped 25 to 30 years ago so the browns are now considered wild. (These days some rainbows are stocked.) The pristine water below the dam runs for about 20 miles, with the fish numbering an incredible *nine to twelve thousand per mile*. This desert setting is indeed a unique one for a trout fishery, with the fish of the San Juan holding in pods, scattered in many of the riffles, as well as in back channels. The primary food source is midges, with the trout also taking mayflies, blue-wing olives, caddis, stoneflies, terrestrials like hoppers and ants and more meaty food such as worms, (yes, where did you think the San Juan worm got its name), leeches, snails and scuds.

You can drive to the river, or you can fly into Albuquerque, which then leaves you a little more than a three hour drive to the northwest, or you can fly into Durango, Colorado, which is one hour north of the river.

Larry Johnson has been fishing the San Juan for years. He loved it when he first fished it in the mid-80s and that love has steadily increased during the last 14years that he's been living on the banks of the river. The southwest was a new experience for Larry. He was born and raised in New Jersey where his family had a restaurant along the shore of Lake Lackawanna – yes there is a Lake Lackawanna-- that has been a summer resort 50 miles outside of New York City since 1911. Larry is one of five children born to a man whose first job was a mathematician working on what would become a new invention -- called a computer -- for IBM. Then Larry's father went off to fight in World War II.

Larry learned to fish from a neighbor at the lake, a Catholic priest whom Larry describes as being a family friend and a good fishing teacher who was the person to first put a bamboo rod in Larry's hand. Larry describes Father John Dericks as a man his family loved so much that the married everyone in the family . . . and they weren't even Catholic.

Larry graduated from Nichols College of Business in Dudley, Massachusetts in 1975 with degrees in business administration and marketing. After graduating, he worked at a ski lodge in Vermont until his brother-in-law convinced him to come out west to California. After a few years of working in different sales positions, Larry was hired by Polaroid where he spent more than a decade working for that corporation in Europe. In 1991 he was on a fishing trip in Florida where he had dinner with a doctor when this doctor showed him a new-fangled invention – a digital camera. Larry is a smart man and almost immediately realized that the Polaroid camera was doomed. He took early retirement and eventually wound up in New Mexico where, in 2000, he decided to become something of a trout bum on the San Juan. He actually took a job working behind the counter in a fly shop and, a year later, when Soaring Eagle Lodge came on the market, he bought it. He lived through some rough spots, like the actual day he took possession of the lodge. It was September 11, 2001 and by early afternoon, he was flooded with cancellations. But his skills at sales, marketing and publicity have proven invaluable and his investment paid off. He loves the San Juan, he loves guiding on the San Juan and he loves all the people who come there to fish.



KELSEY BASS RANCH

May 15-17, 2015

Kelsey Reservoir is a 125 acre lake located on the 7,000 acre Kelsey Cattle Ranch in the city of Snelling about 25 miles east of Merced. The lake is stocked with about 15,000 Florida strain Large-mouth Bass along with Bluegill, Red ear sunfish as well as catfish and several times a year with trout.

The lake is best fished from a pontoon boat, float tube or pram, although it can be successfully fished from shore. The bass average about 2 ½ to 3 pound although there are larger bass up to 6 pounds. The bluegill and red ear sunfish are very large and at first hookup it is difficult to tell whether the fish hooked is a bass or not as they pull very hard.



Fishing for bass at Kelsey can be done in a variety of ways. You can actually troll and strip streamers for bass like you do for trout as long as you find the right water which is usually at drop offs from deep to shallower water. The most exciting way for me is to throw top water flies into the weed, tules, trees, stickups and brush, especially early in the morning and later in the evening. Having a bass explode on your fly as it is sitting there very calmly in the water will get your heart racing quickly. When the topwater bite slows down, we change over to subsurface flies as small as one inch and up to 4-6 inches long at all depths from a few inches to 14 feet deep.

Fishing for bass requires a stout leader to keep them out of logs, brush, and weeds. Because we change the type and size of flies frequently it is helpful to have at least 2-3 rods to save time when fishing. We usually use fly rods in sizes from 6 wt to 8 wt, and we usually have 1-2 rods rigged with floating lines and 1-2 rods rigged with sinking lines. Some of the flies that we use are wholly buggers of all colors and sizes, meat whistle, perfection perch, poppers, gurglers, dahlburg divers and many others.

The cost to fish Kelsey Bass Ranch is \$100 a day. The club will have the lake for two days, Saturday and Sunday, and we are allowed to camp on the property. There is a large shaded grassy area for pitching out tents. A porta potty is provided and there is a large barbecue area with picnic tables. We usually arrive Friday afternoon, in time to pitch our tents and get our gear assembled and ready for fishing Saturday morning. We fish all day Saturday and Sunday (as late as you want), and we pack up and leave Monday morning.

MAMMOTH MENTOR OUTING

June 12-15, 2015

The Club has planned a 3 day Mentor Outing to the Mammoth Lake's area for June 12-15, 2015. The outing is designed as a basic introduction to fly fishing the eastern Sierra and is geared to novice fly fishers, and those wanting to become more familiar with the Mammoth Lakes area. Club members will be on hand to provide assistance and will lead car pool groups to a variety of area waters for those not working with the professional guides.

Novice anglers will get to work with professional guides on fishing basics. Saturday participants will work on basics, and some on-water activities with a guide from The Troutfitter. On Sunday we will meet with a guide supplied by Tahoe Fly Fishing Outfitters and learn the basics of fishing the East Walker River. There is no extra cost to participants for the guides. There may however, be a limit to the group size that will be working with the guides.

The Club reserved group campsite No. 9 at the Pine Glen Group Campground in Mammoth Lakes, CA. The campground is located adjacent to the Forest Service Ranger Station and Welcome Center off of Highway 203. Water and toilets are at the campground. Saturday evening is a planned potluck dinner. Sunday morning breakfast will be provided. There will be camp stoves available for use and some basic cooking utensils. The weather in June can be quite variable so bring cold weather gear along with the sunscreen.

The outing will cover basic fishing strategies and visit a few streams and lakes in the area. Fly rods from 3-6 weight will work well. If floating a lake a 5-6 weight rod is recommended. We will do a meet and greet stop at one of the area fly shops. An evening program is being planned for Saturday. There are plenty of non-fishing activities in the area for those attending that are not anglers.

There may be opportunity to learn basics of lake fishing using float tubes (weather permitting). Please **contact Lyman Kennedy (714) 742-5865** if you are interested in learning to fish from a belly boat on this trip. There are also options for renting tubes. Each float tube participant needs a Personal Flotation Device.

This outing is a great introduction to fishing Mammoth area lakes and streams. While the campsite can accommodate up to 25 people, feel free to make alternate lodging arrangements in Mammoth and still participate in Club activities. A trip sign-up sheet will be circulated beginning with the March Club meeting. Hope to see you on this great family friendly trip.

Greetings Everyone,

I am sure that most of you have been hearing the grim reports on the snow pack here in the Eastern Sierra and on the water outlook for the entire state of California. I have heard that the main topic of conversation at club meetings etc. has been frantic about the upcoming fishing season and that many folks are in a panic over it and even thinking of hanging it up until we get some water.

I would like to give you a few facts. Hot Creek is a spring creek. 85% of our summer water comes from the upstream springs. While the main springs are 30% down, we still have 70% of our water, which puts us in **much better shape** than most fisheries in the state! The water situation is not at its best but fishing can still be pretty darn good and FUN if you are willing to work a little more than you might be used to.

I have been walking the creek every day and there are plenty of fish in the system! They are all not in the usual places which will mean you may have to figure it out a bit but that is the fun of it!! We have all seen those banner years when fishing was really easy! Well, there is a balance to everything in life and this probably won't be one of those years, however, it can still be fun! Maybe instead of telling your friends about how MANY fish you caught, you can tell them about how you hooked those tough fish that you worked on for a while and finally got them to eat. Fly Tying

FLIES THAT KEEP ON GIVING Willie's Bloody Stone



By John Williams

Hook:	Daiichi 1760 size 6
Thread:	UTC ultra thread 280 black
Eyes:	Black bead chain eyes 1/8" medium
Antennae:	Sili legs speckle fleck black/red
Legs:	same
Tail:	same
Body Weight:	.025 lead
Rib:	UTC vinyl rib medium clear
Dubbing:	Hare'e Ice Dub Harder's Bloody Black
Back:	Mottled Turkey feather
Cement:	Super Glue
Back Coating:	UV clear thin fly finish

I've got cabin fever and tying like I have a trip tomorrow. I do have one coming up soon. This is one of the big flies that have worked in the past for me. I love to nymph fish for large fish and all of them love large stone flies.

Smear the shank with super glue and tie in a pair of eyes on the bottom side of the hook shank just behind the eye. Tie in the Sili antennae leaving them 1" long. Tie in the tails leaving them 1" long. Start wrapping the lead on the shank of the hook just above the point, forward to the eyes and back for the thorax to the rear to form a weighted body and thorax. Tie in a piece of the vinyl cord at the back end of the thorax and wrap with thread to the tie in point of the tail. Super glue the entire shank to the eyes with a smear of glue. Dub your thread and with a tapered noodle and dub the abdomen to just on the thorax. Prep your turkey feather with Dave's flex-a-ment on the back side and let dry. When the feather is dry cut a 1/4" slice of barbules and tie them in by the butt where you finished the dubbing and leave the point to the rear. Dub to the center of the thorax and tie in two legs laying the Sili legs across the shank and figure eight wrap the thread to secure them and cut them to 1" long on either side. Dub forward to the eyes building the thorax. Fold the turkey feather forward over the eyes and secure with a few wraps of thread just behind the eyes. Add a slight amount of super glue to the wraps of thread on top of the back, fold the turkey feather just ahead of the eyes using a bodkin to form a head and pull the remainder of the feather back and secure with several wraps of thread just behind the eyes. Cut the tag end of the feather half way from the eyes to the rear of the back. Add a drop of super glue to the wraps and whip finish. I add a smear of UV clear finish to the back and cure with a UV light. This will get down to the bottom and play with the big guys.
