This Month's Meeting

Flats Fishing the World

with Captain Bruce Chard

We fly fishers quickly discover that there are at least two elements of our sport that are amazingly constant. One is that we almost always find stunning beauty in where we fish, excusing, of course, the sometimes bizarre and unusual location of carp fishing in the L.A. River. Most of the time, however, we are in true beauty and splendor of nature, be it a small mountain stream, a brawling Rockies free stone river, a picturesque alpine lake or a stunning atoll in the Pacific. It is true: most fish live in the most beautiful places on earth. The second constant is that there is always, ALWAYS something new to learn – some new strategy, some new fly and some new place to go.

Well, for the second presentation in our new year, we are going to be absolutely smothered in beauty -- unabashed images of spectacular scenery from around our earth that will undoubtedly create a lovely wish list of new destinations, all the while being bombarded with new ideas and tactics and gadgets.



For more than two decades, Capt. Bruce Chard has made his love and commitment to fly fishing abundantly clear through countless activities and accomplishments. And without a doubt, his first love (after fly fishing) is teaching people – all kinds of people – how to fish, how to cast, how to see all the grace, charm and beauty in what we do and where we "do" it.

Bruce started fishing when he was 10-years-old, living in Venice, Florida, by tossing shrimp in the intercostal waterways. After moving to Pennsylvania, he saw a fly fishing magazine while he was still in his teens and loved the way the casting looked; he's been a devotee ever since. After graduating high school in the keystone state, Bruce moved immediately back to Florida and, at 18, started guiding in the Keys. His mentor was Jake Jordan, who was affiliated with the fly shop where Bruce had started working. Jake took young Bruce under his wing, introducing him to the many fly fishing icons he knew.

That was 24 years ago and Bruce's rise in the fly fishing world has been meteoric. From when

he was certified as a Federation of Fly Fishers *Master Certified Fly Casting Instructor* while still in his early 20s, Bruce has been conducting multiple fly casting and fly fishing schools throughout the Florida Keys, the Bahamas, Mexico and Belize, and he's recently been expanding these schools to even wider world locations. He's also the Director of Fly Fishing School Operations for Bozeman, Montana-based Yellow Dog Fly Fishing Adventures.

14 times has Bruce been on the cover of well-known fly fishing magazines and he's been written about countless times. He is a published writer and photographer himself and is currently under contract to write a fly fishing book for Stackpole. And Bruce gives back; he has devoted his expertise and time as a board member of the American Fly Fishing Trade Association (AFFTA) and regularly contributes time and energy to the many important conservation efforts of Bonefish and Tarpon Trust (BTT). Still in his early 40s, Bruce has already accomplished multiple achievements in both the introduction of new developments in the fly fishing industry as well as game changing flats fishing techniques, fly patterns and equipment.

And yet, of all his many accomplishments, overriding all seems to be his undisputed gift of connecting with fly fishers of all ages and skill levels. And his enthusiasm is described by everyone who knows him as absolutely infectious -- people say fly fishing isn't Bruce's job, it's his life. And he loves all of it.

As Bruce takes us literally around the world, this is a presentation you will definitely enjoy, whether you are a flats fishing aficionado (yet) or not.

Please join Captain Bruce Chard as he takes us on a tour of "Flats Fishing the World". See you there... and remember to pursue your fly fishing dreams!

Winter has arrived and as much as I love fly tying, I need to go fishing. Bishop and the Lower Owens is only five hours away so get out your gear, pack some warm clothing and let's go fishing.

Cloudy skies and maybe a little drizzle can do wonders for getting those Blue Wing Olive nymphs to become active and start wriggling toward the surface. With the right weather the BWO hatches can be more intense and last a lot longer creating some exciting fishing. And of course there is always midges which can be fished subsurface but with a good hatch can create some good dry fly fishing as well.

This outing is for everyone, experienced and beginners, but you all need to provide your own equipment, leaders, tippet and flies. We will have some volunteers to act as mentors for those who might need a little help, but this is a fishing outing, and we will all be fishing.

I have planned the outing to go from Friday to Sunday, and we will all meet at the river on Saturday morning, pair up head to the water. If you arrive early enough on Friday you might be able to get some fishing in on that day as well. I will give you all a list of places to stay in Bishop and you will be responsible for making your own reservations. We will get together for dinner Friday and Saturday evening and possibly breakfast Saturday morning.

Weather conditions and the fishing is variable in the winter time so you have to be prepared for anything and take what you get, but from past experience, the fishing can be really good.

FEBRUARY 13, 2016

If you've been considering a flats fishing trip or just need a casting tune-up before your next adventure, sign up for a three-hour session with master caster and Florida Keys Captain Bruce Chard. The class will cover the basics of casting, rigging and equipment for bonefish, permit and tarpon. (Bruce will be our February presenter with his excellent program, "Flats Fishing Around the World.") He is one of the top Florida guides, a fly line designer and a member of the ECHO pro staff.

There are two sessions and, in order to insure personal and individual attention from Bruce, each session is limited to only 10 students.

Pyramid Lake Outing March 14th, 15th, and 16th 2016

In what has become an annual event, this year's Pyramid Lake outing will be Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, March 14th, 15th, and 16th. In an attempt to miss the bulk of the weekend crowd which usually clears out by Sunday afternoon we again will fish during the week, those of you who went last year know this worked out well for the most part. If fishing is off the charts all bets are off as the number of people will triple during a hot bite!

If you have never done this trip before you are missing out on a chance to catch what may be the biggest trout of you life. The lake's native Lahontan Cutthroats *average* 3-5 pounds, with many fish pushing 10 pounds or more. **In the past a fish 10 pounds or bigger was considered a trophy. Now thanks to the introduction of the longer living Pilot Peak strain that is much longer living fish over 20 pounds are being caught!** If you are new to fly fishing the techniques are simple and easy to learn. We normally fish from ladders placed in the water at the proper distance from shore. There usually is nothing around you, but water. There is nothing to interfere with a back cast and nothing on the bottom to snag. You do not need to be a long distance caster as fish are sometimes hooked right at you feet.

Equipment that is appropriate for both kinds of fishing is usually two rods. A 6-7 weight rod with floating line for indicator fishing and a 8-9 weight rod for streamer fishing (a Rio DC 24ft. 250 gr. line is perfect). I will provide a more extensive list of what to bring that includes equipment, lines, flies, leaders, tippet and clothing in an upcoming e-mail.

Daytime temperature will likely be around 50 degrees F. This is a very variable temperature as we have experienced 30-75 degree temperatures in past years

You make your own travel arrangements to Reno, fly or drive. It is best to arrive by Sunday as we start fishing EARLY on Monday. Please let me know that you have arrived safely, Jim Wright (714-679-6638). I will be staying at the Silver Legacy Resort in downtown Reno. Others have stayed the Atlantis Casino (800-723-6500). Rob will be providing breakfast and lunch on Monday and Tuesday breakfast on Wednesday, as well as step ladders to fish from. Cost of the trip is \$225 per person for 3 days of fishing. I will e-mail a list of all attendees so you can communicate as to carpools, car rentals and lodging.

San Juan River - April 3 - 6, 2016

Spring is just around the corner and we are planning another fantastic outing to the San Juan River in New Mexico. The clear river waters of the San Juan are the jewel of Northwest New Mexico just a short 14 hour's drive from Southern California. The river is fed from the deep waters of Navajo Lake which provide nearly constant temperature and abundant food supplies. This means many large brown and rainbow trout with substantial fight.

Many of the club members have stayed at the Fisheads San Juan River Lodge [(505) 634-0463, http://www.fisheadsofthesanjuan.com/], and the Abe's Motel just across the street [(505) 632-2194, http://sanjuanriver.com/]. Both have very reasonable rates and can arrange guides as well. There are other accommodations as well. If making reservations at Fisheads, please let them know you are part of the FFCOC group. Contact Brian Mayer for full details.

This year, we are planning for fishing on the weekdays when all the kids have returned to school and we won't have to compete with the local weekend fishers. Plan to arrive on Sunday, April 3. If you arrive early enough, you may have the opportunity to wade fish the lower quality water. The general plan is to fish Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. These are the days that you should consider arranging guides. I strongly recommend you get a guide for at least two days to thoroughly enjoy all the fishing the San Juan Quality Water has to offer. Both Fisheads and Abe's offer package deals for two and three days guiding with lodging. Prices are the same as last year for guides and lodging. For those non-fishing travelers, there are several historic and interesting areas nearby to explore. The city of Aztec offers some shopping for Native American products and Durango, Colorado is a short drive away as well.

We have generally gathered as a group for dinner each night. Although there are limited choices

in Navajo Dam, we usually go to the city of Aztec (short 20 minute drive) for dinners at the local Chinese restaurant and Mexican food restaurant.



COLORADO OUTING Planned for May 1-7, 2016 Lyman Kennedy, Streamkeeper



In the past we have had both Pat Dorsey and Landon Meyer speak at our club regarding fishing the famous blue ribbon tailwater streams in Colorado. Having just returned from a trip, I am excited to announce a club trip to that area next year.

We are fortunate to have a club member, Mark Spowart, living in Monument Colorado and he was host for myself and two others on a week long trip to Colorado recently. Our outing next year will start in the Colorado Springs area, requiring a plane trip to Denver, about 3 hours and then an hour drive south to Colorado Springs and Monument. Participants will stay at the Fairfield Inn in Colorado Springs, 2.8 miles from Monument.

We will stay in Colorado Springs for three days, with opportunity to fish such famous trout streams as Cheesman Canyon, the Dream Stream, Elevenmile Canyon, Deckers as well as the Arkansas River. We will be using guides from Blue Quill Anglers who are all experts at fishing these streams.

After our exciting days on the water, Mark and his lovely wife, Liz, will be hosting our evening meals at their beautiful home in Monument.

Places for sight seeing for those interested include: Garden of the Gods, Air Force Academy, Pro Rodeo Museum, U.S. Olympic center, and Manitou Springs (cannabis capital of Colorado, if that is your cup of tea).

Then we will make a three hour drive southeast to Gunnison where we will stay at the Altmont Resort and fish the Gunnison River and possibly Taylor River. The Altmont Resort has cabins reasonably priced that can house 4-6 people with kitchen and living room. Fishing the Gunnison River is best done on a float trip with guides through some beautiful country, casting to browns, rainbows and cutbows. These fish are brightly colored, fat, and healthy and love to make long runs. Nearby Taylor river is a tailwater stream that is easily waded and is renown for its large 10-20 pound rainbows (and difficult to catch) up near outlet from the dam. The lower river in the public areas is very wadable and has good insect hatches and has riffles, long runs and pocket water.

At the conclusion of our trip, we have a four hour drive to Denver to return rental cars and check in at airport for our plane trip home.



For those new club members who are not familiar with TIC or Trout in the Classroom. This is one of the outreach programs that FFCOC participates in to give back to our communities. TIC is a science class in environmental study. It is not a hatchery program. Students from grades K – 12 learn the importance of our natural resources through the lifecycle of the trout. Classrooms are provided with specialized refrigeration trout incubators. The California Department of Wildlife provides rainbow trout eggs. They are an important teaching aid for the instructor. Fly Tying

Flies That Keep On Giving

My go to fly has changed many times from several years fishing Southern Utah's mountain Lakes to Argentina's Jurassic Lake the Buzzer has real fish appeal. This is a still or slow water fly. There are many variations of the buzzer some with gills and others with side wing buds. Colors are all over the place but I have a single combination I have much trust in.

Simple and Effective Buzzer

Hook: Owner SSW cutting point all purpose bait

hook Size 2-8

I also use Daiichi 1160 in size #10

Thread: size 6-8 hook UTC 70, size 2-4 hook

UTC 140 Black

Super Glue: I use Loctite Gel Control
 Abdomen: Mirage Large Opal Tinsel
 Flash Back: Mirage Large Opal Tinsel
 Wing Buds: Yellow Goose Biots
 Coloration: Permanent Red Marker
 Fly Coating: UV Clear fly finish thin



Smear a slight amount of super glue from behind the eye to deep into the bend of the hook. Start the thread behind the eye and wrap into the bend but before you get quite there tie in a 8" long piece of opal tinsel and bring the thread wraps into the bend and back up four head spaces back from the eye, let the bobbin hang. Wrap the tinsel forward to the four head space spot and tie off and bend it to the rear on top of the hook and make a couple holding wraps. Tie in two goose biots to either side with the tips facing down to the rear and the convex side out. Make several wraps of thread to cover the biots and the space from the eye to the tie in point of the biots. Fold the tinsel forward and tie off with a few wraps of thread. And cut the remainder free. Fold the biots forward from each side and let them crisscross just behind the eye on the top of the hook. Make several wraps of thread and cut or tear the tips free. Color the back edge of the biots with the marker and let dry a few seconds. Apply a slight amount of UV cure to the entire fly from deep in the bend to the thread wraps behind the eye. Add just a bit more to the thorax to build is a bit larger and cure with UV light.

You will thank me for this one. John
