This Month's Meeting

"Tenkara": It Can Improve Your Fly Fishing with Pat Jaeger

We have all seen a flurry of reports and stories in recent years about a new form of fly fishing called "tenkara." Well, it is not really new, and once people try it, almost all of them find it not only fun and enjoyable, but very effective and very useful for all fly fishing. People have learned that this ancient style of fly fishing, originated in Japan, helps us understand, and become better at, all aspects of fly fishing. Truly, when you go on the water with one of these long, light, beautifullybalanced tenkara rods, you discover new elements about the sport we love. And yes, there is no reel, but *please* trust us on this – this is not a problem and you will find tenkara wonderful. And trust our guide on this journey, Pat Jaeger, who is a definite "favorite son" of



our club as well as a dedicated and trusted keeper of our home waters in the eastern Sierra.

For the last couple years, Pat has become more and more enamored with this form of fly fishing and is turning some clients and previous non-believers into believers. Would we lie? Come to this show and learn something new and exciting. Really.

And, before our formal meeting, we recommend that you try to attend a short explanation and hands-on display of some tenkara equipment that Pat will have with him so that you can actually play with it in your hands. This will take place during the time that is usually used by presenters to tie flies. Join us, if you can. (See sidebar article about this mini-workshop.)

Pat is known to many of our members, but for those who haven't met or seen him before, and as a reminder to those who already love him, let's review what he sent us detailing his background:

My father passed away when I was six years old, leaving my mother to raise five boys and a four-year-old daughter. She didn't have much time to entertain us, so we had to create our own fun. We had plenty of kids in the neighborhood, a vacant lot and canyons to explore. We didn't get into too much trouble, but if any of you lived then in the San Diego area were ever missing fruit from your trees, that was probably our fault. Sorry.

When I reached my teens, my brothers included me in their fishing adventures. These usually took place on our local lakes, but there were some half-day saltwater trips as well. Soon I become a familiar face on the half-day boats, scrubbing decks on the way home in trade for trips.

After graduating high school in 1978 (Crawford High, San Diego), a couple of friends and I, inspired by the Allman Brothers song, decided to move (ramble) north to Mammoth Lakes in search of the mountain life, skiing and females. From the start, I truly felt at home with all of life's simple pleasures at my fingertips, namely unbelievable skiing, good hunting, the camaraderie of crazy kids turning

into adults in a small town, but most important: TROUT.

I applied whatever fly fishing skills I had to the waters of the eastern Sierra and found the passion that I needed to make fishing my profession. With the help of my friends from the Eastside Guide Service at the Trout Fly, my dream came true. In the spring of 1995, I served an internship with them and traveled to northern California to work under Dick Galland and the guides at the Clearwater House. The summer of '96 was spent working part time up north and as a full-time guide for the Trout Fly. In the spring of 1999, I became a part owner of the Trout Fly and that November I married the love of my life, Pamela, after a courtship of five years.

After many years working winters for Mammoth Mountain Ski Area as a ski repairman, I gracefully bowed out of this career to seek a full-time career as a fishing guide. (Today my wading boots are wet more than 200 days a year.)

In the winter of 2001, I sold my shares of the Trout Fly to one of my partners for a down payment on an "I love Lucy" (1940) fixer-upper house in Bishop, which, to this day, we call home.

I feel a first guide trip with a client is just a job interview. A call back for another date means I got the job. I treat each trip individually; I like to ask my clients what their goals and objectives are for the day and do my best to customize the trip to meet these visions, not mine. My goals in life are to raise a family, live and work in a beautiful place, surround myself with really good people and smile when I'm going to work. I am a Dad to our two daughters Maggie and Isabella, a husband to my sweetheart and best friend Pamela and my career is a Fly Fishing Guide.

My objective as a guide is to understand the craft in such detail that I can simplify the essential fundamentals of the sport. And streamline the learning curve to give the average angler the freedom of fishing later on his or her own. I can also break down the technical aspects of the sport and offer the more advanced anglers a new arrow for their quiver. Every so often I enjoy getting off the beaten path and I sincerely strive for that look in a client's eye when I hit the bull's eye and he or she has had a great and memorable day on the water and evenlearned some wonderful and useful things that will be used in the future. I love seeing that look.


Outings and Events (Date Order)

Stream Keepers with Good Trip Ideas wanted!

Stream Keepers are not appointed or grow on trees. All it takes is a desire to plan a trip and lead a group to the destination. You need to pass on the information to the group such as Lodging, Guide, Transportation, Dining, and what you will be fishing for.

The club and our members depend on our Stream Keepers to provide great fishing experiences. If you have questions please feel free to talk to the club's Outings Chair, John Williams (951 236-0862). We have a syllabus to help you.

The Stream Keeper process goes like this:



Casting in the Park

The FFCOC is sponsoring, with the generous support of Joe Libeu, Saturday morning sessions to improve our member's casting skills.



The first session will be held on February 18th at Irvine Regional Park, from 8:30-12:00. This first session will focus on <u>intermediate</u> casting: narrowing loops, changing distance during the cast, accuracy, and such. Follow on sessions would target more advanced techniques and skills.

To offset the cost of the OC Park permits, we will be charging \$5.00 a person for the session.

San Juan River, NM Outing April 2 to 6, 2017

Spring is just around the corner and we are planning another fantastic outing to the San Juan River in New Mexico. The clear river waters of the San Juan are the jewel of Northwest New Mexico just a short 14 hour's drive from Southern California. The river is fed from the deep waters of Navajo Lake which provide nearly constant temperature and abundant food supplies. This means many large brown and rainbow trout with substantial fight.



Many of the club members have stayed at the Fisheads San Juan River Lodge [(505) 634-

0463, http://www.fisheadsofthesanjuan.com/], and the Abe's Motel just across the street [(505) 632-2194, http://sanjuanriver.com/]. Both have very reasonable rates and can arrange guides as well. There are other accommodations as well. If making reservations at Fisheads, please let them know you are part of the FFCOC group. Contact Brian Mayer for full details.

This year, we are planning for fishing on the weekdays when all the kids have returned to school and we won't have to compete with the local weekend fishers. Plan to arrive on Sunday, April 2. If you arrive early enough, you may have the opportunity to wade fish the lower quality water. The general plan is to fish Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. These are the days that you should consider arranging guides. I strongly recommend you get a guide for at least two days to thoroughly enjoy all the fishing the San Juan Quality Water has to offer. Both Fisheads and Abe's offer package deals for two and three days guiding with lodging. Prices are the same as last year for guides and lodging.



For those non-fishing travelers, there are several historic and interesting areas nearby to explore. The city of Aztec offers some shopping for Native American products and Durango, Colorado is a short drive away as well.

We have generally gathered as a group for dinner each night. Although there are limited choices in Navajo Dam, we usually go to the city of Aztec (short 20 minute drive) for dinners at the local Chinese restaurant and Mexican food restaurant.



The Colorado River is described as "The World's Largest Spring Creek" that boasts 15.5 miles of clear running tailwater fishery flowing from Lake Powell.

Five Days of Backcountry Fishing July 10-14, 2017

Cost: \$1,224

\$200 non-refundable deposit is required to hold your spot, Make Checks to "Frontier Pack Train" and send to John Williams Stream Keeper: John Williams 951-236-0862 19859 Calle Cadiz Walnut, Ca. 9178

Itinerary:

- *Day One: Meet at the Pack Station in June Lake at 7:00 a.m., when breakfast will be served. We will partner you up with a horse to match you ability and then ride into the beautiful Ansel Adams Wilderness. Our lunch and fishing stop will be beside Crest Creek, where there will be plenty of Spawning Rainbow from Gem Lake. We will then continue to our first camp at Clark Lakes. There will be plenty of time to fish that evening for Brookies in the four nearby lakes.
- *Day Two: After breakfast, we will take a day ride to Thousand Island Lake and the headwaters of the San Joaquin River. There, you will fish for Rainbow/Golden hybrids. Our emphasis is on catch-and-release, After dinner, we will be fishing the Clark Lakes.
- *Day Three: We will break camp in the morning and travel to Algers Lakes, stopping along the way to fish beautiful Rush Creek, known for both Brookies and Rainbows. At our base camp, you will have the best opportunity for catching large Golden Trout. We will spend the balance of the day fishing near camp.
 - *Day Four: The group will have the whole day to fish Algers Lakes and find your favorite spot. You can expect to catch Golden's from 10-16 inches.
- ***Day Five:** Fish in the morning. After having lunch at the camp, we will return to the Pack Station, arriving at 4:00 p.m.

What to Expect:

- Check in time is 7:00 a.m. at Frontier Pack Train in June Lake.
- Breakfast is served the first day while gear is packed on the mules. The last meal furnished is lunch on the last day.
- Dunnage limit is **40 lbs. per person**. This includes sleeping bags, fishing gear, liquor.
- Frontier provides a saddle bag for trail essentials. We do not

suggest bringing saddle bags or backpacks unless pocket size.

- No alcoholic beverages served or included in trip fee but you can BYOB but the weight counts against your 40lbs limit.
- Transportation provided for return to June Lake for trips terminating at other road heads.
- Trips will terminate at 4:00 p.m. the last day.
- FRONTIER does **not** treat the water. Bring your own filter pump or purification tablets.
- Frontier furnishes stock, packer, cook, food, and camping equipment. Private tents for couples or singles will be reserved by request. All trips are outfitted with chairs, solar showers and privy.

Other Details

The Pack Station can Supply Bear Boxes \$5.00 each per day.Box Size 16" x 16" x 24"

Wilderness Permit \$5.00 per person additional

Personal Checklist

- Sleeping bag/foam pad or air mattress
- Flashlight/extra batteries
- Coffee mug
- Broad brimmed hat (must have string to keep from blowing off)
- Camera, extra SD card and extra batteries
- Rain pants & coat or slicker
- Riding boots & camp shoes
- Insect repellent
- Sun Screen and Chap Stick
- Polarized Sunglasses
- Bathing suit
- Hat protector from rain
- Heavy Jacket
- Canteen
- Personal hygiene kit (including towel)

Please use biodegradable soap and shampoo.

Bring gear in nylon duffels - sleeping bag and pads separate

Liquor should be labeled and checked in separately

We will be traveling to 9,000' elevation the first day and eventually to 11,000' elevation. Please come a day or two ahead of the trip to acclimate to at lease 7,000'. Drink plenty of water and limit the alcohol intake prior to the trip; Altitude sickness can ruin a trip.

• Fishing equipment:

4-6 weight Rod and Reel with floating line.

7 to 9 foot leaders 5x bring 4,5,6 and 7 X tippet Split shot BB and smaller

Flies:

- Parachute Adams #14-18
- Stimulator in orange #12-16
- Caddis #16-18
- Hopper #10-14
- Griffith Gnat #16-22
- Klinkhammer #16-18
- Glo Bug #16 Orange
- Wooly Bugger #8-12 Black & Olive
- Bring what you own already; there are many flies that work well in the high altitude backcountry of the Sierra's.
- The above list of flies has worked well for me in the past.

Fly Tying

Flies That Keep On Giving

The Pheasant Tail nymph has been around a long time and I have tied variations of this fly for years and here is one that has been productive in the past with a few modifications.

Modified Pheasant Tail





By John Williams

Hook: Daiichi 1530 size 10 – 16 I like this wide gape hook.

Bead: 7/64, 2.8 mm Black Tungsten Beads

Adjust the bead size to accommodate the hook size.

Thread: UTC 70 Black

Rib: UTC Small Red wire

Tail: Natural Pheasant tail fibers
Abdomen Dubbing: Hares Ear Dubbing Natural
Abdomen Back: Natural Pheasant tail fibers

Thorax: Peacock Hurl

Legs: Natural Hen Saddle Feather fibers

Flash Back Thorax Cover: Veevus Large Holographic Mylar Tinselin Red

Sorry the red holographic doesn't show up well in the photo.

Head Cement: Super Glue

Place the bead on the hook small hole first. Start your thread behind the bead and slide the wire rib into the back of the bead and wrap your thread down to the start of the bend trapping the wire all the way down to the far side of the shank leaving the wire to the rear. Tie in ten to twelve pheasant tail fibers letting the points extend to the rear one body length and secure with several wraps of thread.

Lift the butt ends of the pheasant tail fibers up and dub a tapered abdomen to the bead. Lay the pheasant tail fibers over the back of the abdomen and secure with your thread behind the bead. Tie in and wrap two peacock fibers behind the bead to form the thorax. Tie in the holographic mylar tinsel behind the peacock thorax and let the butt end lay to the rear for now. Remove from the hen skin one feather and about 3/16 of an inch cut the center stem of the feather, select around six to ten fibers on either side of the stem and coax with your finger the remaining fibers to the large end of the stem not removing them from the stem (they can be used for other flies. Lay the feather with the dull side down and tie in the stem behind the bead, after two. Soft wraps you can pull the stem to adjust the leg length. Pull the holographic mylar over the legs and peacock thorax and secure with a few wraps of thread. Coat your thread about 1/4" with a smear of super glue and take several wraps to embed the glue around the back of the bead. I use one or two whip finishes to secure the thread before the super glue has set.

Tying is a way to live the experience of fly-fishing when you can't be on the water. Merry Christmas to all,
