

Fly Fishing The Eastern Sierra Backcountry with Seth Blackamore

We have had the pleasure of hosting some truly dynamic and knowledgeable speakers that have taken us across the United States, Europe, Canada, Argentina, the Yucatan, and other exotic places, sharing with us their passion of fly fishing and what these faraway places hold for us as fly anglers.

This month it's time to come home - back to California and the Eastern High Sierra. This is our home waters... many we have explored and fished, many still wait for our arrival. As we travel north on US 395, approximately five hours from Orange County, we can find dozens of side roads that wind far up into canyons that all lead to countless surprises and magnificent viewpoints. These roads take us to many trails that lead farther into the mountains and valleys that hold pristine waters, waiting for us as fly anglers to fish or just explore their natural beauty.

Unlike most high mountain destinations, the Eastern Sierra is readily accessible by most vehicles or four wheel drive vehicles. Eleven highways cross the Sierra, making it very easy to fish our favorite roadside waters. But what about those backcountry destinations that many of us have only dreamed about and never seen? With a little effort and the right understanding about what these areas have to offer, they can open a whole new world to the fly angler.

Our guest speaker this month is Seth Blackamore. Seth is an avid fly fisherman, author, and photographer based out of Bishop, CA. Seth has twenty plus years of fly fishing experience, and spends most of his summers exploring the beautiful Sierra fishing many of its backcountry waters. In 2016 Seth co-authored 'Fishin Trails 2' with Jared Smith, a fishing and hiking guide for the Eastern Sierra backcountry.

Seth joins us to share his passion and knowledge of fly fishing the Eastern Sierra backcountry. He will discuss area information, what to expect, how to prepare, backcountry fishing tips and techniques, trout species identification, why catch-n-release, fly gear recommendations, photography tips.... and more. He may even share with us his favorite secret backcountry water.

How about Braided Leaders? A Class is in the Planning Stage!

Twisting for more fun!

You tie flies and build rods to add more fun factors on your fly fishing experience. How far can you go with your own gears and style? Before the modern materials and equipment, fly fishers used to get everything from Mother Nature. The Fly Fishers Club of Orange County offers a new class on making braided leaders made of horse hairs and threads. They are surprisingly easy to make and fun to catch fish. You can make leaders for your own designs in length, color, and taper. Horse hair leaders are 100% natural and you even feel good cutting them off in the river at the end of a fishing day. You will be amazed how gently you can present a dry fly using a thread leader. Thread leaders do not coil at all nor drag your flies as monofilament leaders do. The class will be on two days (most likely on Saturdays), 2-3 hours each. What are required for you to attend the class? Your hands! Yes, that's all you are expected to bring with you. The club will provide materials and tools needed to make braided leaders. Dates, time, and location are still in exploration, but they will be revealed at the general meeting on March 14. Interested? Pyramid Lake Outing

March 12 - 14 2018

In what has become an annual event, this year's Pyramid Lake outing will be Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, March 12th 13th and 14th. In an attempt to miss the bulk of the weekend crowd which usually clears out by Sunday afternoon we again will fish during the week, those of you who went last year know this worked out well for the most part. If fishing is off the charts all bets are off as the number of people will triple during a hot bite!

If you have never done this trip before you are missing out on a chance to catch what may be the biggest trout of you life. The lake's native Lahontan Cutthroats *average* 3-5 pounds, with many fish pushing 10 pounds or more. **In the past a fish 10 pounds or bigger was considered a trophy. Now thanks to the introduction of the longer living Pilot Peak strain that is much longer living fish over 20 pounds are being caught!** If you are new to fly fishing the techniques are simple and easy to learn. We normally fish from ladders placed in the water at the proper distance from shore. There usually is nothing around you, but water. There is nothing to interfere with a back cast and nothing on the bottom to snag. You do not need to be a long distance caster as fish are sometimes hooked right at you feet.

Equipment that is appropriate for both kinds of fishing is usually two rods. **A 6-7 weight rod with floating line for indicator fishing and a 8-9 weight rod for streamer fishing** (a Rio DC 24ft. 250 gr. line is perfect). I will provide a more extensive list of what to bring that includes equipment, lines, flies, leaders, tippet and clothing in an upcoming e-mail.

Daytime temperature will likely be around 50 degrees F. This is a very variable temperature as we have experienced 30-75 degree temperatures in past years

You make your own travel arrangements to Reno, fly or drive. It is best to arrive by Sunday as we start fishing EARLY on Monday. Please let me know that you have arrived safely, Jim Wright (714-679-6638). Rob will be providing breakfast and lunch on Monday and Tuesday breakfast on Wednesday, as well as step ladders to fish from. Cost of the trip is \$250 per person for 3 days of fishing. I will e-mail a list of all attendees so you can communicate as to carpools, car rentals and lodging. E-mail me (jrwright1@earthlink.net) with any questions or to sign up. I will also have a sign-up sheet at the Meetings in December, January, and February.

OUTING WILL BE LIMITED TO 12 PEOPLE!!! I am not yet sure of the final cost this year.

What to Bring:

Waders with wading belt is mandatory

Fly Rod, Reel, Line: 6-8wt rod, reel with a sealed drag is preferable, line (sink tip or shooting head), stripping basket, 10-12# leader.

Flies: Pink, chartreuse, maybe blue, brown or rust colored clouser type. Sand crabs (if around). Check out His and Her Fly Fishing in Newport Beach for a great selection.

Hat (must), Sunglasses, Lotion

And, of course, your **2018 CA Fishing License**

FFCOC On the River Classes and Clinic - Sign Up Now!

The Fly Fishers Club of Orange County is offering free fly fishing classes and on the river training for its members in March 2018. This program is a continuation of the FFCOC's **On The River Classes and Clinic** training that has been a great success providing club members introductory classroom and on the river training. Joe Libeu, a FFI Certified Master Casting Instructor, professional guide, developer and instructor for Advanced Nymphing Clinics on the Owens river, and member of our Club will provide six hours of classroom training and two days of on the river training to participants. Several experienced Club members will assist Joe by providing hands assistance during the on the river clinics.

- Classroom Training – Tustin
Saturday March 10, 8:30 am -12:30 pm
Saturday March 17, 8:30 am -12:30 pm
- On-The River Clinic – Lower Owens River
Saturday March 24, 8 am to 4 pm
Sunday March 25, 8 am to noon



The program includes everything needed to plan/prepare for and experience a successful fly fishing trip. Classroom training will be held in Tustin where subjects will include equipment, insects including their life cycles and how flies imitate them, how trout behave, clues as to what fish eat, stream care and etiquette, reading the water, rigging and much more. The on the river clinic will be held on the Lower Owens River near Bishop. Many of the items discussed in the classroom setting are covered in the field. In addition, the on the river clinic will include reading the stream, insects including in-stream entomology, casting, mending, setting depth of flies using indicators, and numerous demonstrations. The second day on the river includes fishing one-on-one with one of the more experienced club members.

The training is focused on helping new club members learn the basics of fly fishing and is in follow up to our annual *Casting Clinic* held last September. Participation in the On The River Classes and Clinic is limited. New club members that signed up last September after the *Casting Clinic* will be given preference. All club members are welcome if we can accommodate them. There will be a \$10 fee to cover the cost of binders and reproduction of course materials. Participants and volunteers will be responsible for their transportation, lodging and meals in the Bishop area.

Joe Libeu is conducting the On The River Classes and Clinic and Doug Jones is helping him with the logistics. San Juan River, NM Outing

April 8 to 12, 2018

Spring is just around the corner and we are planning another fantastic outing to the San Juan River in New Mexico. The clear river waters of the San Juan are the jewel of Northwest New Mexico just a short 14 hour's drive from Southern California. The river is fed from the deep waters of Navajo Lake which provide nearly constant temperature and abundant food supplies. This means many large brown and rainbow trout with substantial fight.

Both have very reasonable rates and can arrange guides as well. There are other accommodations as well. If making reservations at Fisheads, please let them know you are part of the FFCOC group.

This year, we are planning for fishing on the weekdays when all the kids have returned to school and we won't have to compete with the local weekend fishers. Plan to arrive on Sunday, April 8. If you arrive early enough, you may have the opportunity to wade fish the lower quality water. The general plan is to fish Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. These are the days that you should consider arranging guides. I strongly recommend you get a guide for at least two days to thoroughly enjoy all the fishing the San Juan Quality Water has to offer. Both Fisheads and Abe's offer package deals for two and three days guiding with lodging. Prices are the same as last year for guides and lodging.

For those non-fishing travelers, there are several historic and interesting areas nearby to explore. The city of Aztec offers some shopping for Native American products and Durango, Colorado is a short drive away as well.

We have generally gathered as a group for dinner each night. Although there are limited choices in Navajo Dam, we usually go to the city of Aztec (short 20 minute drive) for dinners at the local Chinese restaurant and Mexican food restaurant.

Casting in the Park "Double Haul" was well attended and attendees gained an important additional casting skill.





Flies That Keep On Giving

Recently we lost a wonderful fly tier and long time friend to our club Bob Moyer, he helped me and many in this club learn how to tie better. During his long history in our club he shared what he knew about the sport freely and I was fortunate enough to be one of the benefactors of his generosity. I would like to share a fly he gave me and I had tied many for myself because they worked very well, Thank You Bob.



Hook: Size 2-8 Streamer Hook
Weight: 12 wraps of .025 Lead
Thread: Black 3/0
Tail: Golden Pheasant Crest Feather
Body: Orange Floss
Body Stripe: Peacock Herl
Wing: White Marabou
Cheek: Bright Yellow Marabou
Beard: Ginger Hackle Fibers



Start lead wraps on the shank of the hook and center after you have made twelve wraps. Start the thread behind the eye and run it back down to the bend trapping the lead with several wraps of thread. Tie in two Tails backsides (Dull Side) facing each other and let to protrude $\frac{1}{2}$ of the shank length. Tie in the floss at the bend and run your thread back to an eye's space behind the eye of the hook. Wrap the floss body material forward and tie off an eye's space behind the eye of the hook. Tie in two peacock herl fibers on either side of the flanks where the floss ended and letting it extend to the tail. Tie in the wing of white marabou on top letting it extend to the tail. Tie in a yellow marabou cheek on either side of the fly angling it upward slightly. Tie in a beard of ginger hackle fibers to about $\frac{1}{2}$ the length of the body. Create a tapered head with the thread and whip finish and head cement.
