

Thin Blue Line Fishing Class

Want to test your hunting skills? Can you find places off the beaten trail where trout may be silently sipping down their bugs unmolested by throngs of fisherman? I'm talking about finding those Thin Blue Lines on a map that hold wild trout. These streams are not too far off the road, yet remote enough where few people venture. The fish are measured in terms other than size. While occasional large ones surprise you, these fish are wild, wily, vividly colored, and often fight as hard as their much larger brothers from the big rivers. And the scenery is always beautiful.

This class will be offered on two successive Saturdays, March 21 and March 28. The first session will be an indoor class covering how to identify fishy terrain on a map before you enter the woods, how to relate GPS and topographic maps to each other, how to estimate time to hike to your destination, and a few fishing tricks needed for these types of streams. The second session on the 28th will be an outdoors practice session at Caspers Wilderness Park. In this session we will apply the classroom skills to match terrain features on a map and on the ground, and to practice plotting a cross-country course to reach targets not on paved trails.

The cost of the class is \$5 to cover printing of maps and protractors, please bring it to the first session. You will need to bring your own compass and whistle. Our class space is limited to 15 people. Please sign up with Larry Behm at Larry.Behm@cox.net or 949-235-4466

A GUIDE'S APPROACH TO WATER: JAMES GARRETTSON

In fly fishing we often hear confusing slogans such as “Think like the fish” or “Be the fly.” The best advice might be “Think like a guide.” How often have we wondered what thoughts run through the minds of professional guides as they face the challenge of giving us a memorable day on the river? The program explores the guide/client partnership with many helpful tips to prepare us for future outings. Our February speaker, James Garrettson, a fresh young face on the speaker circuit, will share his approach to the many variables he faces on every guiding day. Weather, river flow, hatches and angler skill level all play a part in the intricate back story. James’ home waters around Taos, New Mexico provide a stunning backdrop to this narrative and a reminder that this State has been overlooked in previous speaker programs. James is a keen advocate of the latest Euro nymphing techniques and an Ambassador the Fulling Mill Company. An accomplished fly tier, he will be tying flies before the meeting.

James is a full-time fishing guide and a part time astro-physicist (not really)! Originally from Northern Virginia, James started fly fishing at age 11 and never looked back. His unbridled enthusiasm for the sport landed him a job at Orvis before he could drive. After bouncing around the East Coast, Montana, Costa Rica, and the Pacific Northwest, James has finally planted roots in Northern New Mexico. When not spending quality time with his family or taking fishing tips from his 3-year-old daughter, James can be found on the vise or taking advantage of the Southwest’s myriad of fishing opportunities. Apart from guiding, James enjoys writing, photography, competitive ribbon dancing, and speaking at shops and clubs near and far. Catching fish is also very much enjoyed.

Free Fly Fishing Classes and On The River Training

Sign up NOW!

The Fly Fishers Club of Orange County is offering free fly fishing classes and on the river training for its members in January and February 2020. This program is a continuation of the FFCOC's On The River Classes and Clinic training that has been a great successes providing club members introductory classroom and on the river training. Joe Libeu, a FFI Certified Master Caster Instructor, professional guide, developer and instructor for Advanced Nymphing Clinics on the Owens river, and member of our Club will provide six hours of classroom training and two days of on the river training to participants. Numerous experienced Club members will assist by Joe providing hands assistance during the on the river clinics.

The program includes everything needed to plan/prepare for and experience a successful fly fishing trip. Classroom training will be held in on the Santiago Canyon College campus in Orange where subjects will include: equipment, insects including their life cycles and how flies imitate them, how trout behave, clues as to what fish eat, stream care and etiquette, reading the water, rigging and much more. The On The River Clinic will be held on the Lower Owens River near Bishop. Many of the items discussed in the classroom setting are covered in the field. In addition, the On The River Clinic will include: reading the stream, insects including in-stream entomology, casting, mending, setting depth of flies using indicators, and numerous demonstrations. The second day on the river includes fishing one-on-one with one of the more experienced club members.

The training is focused on helping new club members learn the basics of fly fishing and is in follow up to our annual Casting Clinic held in September. Participation in the On The River Classes and Clinic is limited. New club members that signed up last September after the Casting Clinic will be given preference. All club members are welcome if we can accommodate them.

Float Tube Outing At Jess Ranch Lakes

Saturday, February 22, 2020

Our first outing of the year will be at Jess Ranch Lakes located in Apple Valley approximately one hour drive from Orange County (depending on traffic).

There are three lakes on the premises, however we will be fishing on Lake One. It is a small easily navigated lake that is stocked with trout and bass, all catch and release. If you have all needed equipment, it is a great place to learn and improve your float tubing skills.

The cost to fish the lake is \$40 to fish all day. The ticket office opens at 7:00 and you have to be off the lake by 4:00 pm.

This is a Float Tubing Only lake. You are required to wear chest waders and a safety vest.

A five or 6 weight rod will do nicely, and you will need assorted flies such as midges and streamers. Barbless hooks are required.

February can be very chilly so you will need to wear layers and fleece under garments. If interested you can sign up at January meeting or contact me:

San Juan River, NM Outing

March 31 to April 3, 2020

Spring is just around the corner and we are planning another fantastic outing to the San Juan River in New Mexico. The clear river waters of the San Juan are the jewel of Northwest New Mexico just a short 14 hour's drive from Southern California. The river is fed from the deep waters of Navajo Lake which provide nearly constant temperature and abundant food supplies. This means many large brown and rainbow trout with substantial fight.

Many of the club members have stayed at the Fisheads San Juan River Lodge [(505) 634-0463, <http://www.fisheadsofthesanjuan.com/>], and the Abe's Motel just across the street [(505) 632-2194, <http://sanjuanriver.com/>]. Both have very reasonable rates and can arrange guides. There are other accommodations as well. If making reservations at Fisheads, please let them know you are part of the FFCOC group. Contact Brian Mayer for full details.

This year, we are fishing on weekdays when all the kids should be in school and we won't have to compete with the local weekend fishers. Plan to arrive by Tuesday, March 31. The general plan is to fish Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, April 1 to 3. These are the days that you should consider arranging guides. I strongly recommend you get a guide for at least two days to thoroughly enjoy all the fishing the San Juan Quality Water has to offer. Check both Fisheads and Abe's websites for details.

For those non-fishing travelers, there are several historic and interesting areas nearby to explore. The City of Aztec offers some shopping for Native American products and an Anasazi settlement to explore. Durango, Colorado is a short drive away as well with many attractions.

We have generally gathered as a group for dinner each night, although there are limited choices in Navajo Dam. We usually go to the City of Aztec (short 20 minute drive) for dinner at the local Chinese restaurant and to Bloomfield (short 30 minute drive) for bar-b-que restaurant. The restaurant at Fisheads requires reservations 24 hours in advance for dinner.

2019/2020 Fly Fishers Club of Orange County Marine Studies Scholarship

The Scholarship Committee would like to announce that the CSU Scholarship Program has awarded Chris O'Keefe as this year's 2019/2020 Scholarship recipient. Chris is one of six candidates that were up for this scholarship. Chris currently attends Humboldt State University and is Graduate Student majoring in Fisheries Biology with a 3.9 grade point average. As you will read in his cover letter included below, he is an avid Fly Fisherman since 2008 and has worked on many programs that pertains to trout and salmon.

Here is his cover letter to the Scholarship:

Dear Fly Fishers Club of Orange County,

Ever since I was a young child, I have been passionate about fishing, but when I took an "Introduction to Flying Fishing" course in the summer of 2008, I was led down a path where I discovered my interest in fisheries management and conservation. I can confidently say that without fly fishing in my life, I probably would not have had the chance to work with remote golden trout populations in the Sierra's, track the movement of rainbow trout in a blue ribbon trout stream in the Central Valley, or monitor endangered salmon and steelhead along the California coast. My five-plus years of monitoring fish populations has led me to graduate school, where I hope to develop technical skills that will enable me to help preserve salmonid populations for future generations.

I feel very fortunate to have the opportunity to work towards a master's degree in Fisheries Biology and to learn from the amazing faculty at Humboldt State University (HSU). My thesis focuses on Coho salmon and steelhead trout passage of beaver dam analogues (BDAs). BDAs are a relatively new innovation to salmonid restoration. Due to the complex habitat that BDAs create, they have been cited to benefit many aquatic and terrestrial species, but there are concerns from regulatory agencies about fish passage. The findings of my research will inform future implementation efforts and address permitting concerns in Northern California and much of the Pacific Northwest. My research is already off to a great start, and I am eager to share my results with the fish restoration community.

My journey to get to graduate school was fraught with challenges. I am a first-generation college student and have had very little guidance on how to navigate through the academic system. While finding my way through college, I struggled with a learning disability that went undiagnosed for most of my life. It was not until the end of my undergraduate degree that I found out that I am dyslexic. That realization helped me address the problem head on and seek help when I need it. In addition, during my undergraduate coursework, I worked full time while taking classes to pay for school and living expenses. After completing my undergraduate degree and before starting graduate school, I worked two jobs to try to pay off my college debt and make ends meet. At the same time, I also took night classes at the local community college to prepare myself for graduate school. My path to graduate school has not been easy, but I feel it has only made me stronger, and I have learned that with enough hard work and dedication, I can accomplish my aspirations.

A scholarship would help address my unmet financial needs. My thesis research is partially funded by a National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF) grant awarded to my advisor, Dr. Darren Ward. This grant covers the research equipment and provides me with a small hourly stipend for up to 20 hours per week during the semester. While this will pay for some of my living expenses, it is insufficient to cover my tuition, rent, and school supplies. As a first-generation college student with little outside financial support, I do not have the resources to pay for my education out of pocket. Between undergraduate and graduate school expenses, I have accrued close to \$30,000 in student loan and credit card debt. A scholarship would alleviate some of the financial burdens associated with graduate school and enable me to allocate more of my time to research and the development of technical-research skills.

HSU has long been my top choice for a graduate school, and I am thankful for the opportunity to learn at one of the best fisheries programs in the nation. The skills I develop over the next few years will help me advance to a career in which I can make meaningful differences in salmonid conservation.

Flies That Keep On Giving

If you have followed my selections of flies you know I do a lot of nymph fishing, here is another that works well in moving water. Caddis inhabits rivers and streams the world around, here is another of my creations and it is at the beginner level.

Willie's Holographic Caddis



Hook:	Firehole 315 Size #12
Thread:	Veevus 10/0 Black
Bead:	Tungsten 2.4mm Black
Rib/Body:	Stretch Magic Clear 1mm available at Michael's used as Bead and Jewelry cord.
Green Underbody:	Large Green Holographic Tinsel
Thorax:	Peacock Eye Herl
Legs:	Brown Hen Saddle Feather
Cement:	Gel Super Glue

Place the bead on the hook small hole first. Secure the hook in the vice and start the thread behind the bead immediately secure one end of the Stretch Magic one head space behind the bead. Wrap the thread into the bend securing the clear stretch magic along the way keeping it on top of the hook and make several wraps of thread to secure it in the bend. Cut a piece of holographic tinsel and secure it in the bend over the thread. Smear gel super glue slightly up the hook to the bead. Wrap the tinsel forward to behind the bead and secure with several wraps of thread. Back to the stretch magic, stretch it as you wrap forward all the way to the bead and secure with several wraps of thread and cut off remainder. Remove four-peacock eye herl and cut the brittle tip ends off, tie in two eye spaces behind the bead and wrap forward to the bead and secure with a few wraps of thread and cut off remainder. Lay six to eight fibers from a hen saddle behind the bead leaving them to the top and sides to form the legs the length of the hook or slightly longer. Smear super glue on your thread and carefully make several wraps of thread behind the bead and whip finish. This one is fun to fish. Have Fun!
