"Sight Fishing For Trout" With Landon Mayer

Spotting Trout, especially large Trout, can be difficult. Riffed water, wind, sun, clouds shadows, and obstructions in the water can make it challenging for an angler to spot fish.

Our guest speaker this month is Landon Mayer from Colorado Springs, Colorado, and he is a fishing guide, writer, instructor and expert on how to read water and sight fish for large Trout. Landon is one of the hottest and most requested speakers on the subject of sight fishing and pursuing large Trout. His success in catching Trout is fueled by his addiction to seek out large fish with small flies and lightweight fly-fishing equipment. Through trial, error and perseverance he has developed innovative techniques for hooking and landing selective Trout. Landon has written several books, including "How To Catch The Biggest Trout Of Your Life" and his newest book, "Sight Fishing For Trout". Presently he has two DVD's on the market titled "Landing the Trout of Your Life" and "Weapons of Bass Production".

Landon is also a contributing writer for High Country Angler and Fly Fisherman magazine. He has also appeared in other publications such as American Angler, Fish and Fly and Field and Stream. He is an ambassador for Simms, Ross Reels, RIO, Smith Optics, Fish Pond and Outcast Pro Staff.

Landon's program will teach us how to spot fish. He will tell us where you want to look for large Trout, how to set up your line, retrieve, and how to use the buddy system of spotting fish for a more productive day on the water.

Please join Landon Mayer as he shares with us the fun of "Sight Fishing for Trout". I hope to see you there... and remember to pursue your fly fishing dreams!

I had a great time at the West Fork of the San Gabriel a few weeks ago. This was a "Mentor Outing" nicely run by Melinda and John Burns. I met two new club members, Chris Haggard and Karl Bowers that day. I was their mentor that day. I felt good about the opportunity to help them grow their fly fishing capability. As I reflect on that day I think back to how I got started in fly fishing.

It was in 1980 that my neighbor, Paul, came over with a newspaper clipping in his hand. It was an announcement for a fishing class to be held not far from where we lived in Santa Ana. Paul said "I don't know what Fly Fishing is but if it's fishing it must be good!" We went to the class. This is where I met Ray Johnson. He taught fly fishing and fly tying over about 10 sessions with field trips to practice what we had learned. My first fly fishing trip was on the West Fork of the San Gabriel as part of this class. Ray was "Paying It Forward."

Much of my working life I worked at Hughes Aircraft in Fullerton. It was there that I met Earl Young who ran the company's print shop. I found out that he was teaching a fly tying class and decided to attend. Earl had a well designed class that started with basics and moved up from there. There were new fly patterns and materials each session. Earl was "Paying It Forward."

At the first session of Earl's class a guy drove into the parking lot driving an attention getting Dodge pickup that was powered by a diesel engine originally built to power a bus. As I talked to the driver, I found out he also worked at Hughes and his office was in the next building, only a few hundred feet from mine. He had been fishing much of his life – his parents frequently made long trips around the west. That was when I met Curt Clark. I've gone fly fishing with him many times since then and learned how to fish small Southern California mountain streams from him. Curt was "Paying It Forward."

NEW Meeting Night Up for Consideration



Surf Fishing March 19th 2011

Jim Edwards has agreed to host a club outing to fish the local surf in March 19th. Participants are to meet the group at 8am within Huntington State Beach. To get there, enter the state beach at Magnolia and Pacific Coast Highway. Then go south in the parking lot until you are parallel to the Brookhurst and PCH intersection. We will meet there, gear up and hit the surf.

Be sure to dress warm and bring your waders, boots and a good wind/water proof jacket to put on when you get there. Fishing equipment should include 7 to 10 wt rods, a stripping basket and a sinking shooting head on running line of an integrated sinking line of appropriate weight for the

rod you are using.

Flys that typically work well include: Olive/white Clouser, Tan/white Clouser, Chartruse/white Clousers size 1 to 4 Sand crab patterns, size 2 and 4 Gracie's Shrimp

Mentor Outing San Gabriel River West Fork January 29th 2011



Our outing started out on an early cool brisk Saturday morning(January 29th), where 14 mentees, 9 mentors, 1 cook and the organizer (myself) met at the foot of the mountain. Their quest was to work with novice Fly Fisherman to teach them how to conquer the wild trout of the West Fork of the San Gabriel River. Once all Fly fisherman were accounted for, I then sent them up the hill to meet at one more location where we would then regroup into fewer cars and then carpool up the service road to the Pasadena Bait Club House to use as a home base.

As mentioned early it was a cool but brisk morning and the mentees were hungry to learn all they could from their mentors. The morning started out with Larry Carroll, a club member from Wilderness Fly Fishers, giving us a brief overview of the area and the fish. He briefly touched on tackle, reading the water and what flies worked here. Larry Carroll has been fishing these waters for well over 20 years and as you can imagine is very knowledgeable of this area. After a few questions, the mentees were paired up with their mentor and sent out to capture the all too elusive wild



trout on the San Gabriel River. Within the first 15 minutes, we were alerted that the first catch of the day was made by Greg Madrigal. As I continued my stroll up and down the river to see how the mentees were doing, I could see the gleam in the mentees eyes. Mentors were very attentive to their mentees, taking time to methodically explain technique and equipment.

Pyramid Lake NV April 16th to 18th

In what has become an annual event, this year's Pyramid Lake outing will be Sunday-Monday, April 17th & 18th. After consulting with Rob Anderson from the Reno Fly Shop (now closed) we decided to make it a Sunday-Monday outing in an attempt to miss the bulk of the weekend crowd which usually clears out by Sunday afternoon.

If you have never done this trip before you are missing out on a chance to catch what may be the biggest trout of you life. The lake's native Lahontan Cutthroats *average* 3-5 pounds, with many fish pushing 10 pounds or more. If you are new to fly fishing the techniques are simple and easy to learn. We normally fish from ladders placed in the water at the proper distance from shore. There usually is nothing around you, but water. There is nothing to interfere with a back cast and nothing on the bottom to snag. You do not need to be a long distance caster as fish are sometimes hooked right at you feet.

Equipment that is appropriate for both kinds of fishing is usually two rods. A 5-6 weight rod with floating line for indicator fishing and a 7-8 weight rod for streamer fishing (a Rio DC 24ft. 250 to 300gr. line is perfect). I will provide a more extensive list of what to bring that includes equipment, lines, flies, leaders, tippet and clothing in an upcoming e-mail.



Daytime temperature will likely be around 50 degrees F. This is a very variable temperature as we have experienced 30-75 degree temperatures in past years. I am expecting (hoping for!) good weather as Punxsutawney Phil has predicted an early spring this year!

You make your own travel arrangements to Reno, fly or drive. It is best to arrive by Saturday (Friday if fishing on Saturday) to check in with our guide/host **Rob Anderson** (775-742-1754) **AND myself Jim Wright** (714-679-6638). I will be staying at the **Silver Legacy Resort** (1-800-687-8733) in downtown Reno. Others have stayed the **Atlantis Casino** (800-723-6500). Rob will be providing breakfast and lunch on Sunday and Monday, as well as step ladders to fish from. Cost of the trip is \$160 per person for both days of fishing. If you would like to join Rob and myself for a half day of guided fishing on Saturday the cost is a \$50 donation paid directly to the Club through me. I will e-mail a list of all attendees so you can communicate as to carpools, car rentals and lodging.

This will be the fourth time for this trip. Past participants have had a great time, excellent fishing and good food. This time we will be going a little later

in the season. There has been great fishing this time of year for the past 2 years. We are reducing the group size due to availability of lodging at the Big Trout Ranch and are adding a second week to accommodate the same number of people as before.

4 guided days fishing with a partner, including flies 2 days open for fishing at Big Trout Ranch, an unguided fishing location of your choice, local sightseeing or just relaxing (additional guided days available at extra cost)

Monache Meadow August 19 - 21, 2011

Monache Meadow is a beautiful Sierra Nevada meadow at the 8000 foot level. The South Fork of the Kern River runs thru the meadow and there are fishing opportunities for both Golden and Brown Trout. Again this year the club is planning a trek there. This is a camping outing with nearest gas or hotel over two hours away. The fishing is mainly dry fly fishing in a open meadow or up river through a lightly forested area allowing easy access and casting. Experience has shown that fishing can be at its best early in the season and the plan is to make the trip as soon as the snow melts and the road is opened. The date for the trip is tentatively set for the weekend of June 4-7; it will be a Friday- Monday trip assuming good weather and the gate being open. Access to the Meadow is over a mild jeep trail, it requires a 4-wheel drive vehicle with moderate ground clearance. We're looking for club members willing to drive and take a couple of others with them. This is an excellent outing for beginners as it is not uncommon to have 30-fish days. This

year the fishing should be excellent early season due to the amount of snow.

FLIES THAT KEEP ON GIVING

While on a recent trip to Davis Lake, Shane Chung was waist deep in slippery bottom waters and was looking for a place to land. Shane is a water dog who gets all wet but manages to catch his share of fish. You just don't want to be around him when he shakes off all the water. While out there he hooking several fish. Here is what he was using as a fly.

Shane's Sparkle Midge



Hook: Daiichi 1530 8-16

Bead: Copper 1/8"
Thread: 8/0 Black
Wire: Fine Copper

Body: Bright Green Crystal Flash

Place the bead on the hook small hole of the bead first.

Wrap the thread from the eye to the bend while tying in the wire.

Tie in the crystal flash at the bend and wrap the thread forward to the bead.

Wrap the crystal flash forward to the bead and tie off and cut excess crystal flash at bead.

Counter wrap wire forward to the bead and wrap several times and whip finish.

Head cement the wraps and head to Davis Lake.

FLY TYING CLASSES

Fly Fishing Club of Orange County - 2011

The Fly Fishing Club of Orange County is offering to its members a variety of fly tying classes. Are you tired of going to the fly shop to purchase flies every time you go fishing? Do you ever want to buy a "special" fly that works miracles on rivers only to find that fly shops don't offer that fly

For the beginners class you will learn how to handle various feathers, hair, synthetics and hackles as well as learning how to spot good/bad materials. Proportions, size and color will also be on the agenda. You will be learning approximately one fly a night. This will give you the opportunity to tie the same fly several times.

For the intermediate and advanced class, there is going to be a series of flies I'm calling "Flies You Don't Want To Pay \$2 For." There are about a dozen of these flies. They tend to be small (usually between a size 16 and size 22) and are very easy and quick to tie. The flies in this series tend to be some of the most effective flies because they simulate the natural insect found in the fish diet.

There will also be a three fly set up that is a natural for the Kern River. The flies are a size 22 PMD emerger, a size 16 Caddis Nymph and a size 14 Stimulator.

Among the other flies that we are looking at tying is the M&M Caddis, a Kern River Royal Flush, a POP fly (Pheasant Tail - Ostrich - Peacock) that works anywhere, a Bead Head Pheasant Tail Flashback, a Shop Vac, a size 22 Trico (the dry fly variety) and some woven flies. If we get through these flies, we might look at some saltwater Deceivers and Clousers.

FLY FISHING LAGUNA NIGUEL LAKE

DATE: February 26, 2011 TIME: Lake opens at 6:00 a.m.

DIRECTIONS: Go south on 5 Freeway until you reach La Paz exit. Take that exit west and drive about 4 miles toward the ocean until you reach Laguna Niguel Park on the right. There is a fee to enter the lake; pay at the guard stand. As you leave guard stand, take two left hand turns and drive up the hill toward the lake. Park in the parking lot and go into the concession stand to purchase your daily fishing pass. The cost is \$20 to fish the lake. The cost to launch and fish from a float tube or pontoon boat is \$35. Boat rentals are available at \$10 per hour or \$25 for five hours. The best place to launch a float tube is about ½ mile down the road at a smaller parking area on right side of road. There is also a portable toilet there. Just down the hill is the old launch ramp where you will launch your float tube.

EQUIPMENT:

MIDGE FISHING

Floating line

9 foot tapered leader-4x

Indicator (small foam)

4x or 5x fluoro tippet

Small split shot (above your flies)

STREAMER FISHING

Type 3 intermediate sink

straight 3x or 4x fluoro tippet 6-9 feet

FLIES for midge fishing (you can buy at Marriott's; ones made by Sierra Drifters are best.

Sizes in 16 to 18; it is important to have flies with bead heads and dubbed heads. Bead heads can be black, gold or silver.

Black body with black bead (tuft of white at head to simulate gills)

Black with silver wire

Black with copper wire

Black with red wire

Olive with gold wire

Gray with gold or black wire

Sold red and red with gold wire

Flies for streamer fishing: Wholly buggers in especially black or olive; Muddler Minnows; Hornbugs; Nymphs as trailers such as copper johns or prince nymph.


SETUP FOR MIDGING:

- 1. At end of your leader (nine foot 4x tapered leader), tie on about 2-3 feet of 4x fluoro tippet with triple surgeons knot. Tie another 10-12 inches of fluoro tippet (4x) with tripple surgeons knot.
- 2. Slide on foam indicator with peg.
- 3. Tie on first fly to end of tippet.
- 4. Attach another piece of fluoro tippet (5x) 10-12 inches to bend of first fly.
- 5. Tie on second fly.
- 6. Pinch on small split shot above knot from main line to first fly.
- 7. When you set up at a spot to fish, attach your forceps or other device to end of bottom fly and drop to bottom. Grab your line and slide your indicator until it is 4-8 inches below surface of water. Remove your forceps or other weighted object and you are ready to make first cast. With this setting your fly will be 4-8 (starting depth) inches off bottom. In the morning it is usually better to start with bottom fly close to bottom (4-6) inches. It is important to find the depth at which fish are holding. Usually close to bottom early in the morning and as midge hatch begins and progresses, fish can move up in water column.

Midgers: it is important to bring and set up with an anchor. Bites at Laguna Niguel can be aggressive but are usually VERY SOFT.

Tejon Ranch Little Lake Saturday May 14th 2011

Little Tejon Lake is located on sprawling Tejon Ranch just over the grapevine (all the way down the other side) and is home to medium sized largemouth bass and bluegill. While the lake can be fished from shore, it fishes best from the water in a float tube, pontoon boat, kayak or canoe. The best fishing is usually early and late, so fishing until dark can be productive. There will be a portapotty at the lake but otherwise you will need to be self contained

Equipment: While there are many bass specific fly rods, leaders and flies, you can get by with your equipment for trout, especially if you fish stillwaters. A 5 or 6 weight rod will handle all but the largest bass bugs, and for those flies, a 7 or 8 weight rod is necessary. If the bass are in the shallows, you can use a floating line, a sink-tip line or full sinking line from type I to type HI. If the bass are out in deeper water you will need type III or heavier and on those occasions when bass are hiding out in deep water 20-30 feet, you will need 250-350 grain shooting head line (usually in the warmer months). A sink -tip line can be used to get flies down deeper than a floating line and can add diving/rising action to a bug

Leaders: Leader length is generally tapered 6 to 10 feet for floating presentations and straight or tapered 3 to 6 feet for sinking/sink-tip presentations. Leader/tippet size generally runs from 8-15 #.

Flies: You will want a couple surface oriented flies such as poppers (concave head that "pops" when twitched) or sliders (beveled head that "dives" when twitched) made from eight soft foam, a hard body, or deer hair. Go with the smaller sizes for this lake (size 6-10) since the bluegill surface bite is often as prevalent as the bass bite. Most of fishing will be subsurface and standard clousers and whooly buggers work well as do leech patters (the Hale-Bobb Leech is a favorite here), and anything that looks like a worm (sizes 10-14). The Hornburg (size 12) seems to work will in the shallows. The more traditional black, purple, olive, and borwn/cinnamon colors work well. Bass also frequently like bright colors such as chartreuse or orange. Having weed guards on a flew flies can be handy when fishing weeds or trees/logs. Please consider debarbing hooks as lake is catch and release only

Strategy: Unlike trout which cruise around the lake looking for food, bass generally stake out a location and ambush their prey. Look for any structure you can find such as trees, stick ups (dead trees), drop-offs, rip-rap, weeds, fallen logs and rocks. This time of year (May) there are 3 easily identifiable areas with trees in the water: 1. right end of the dam which is to the left of our launch area, 2. far right corner of the lake viewed from launch area and 3. cove to the right of the launch. There are a few stick-ups hi the right corner. Drop offs are suble. The dam has rip-rap but falls off sharply. The shore where we launch has weeds. There are minimal rocks and logs at this lake.


Early/late hi the day: Throw your surface bug hi any of the above spots and let it sit. And then let it sit some more. When you can't stand it anymore, give it a twitch and wait. Repeat.

Midday: Hopefully the bass have moved in close to start spawning. If so during midday, the best approach is to position yourself slightly offshore and cast back to shore hi the shallower areas with a very slow retrieve (floating, sink-tip or full sink lines all work). Work you way around the shore. Generally the slower the better as bass don't like to chase things but rather they ambush them. For bluegills since they love structure, try close to the trees.

Suggested Items to Bring: Chair, Small table, Water bottles, extra water, ,drinks/cooler, Food for lunch and dinner if staying later, Sunscreen, Hat/sun gloves, Sunscreen, Rods: 5, 6 or 7 (8) for bass and 4 or 5 for bluegill, Lines: Floating, Intermediate, Sink Tip, Full sink (type 3-5) and/or shooting head 25-350 grain, Leaders/Tippet (8-15#), Split shot,Spiders Float tube/Pontoon Boat/ Kayak, Canoe..

Flies: Poppers/sliders insize 6-10, Leech pattern hi size 10-14 (Hale-Bopp Leach, Mo-Hair, Marabou)\ in black, purple, olive, Small clousers (including chartreuse), Whooly buggers, Worm type flies, Small bait fish type flies, Hornburgs, Spiders
