

MATCHING THE HATCH IN TWO MINUTES

with **PETER STITCHER**

The phrase "matching the hatch" is frequently tossed out to beginner fly anglers as though it were a simple and obvious process. Too often it conjures up memories of tedious entomology classes in school or at fly fishing trade shows. While many of us have grasped the basics of the aquatic insect's journey from nymph to flying creature, the subtleties are harder to grasp.

On the river we can waste a lot of time fishing emergers before their time or overstaying our welcome bouncing a nymph along the bottom. Then there is the frustration of placing what appears to be a perfect imitation of a natural by a rising fish, only to be shunned and rejected. Faced with an almost infinite fly choice of pattern, size, color the odds of getting it right are stacked against the average angler. That is before we stray farther from our home waters and, in the absence of a guide, try to crack the code of a new river. Then we need hard information or a proven system to give clues to the trout's menu. Reducing the variables by using tested techniques will make the difference between a great fishing day or just more casting practice on the water. Who better to turn to than an aquatic biologist who runs a successful fly-tying company? Such a person is our February presenter Peter Stitcher.

A self-described "Fly Fishing Geek" Peter will guide us through the P.A.U.S.E. method of matching the hatch, highlighting the 5 areas where the day's menu is written on and

around the river. Then, using the observation made on the water, the angler will learn how to prioritize that information and *M.A.T.C.H.* the samples to the best fly patterns. Finally, we will discuss how to utilize water temperature and the standard hatch chart to anticipate which fly patterns should be active on our target water year-round.

Peter Stitcher is an aquatic biologist and the CFG (Chief Fly Geek) at *Ascent Fly Fishing* and *River Oracle Inc.* As a biologist, Peter works in the assessment, restoration, and management of trophy trout waters across the Western US.

Approaching the sport of fly fishing through the lens of a biologist, Peter strives to break down the sciences of entomology, fish feeding behavior, fish vision, and habitat use to help the fly angler think like a fish, and fish like a pro. Peter writes the *Bug Bites* column in *High Country Angler* magazine, was the feature of the Denver Channel 9 News piece *Catching Colorado* and can be seen teaching at the fly fishing expos and clubs around the country.

Founded by Peter Stitcher, Ascent Fly Fishing strives to provide a **fish-eye-view** of the hatch and knowledge on how best to fish it. With every tie and every fly box packed, the goal is to answer the universal questions of the fly angler:

- 1. HOW DO I MATCH THE HATCH?
- 2. WHICH FLIES SHOULD I USE?
- 3. WHEN DO I FISH EACH PATTERN?

While building trophy trout water and restoring rivers across the US, Peter would regularly be sampling invertebrates to assess the health of a fishery and to determine what needed to be done to grow larger, more vigorous trout. Based on this experience, an exhaustive invertebrate database (really big list of bugs!), and a fly catalog of more than 200,000 flies, we are now putting that science to work for fly fishermen and women across the globe!

No longer is success on the water the exclusive privilege of fishing guides and the inner circle of the fishing elite! Done are the days of fishing blind on the river, ignorant of which pattern to tie on!

We had, quite frankly, a sensational day of fishing and to put it bluntly, mostly catching. Thanks Doug, see you in February.



Ray, as a young boy, fished with his father whenever possible, since Ray's father was in the military. He relished his time spent fishing with his Dad.



Spring is just around the corner and we are planning another fantastic outing to the San Juan River in New Mexico. The clear river waters of the San Juan are the jewel of northwest New Mexico just a short 14 hour's drive from Southern California. The river is fed from the deep waters of Navajo Lake which provide nearly constant temperature and abundant food supplies. This means many large brown and rainbow trout with substantial fight.

I have made a block reservation at the Fisheads San Juan River Lodge for rooms and Guides [http://www.fisheadsofthesanjuan.com/]. Please contact me if you wish to attend this outing so I can assign rooms and fishing buddies. If you prefer to make your own arrangements, please feel free to do so.

Please Note: the Abe's Motel, Restaurant and Gas Station have permanently closed. It is up for sale and NOT operating at this time.

COVID Pandemic restrictions have severely limited food options. Many restaurants have very restrictive access and dining options. The Fisheads Backcast Café is open for dinner, but you need to make advance reservations which can be done on a daily basis. Most other dining options are 45 minutes away in Farmington, NM.

Plan to arrive by Sunday, April 3. The general plan is to fish with guides Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, April 4 to 6. I strongly recommend you get a guide for at least two days to thoroughly enjoy all the fishing the San Juan Quality Water has to offer.


This is an on the water clinic. Fishing out of a float tube in stillwater can be very intimidating, let me show you all of the ins and outs of being successful fishing from a float tube. I will teach you proper setup for your float tube before you even go into the water. How to properly set up and anchor your float tube or water craft to be successful in keeping your fly at the proper depths at all times. How to properly position your water craft depending on what food times you are trying to present. How to read the water conditions, structure, habitat weather! How to use different fly lines, floating, hover, clear intermediate and sinking lines and how to find the fish at each level of the water column.

Knowing you have fooled these advanced degreed fish is a feather in your cap and should be celebrated. Hot Creek is next to the Mammoth Airport and is a place to relax and enjoy the location with cabins complete with comfortable accommodations and complete kitchens, the front porch is known to bring friends together as the sun falls behind the Sierra's. Our club has been booking the cabins at the ranch from the seventies and booking the entire ranch since the mid eighties. We have earned the respect of the ranch for a well managed group of friends and respectful of the ranch rules. There are nine cabins that fill every year on the four-day stay we book in July as a perpetual reservation. We are one of the few groups that have this opportunity because of our steadfast commitment when fishing was slow we showed our commitment to support this most special location, other groups have lost this privilege. Summer day can be hot and the nights cold, we have spectacular lightning shows and rain that has kept us on the porches in awe. Fly Fishing Southern Utah

September 26-30, 2022

The area of Southern Utah we are going has four mountains that surround it and has numerous lakes and streams.

I have fished the area in the spring, summer, and fall; I have found the most productive time is in the fall

Where We Are Going:

Loa Utah Home of the **Quiet Fly Fisher** and is located in a beautiful valley at 7064" elevation, which hosts a few small towns like Loa, Lyman, Bicknell and Torrey. This is farming and livestock country and is surrounded by mountain ranges of which we will be fishing. There are National Parks near by that offer spectacular scenery, Bryce Canyon to the South West and Capitol Reef to the East, Fish Lake National Forest to the North West along with Boulder Mountain with an elevation of 11,317 which provides many fishing locations, and spectacular views.

Guide Contact Information:

Our head guide in **Loa, Utah is Mike James** owner of the **Quiet Fly Fisher** their address is 200 N. Main Street Loa, Utah 84747 Contact Phone Number is 435-616-2319.

Weather & Clothing:

We will be lodging at approx. 7,000' elevation. Nights are cold and days are warm usually, I have experienced rain, snow, hail, and hot and cold days. Bring clothing you can put on in layers that wick moisture, nothing more uncomfortable than moisture under your clothing, which either keeps you hot and sweaty or cold and sweaty. Bring a lightweight rain jacket. Most days you will be wearing your waders but on hot day I wet wade with light shirt nylon pants and my wading boots

on, don't forget the neoprene booties if wet wading. Be flexible, bring both cold and warm weather gear and adjust as needed. Weather at high altitude can change rapidly be prepared. The weather will not stop your guide from fishing unless it is dangerous and or access is limited. They will advise if there is a problem. Mother nature sets the parameters we must always be aware of our surroundings and climate.

Lodging:

There are many options in the region of Loa, Utah both in town and adjoining hamlets like Lyman and Bicknell. I would suggest The Mill Cabins 1500 S. HWY 24 Lyman, Utah (435) 491-0426 as a wonderful place with individual cabins that can sleep two and are very reasonably priced, **Bruce & Dana Chappell** are the owners. In Loa the Snuggle Inn is pricy but luxurious by small town standards. In Bicknell the Sunglow Motel and Restaurant is comfortable and reasonably priced. Lodging in these areas can be limited so make your lodging reservation early; I do not take responsibility for making anyone's lodging reservations due to last minute cancelations and family emergencies. I recommend you book you're lodging early, as lodging will be harder to fine closer to the trip dates. Many travelers hit the road after school is in session and before winter.

Physical Demands:

Where we are lodging at 6500' to 7,000' elevation we can be fishing and hiking at as high as 11,000'. If you have problems at altitude let the guide and streamkeeper know in advance of our trip. Most fishing locations involve some hiking and wading. I would suggest arriving a couple of days early to acclimate to 7,000' not hiking hard and drinking plenty of water, it easy to dehydrate in higher elevations, the guide has water and soft drinks along in their vehicles so ask for the water.

Gear:

Rods & Lines, the entire trip can be done with a 9-foot 5-weight rod and a floating line and a sinking line, one rod is all you need.

Waders, good pair of breathable waders is required in most situations.

Boots, wading boots are part of the package. No restrictions on felt as yet.

Wading Staff, Many of us find having a wading staff necessary for stability in slippery or rocky situations, or just find a long stick, don't fall, the rocks are unforgiving.

Terminal Tackle, I use a 9 foot 5x leader and have along 2,3,4,5,6x tippet. I as well bring an assortment of lead free shot to use as needed if nymphing.

Flies, We will be fishing many lakes and a few streams and possibly a couple of rivers. I carry dries, nymphs and streamers but the guide will provide you with flies. If the guide suggests a fly or gives you a fly use it with the full understanding you will catch fish, they are quite experienced on these waters. If you are like me I bring many more flies than I will ever use. I have hoppers, caddis, mayflies, and damselflies in adult and nymph stages. I find a callibaetis mayfly nymph very useful in the lakes. Bring what you own and the fly shop offers all the working patterns you will be using if you want to purchase some.

First Aid Kit: I carry a basic first aid kit in my tote bag for simple emergencies, minor cuts and abrasions.

OUTINGS (Loa, UT - Con't)

Transportation:

From L.A. Southern California is a 9 1/2-hour drive including gas stops and a lunch stop to Loa, Utah. Sharing a ride is more fun to get to know you friend or partner better and listen to each other experiences along the way. When in Loa the guides provide the transportation to and from the days fishing locations. Salt Lake City is approximately 3 hours away from Loa and is serviced by many airlines and rental car companies.

Float Tubing:

There will be opportunities to float tube in the area if you so desire. The Quiet Fly Fisher in Loa can provide you with a float tube if they are guiding you. If you wish the comfort of your own float tube please feel free to bring yours.

Food:

In Utah many of their dinning locations close on Sunday, it is best to call ahead or ask you guide where and what is open, most areas have a couple options on Sunday but it is best to inquire. Guides provide lunch during the days guiding. Many of us BBQ at the Mill Cabins for dinner, to curb the costs of eating out every meal, the grocery in the town of Loa is open Mon.- Sat. Breakfast is your choice of eating at a local restaurant or at your lodging, the guide provides lunch the days you are fishing.

Libations:

You are responsible for any liquor you wish to purchase either bought from the local Liquor store in Bicknell or for beer (3.2) in some of the gas stations, or bring from home. BYOB.

Costs and Payment:

A deposit of \$200 Non Refundable is sent to John Williams 19429 Kamden Court, Sedro Woolley Washington 98284 to hold your spot then forwarded to the guide. The total cost of the trip is \$1,125 for five days of guiding. The staff of the Quiet Fly Fisher of Loa Utah will guide us.

Tipping:

It is customary to tip the guide daily; I tip \$50 per day of guiding at the end of the day. Tipping is not based on your ability or the number of fish caught, but for good service and the ability of the guide to lead you doing everything in their ability to make the experience enjoyable. Fish are a bonus. I have negotiated quite reasonable rates for the group of six and feel a percentage tip is quite unfair to the guide considering the extreme road conditions, locations and wear and tear on their vehicles. These extreme road conditions keep most of your competition for fish away.

OUTINGS (Loa, UT - Con't)

Fishing License:

Utah state fishing license can be obtained on line prior to your trip, which is the easiest. Licenses can be purchased in Loa at the local store Monday through Saturday, closed Sunday. Yearly licenses last from the date you purchase them for a complete calendar year.

Emergency Services:

Bicknell near Lyman has a clinic available for minor emergencies.



Flies That Keep On Giving!

By John Williams

This is a fly I plan to fish and was recommended by a new friend and fellow fly fisherman. I was told it dominated his fishing in Montana and Idaho on still water. I am tying this on a stouter hook because I plan to target Pike with a stainless steel leader. If it works as I was told I will share that with you. He said this fly worked well on tigers, browns.

Black Mamba



Hook: TMC 600SP #2 3X Heavy, 3X Wide, 2X Short

Threads: UTC 140 Fluorescent Chartreuse

Weight: .030 Lead Free

Rib: UTC Large Chartreuse Wire

Under Tail: Yellow Crystal Flash

Wing: Black ¼" Rabbit Strip

Cement: Gel Formula Super Glue

Make ten to twelve wraps of lead free wire for weight and leave double eye space behind the eye. Start your thread just ahead of the lead free wire. Cut a piece of the chartreuse wire and tie it in just

ahead of the lead free wire and lay it over the lead free and tie it in well just behind the lead free with several wraps of thread. Cut approximately 10 strands of yellow crystal flash from the hank and tie in a tail a hook shanks length beyond the bend just behind the lead. Wrap the crystal flash free ends around the lead forward to the forward start of the lead and secure with a few wraps of thread, fold the long ends of the crystal flash over the back and secure with a few wraps of thread, cut to the same length as the tail. Select a strip of rabbit 1/4" straight cut and coax an opening in it so that the point end hangs two times the shank length beyond the bend of the hook. Secure with a wrap of counter wrapped wire. Wrap the wire forward through a couple more gaps between the fibers to the point behind the eye of the hook and secure with a few wraps of thread. Secure the rabbit just behind the eye with a few wraps of thread and cut the remainder free. Place a slight amount of super glue on the wraps and make several wraps of thread to form a head.
