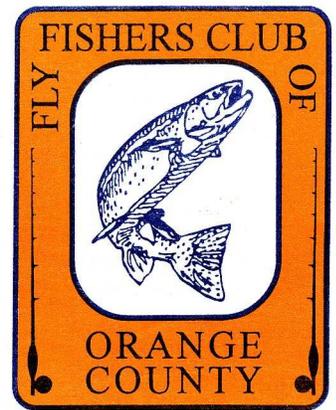

Streamer Tactics for Trophy Trout' with Kelly Galloup

Most fly fishers have heard that fishing with streamers can catch not only a lot of fish, but also the really big ones in whatever stream or river or lake you are on. Well, for our first presentation of the New Year, we will learn that this is not only true but also how to best use streamers wherever we want. We will be shown and taught in-depth and systematic approaches for this very effective means of fly fishing in a wide variety of situations. We will learn how to read the water, how to select the best colors and types of flies, the best line retrieves and wading versus driftboat tactics. After you have seen this program, streamer fishing will no longer be hard to understand, or complicated, or only for occasions when you can't figure out anything else to throw at fish.

Our guide for these valuable lessons is Kelly Galloup, who has been perfecting streamer fishing in all types of water for more than 30 years and who is considered one of the, if not the, foremost authority on streamer fishing in the country. Kelly has written two books *Modern Streamers for Trophy Trout* and *Cripples and Spinners*, and has numerous DVD's on tying and fishing. He has more than 50 recognized fly patterns that are sold worldwide and is also a rod designer for St. Croix and a line designer for Scientific Anglers.

Flies That Keep On Giving

The fisherman has to buy the fly and then use the fly to catch a fish. This is one in a series of flies I have been tying for use in Utah and other fun waters, As I said in last months article some fish like bright colors.

The Eye Catcher



Hook: Daiichi 1120 10-16

Bead: 7/64 Gold

Thread: UTC 70 Olive

Wire & Thread Abdomen: Ultra Wire Hot Yellow & Fl. Orange, Micro Tinsel Green, Holographic Lime Green Tinsel

Flashback: UTC Holographic Tinsel Fascia

Thorax: Peacock Hurl

Legs: Wood duck or Mallard Flank natural

Head Cement: Liquid Super Glue

First of all the wire and thread abdomen can be anything you like and usually consists of some contrast in colors such as the green and fluorescent orange wire or thread, it could be red yellow green and pink. I do like some holographic tinsel or thread in it for flash.

Place the bead on the hook small hole first. Start the thread at the bead and after securing wraps tie in the wire just behind the bead and wrap the thread over the wire all the way down the hook top to mid way of the bend. Run the thread to the bead and begin wrapping the wire blend 2/3 of the way forward toward the eye and tie off and cut the wire. Tie in the fascia holographic tinsel at the 2/3 point and let it lie to the rear. Collect three peacock hurl strands and trim the butts off, tie in at the 3/3 point and make several wraps then secure with a couple of wraps of thread. Pull 6-8 barbules from a wood duck flank feather and tie in on either side of the hook just behind the bead,. Fold the fuchsia flashback material over the back and secure with a couple of wraps and whip finish. Add drop of super glue to the thread and you're done. This is a very durable fly with some fish appeal. Just add water.

More Flies That Keep On Giving

Flies That Keep On Giving Part II

While researching flies that frequent the White River in Arkansas and talking to my friend and guide George Peters he mentioned the Sulfur's should be out and about. I know George loves to dry fly fish so I will play along and tie some, as you might realize by now, I love to nymph fish. What size is a question I forgot to ask so I'll tie 14's through 18's a half dozen of each. I use these in several sizes in different places.

Sulfur Mayfly

Hook: Daiichi 1110 #14-18

Thread: UTC 70 Lt. Yellow

Post: Para Post Wings White

Tail: Micro Fibbets White

Abdomen: Sulfur Waterproof dubbing

Thorax: Sulfur Waterproof dubbing

Legs: Cream or White Hackle to match size of hook

Head Cement: Super Glue Control Extra Time from Home Depot



Start the thread behind the eye and run the thread 1/3 of the way back from the eye and tie in a post by looping the wing material over the thread and pulling straight down with the thread. Make several wraps around the post parallel to the hook shank to form a solid base for the hackle later. Tie in just behind the post 4 or 5 micro fibbets letting the tips extend twice the hook shank length. Wrap the thread to the bend and take a wrap under the micro fibbets and slightly forward, this will flare the tails and lift them slightly, fish can't count so if you get six that is alright as well. Dub the abdomen with the sulfur dubbing and stop at the post the abdomen should taper getting larger near the post. Now strip about 1/8 inch off the hackle and place at the base of the hook and tie in just forward of the base of the post. Place the slightest drop of super glue at the base of the post to cover the fiber and the thread base of the post. Dub the thorax with sulfur dubbing and leave the thread at the base of the post. Wrap the hackle feather around the post three to four times and tie off around the base of the post not the hook shank carefully not to trap fibers with the thread. Another trick now add a slight amount of super glue to the base of the wraps of hackle from underneath the hackle fibers that touches the thread as well. Let stand a few seconds and cut your thread. There is no need to whip finish the thread the super glue has done it and left a clean fly without the hassle of keeping the hackle fibers from getting caught while whip finishing. **Remember use super glue sparingly it can mess up a perfectly good fly if you add too much.** Another tip, when cutting the hackle feather use the tips of the scissors parted slightly and push the where they need to be and pull the feather into the gap, that will cut the feather and not cut the fibers. Please fish responsibly it can become addicting.

FFCOC Winter Outing December 5-9, 2011 - Steelhead on the Trinity River, Lewiston, CA

In December 2011 ten fortunate Club members will travel to Lewiston, CA in search of Steelhead (sometimes called 'the fish of a thousand casts'). We will be the only guests at the Trinity River Adventure Inn, which is on the river about one hour northwest of Redding.

We will float the river with guides from The Fly Shop for three days and find our own spots on the river (or explore other activities in the Trinity Alps) other days. Fishing is available from the bank at the Inn.

The Inn and your guide will provide all meals while in Lewiston (bring your own adult beverages). The total cost will be about \$950 for four nights lodging, meals and three days of "all inclusive" guiding. If you provide your own gear and flies, the cost will be around \$875.00. The actual total depends on how many members participate.

PYRAMID LAKE OUTING

MARCH 10TH, 11TH & 12TH, 2012

In what has become an annual event, this year's Pyramid Lake outing will be Sunday-Monday, March 11th & 12th Saturday the 10th optional (see below). After consulting with Rob Anderson from the Reno Fly Shop (now closed) we decided to make it a Sunday-Monday outing in an attempt to miss the bulk of the weekend crowd which usually clears out by Sunday afternoon.

If you have never done this trip before you are missing out on a chance to catch what may be the biggest trout of you life. The lake's native Lahontan Cutthroats *average* 3-5 pounds, with many fish pushing 10 pounds or more. If you are new to fly fishing the techniques are simple and easy to learn. We normally fish from ladders placed in the water at the proper distance from shore. There usually is nothing around you, but water. There is nothing to interfere with a back cast and nothing on the bottom to snag. You do not need to be a long distance caster as fish are sometimes hooked right at you feet.

Equipment that is appropriate for both kinds of fishing is usually two rods. A 5-6 weight rod with floating line for indicator fishing and a 7-8-9 weight rod for streamer fishing (a Rio DC 24ft. 250 gr. line is perfect). I will provide a more extensive list of what to bring that includes equipment, lines, flies, leaders, tippet and clothing in an upcoming e-mail.

Daytime temperature will likely be around 50 degrees F. This is a very variable temperature as we have experienced 30-75 degree temperatures in past years

You make your own travel arrangements to Reno, fly or drive. It is best to arrive by Saturday (Friday if fishing on Saturday) to check in with our guide/host **Rob Anderson** (775-742-1754) AND myself **Jim Wright** (714-679-6638). I will be staying at the Silver Legacy Resort in downtown Reno. Others have stayed the **Atlantis Casino** (800-723-6500). Rob will be providing breakfast and lunch on Sunday and Monday, as well as step ladders to fish from. Cost of the trip is \$160 per person for both days of fishing. If you would like to join Rob and myself for a half day of guided fishing on Saturday the cost is a \$50 donation paid directly to the Club through me. I will e-mail a list of all attendees so you can communicate as to carpools, car rentals and lodging.

ROD RAFFLE - Update

The raffle for the **Winston BORON II-MX 9'0" 6wt Rod** remaining from the September Auction is underway and we have sold about ½ of the tickets we need to sale before the winning ticket is drawn. We will continue selling tickets during the January and February club meetings.



The rod, **valued at \$735**, is described on the Winston web site www.winstonrods.com as follows:

Winston's salt and freshwater Boron II-MX series. The MX stands for maximum, as in maximum power, distance, and fish fighting capabilities. The 4-, 5-, and 6-weights are slightly stiffer and faster than their Boron IIx counterparts; the 7- through 12-weights are true "cannons" that can handle sinking lines, big flies, and adverse wind conditions. While all eleven models feature faster actions and are capable of making long distance, 100+ foot casts, they will amaze you with their responsiveness and light weight. The rods come with a cork fighting butt and our new double locking reel seat. Whether you're chucking 6" long "grocery" flies or battling fly rod-humbling winds, a Boron II-MX will get the job done.

Specifically , in reference to the 6 weight, they add:

From streamer fishing for browns to battling monster pike, these 6-weights [9' and 9'6"] are up to the task. Great for summer steelhead, Atlantic salmon and schoolie stripers, too. Both rods can handle the large indicators and flesh files used in Alaska.

“TEACH THE TEACHERS” CASTING CLASSES IN FEBRUARY 2012

The FFF CCCIP (Certified Casting Instructor Program) with the help of Long Beach and Pasadena Casting Clubs, will present a series of two hour workshops designed to help local Club members teach beginning students in the basics of fly casting. Most Clubs offer an annual introductory casting class to attract newcomers to the sport, and these workshops will offer tips and techniques for that very important first fly casting lesson. The focus will be on teaching casting to beginners – they are not fly casting lessons. The workshops will be conducted by FFF Certified Instructors and will cover these areas.

- Teaching fly casting principles
- Teaching of the pick-up and lay down, roll cast and false casts
- Analysis and correction of common casting errors

Kelly started his fly fishing career at the age of 13, tying flies for the local tackle shop, The Tackle Box in Traverse City, Michigan. He started guiding at the age of 16 when he became a registered outfitter and took people fishing on the rivers around Traverse City such as the Manistee and the Boardman. He owned the Troutman Fly Shop in Northern Michigan for 20 years before selling it in 2000 and moving to Montana where he and his wife Penny bought the Slide Inn Lodge on the banks of the Madison River.

Kelly has a unique style of fishing big flies for big fish. He literally attacks the water casting tandem flies in a very aggressive and systematic way. He has been published in nearly every major fly fishing periodical in the country and is one of the Editors-at-Large for *Fly Fisherman* magazine as well as a host of *Fly Fish TV* on the Versus Television Network. In 2007 the national Federation of Fly Fishers (FFF) awarded Kelly their Charles E. Brooks Memorial Life Award, granting him lifetime membership in the FFF because of his many valuable contributions to the sport.
