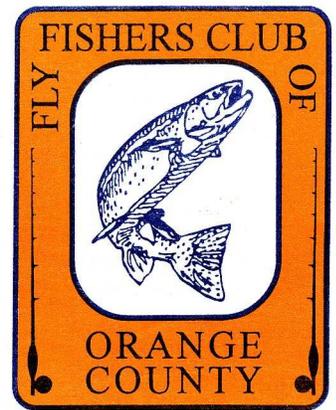

Fly Fishing Around Tahoe and Truckee with Brian Slusser

A great many southern Californians are not aware of the wonderful fishing opportunities in the eastern-north "notch" in the border of our golden state. There is the Truckee River, the Little Truckee River, Prosser Creek, Sagehan Creek and the North Yuba River. In addition to these lovely streams there is terrific fishing on reservoirs such as Boca, Prosser and Stampede. This entire area is easily accessible, lovely in its natural beauty and a perfect place to fish for the beginning or advanced fly fisher.

Our guide for the tour of these uncrowded and beautiful waters is Brian Slusser, who has been guiding fly fishers in the area for 15 years. He will show us what the streams, rivers and reservoirs look like, how to get to them, what techniques to use and what is being done to make them even better. This presentation is long overdue for our club, especially since the area is not that far away, is truly "pretty as a picture" and is perfect for anyone with a fly rod.

Brian's path to his current occupation is fascinating. Here's how he tells it:

It's hard not to develop a passion for the outdoors if you spend some of your childhood growing up in Alaska. I was born in Kirkland, Washington but spent the majority of my first 13 years in Alaska, living in Seward, Nome, and Valdez. My parents moved up to Alaska for work but my father, an avid

outdoorsman and pilot, introduced me to hunting and fishing during those years. Just about all of our free time was spent flying into remote areas to fish, hunt, or just have a look around. While in Nome, a coworker of my dad gave me a wolf-mix puppy to raise, which might be where I developed my interest in dogs and long cold winters.

My family left Alaska and relocated to Chelan, Washington where I finished secondary school. My dad and I continued hunting and fishing, pursuing upland birds and deer. We began to spend more time fly fishing. I completed the Ski Area Management Program at Wenatchee Valley College, then graduated with a BS in Business Administration and Marketing from Central Washington University in Ellensburg. I put myself through college by working on a Hotshot crew fighting forest fires during the summers throughout the western states and Alaska. Although the money was good, it severely cut into my summer recreational pursuits.

Throughout college I also worked at Mission Ridge Ski Resort as a ski patroller and avalanche forecaster. This led me to Alpine Meadows in Lake Tahoe, where I have been patrolling for the past 18 years. This is my sixth season as Assistant Patrol Manager where one of my duties is to run our Avalanche Rescue Dog Program, which I have been doing for the past five seasons. My dog, Shooter, and I are also on the Placer County Sheriff's Avalanche Rescue Dog Team. And, yes, I do shoot a Howitzer for avalanche control.

Not long after moving to California, I stopped fighting fires in the summer and started focusing on fly fishing again. After a few years of exploring the waters of the eastern Sierra, I launched Four Seasons Fly Fishing in 1997. Based in Truckee, I guide the rivers, lakes, and streams of the north Tahoe area. In 2000 I expanded my range of guiding to include steelhead fly fishing trips on the Rogue River in southern Oregon and the Upper Klamath in California. I enjoy guiding and instructing single and, if a fly fisher is interested, two-hand rod techniques.

I appreciated the time I spent collecting pictures of the area for my presentation. I will also be showing and explaining an effective nymphing technique and how to build a simple, but deadly, nymphing leader. I will end the program by giving suggestions and showing how to get there and where to stay. I look forward to meeting you all and sharing the wonderful spots where I guide.

This is a program you don't want to miss. See you at the meeting.... and remember to pursue your fly fishing dreams!

Mark died of a pulmonary embolism while living in Aspen Colorado; he was surrounded by family and friends when he passed peacefully. Mark spent many hours fishing the Roaring Fork and the Frying Pan rivers so close to where he lived. He is well known by many long time members of our club. Mark acted as our programs chairman for over twenty years and so began a friendship with noted speakers from all over. He brought Lefty Kreh, Mike Lawson, Jack Dennis, Doug Swisher, Dave Whitlock and countless others to both entertain and educate our membership. While on the board as he added a good business sense to our board with a business MBA. Mark didn't just talk a good story, he got involved. Mark was named a life member of the FFCOC in appreciation of his long time help on the board of directors but also his giving our club a reputation for having the best speakers program bar none. The Fly Fishers will be making a donation in his name to the wounded warriors program he supported generously. I will always remember a fun loving happy to be around friend who loved fly fishing and tried his best to promote the sport and protect it. After Mark moved to Colorado we stayed in touch through e-mail and the last one I received was a picture of Mark holding a very large rainbow he had caught, I responded nice fish, who caught it? I never heard a response but I know he was very proud of his catch.

On A funnier note; Mark was stopped while driving in Utah by an officer with several of us in a van for speeding, Mark explained he was sorry and it wouldn't happen again. The officer saw we were headed on a fishing trip and asked where we were headed and Mark said to the Green River, The officer reminded Mark to keep it under the speed limit and

Flies That Keep On Giving

Our March Speaker 2012 will be Mike James & Scott Peterson Guides from Southern Utah, Their program is called Utah Magic, I feel this way about Southern Utah. Mike is the owner of The Quiet Fly Fisher located in Loa. I have had the pleasure to fish many times with Mike and once with Scott, all have been rewarding and educational.

On my last trip to the area Mike was ill and he substituted Scott who more than filled the bill with some nice sized fish from a trophy pond and a trip to a small stream that produced some very nice fish. The most effective fly in my



arsenal was this damsel fly nymph, not much work to tie but very effective with several small twitches as the large fish approached I was rewarded.

Olive Damsel Nymph

Hook: 2220 Daiichi size #14

Thread: UTC 70 Black

Eyes: Bead Chain Black

Rib: Fine Gold Wire

Tail & Abdomen: Olive Blood Marabou

Thorax Back: Pheasant Tail Fibers

Legs: Wood duck Fibers

Thorax Under: Peacock Fibers

Start your thread two eye spaces behind the eye! Tie in the chain eyes at that point and figure eight over and under the eyes to secure them well, a small touch of super glue to the thread wraps will secure them for good. Run your thread to the bend and as you do tie in the gold wire rib. Select a small clump of Olive Marabou and tie them in at the bend leaving the look shank length extending as the tail. Run your thread forward to the 2/3 forward position. Holding the butt ends of the marabou wrap them forward to the 2/3 forward position and tie off. Counter wrap the gold wire forward to the 2/3 point both securing and forming ribs. Tie in a small bunch of pheasant tail fibers by the butts and let the tips extend to the rear. Tie in three peacock fibers and wrap a thorax to the eyes. Tie in six wood duck fibers as legs and let them extend to just beyond the bend of the hook. Fold the pheasant tail fibers forward over the eyes and secure with several wraps of thread and whip finish. Add a small drop of super glue to the thread and head to Southern Utah for a great time. **Mike**

FOUR CLUB OUTING SAN DIEGO BAY

Saturday, January 28th, there is a four club outing scheduled and being hosted by San Diego Fly Fishing Club. Outing Info:

The Mentoring Outing is a great way for new members to learn the basics of fly fishing as well as to get to know other club members. In this outing we pair up seasoned Fly Fisherman with the newer Fly Fisherman to fish the West Fork of the San Gabriel River. We will also have three guests from the West Fork San Gabriel River Conservancy to put on a few workshops on entomology, flies and equipment all geared towards fishing the San Gabriel Rivers. These gentlemen know these rivers intimately and have fished this particular river for most of their lives.

Here is the plan; we will meet at the West Fork Parking lot at 8am. This is the parking lot just past the West Fork Bridge. We will then carpool down the service road to Glen Camp (7 miles). You will need an Adventure pass if you will be leaving your car there. We cannot take all the cars. Please remember, once you are with us the only way you can leave early is to hike back the 7 miles. We will break into small groups for the workshops. After the workshops, you will be sent off with your Mentor to fish for about an hour and a half, then lunch and fishing after.

SURF OUTING- FEB 11, HUNTINGTON BEACH

Meet up at the south end of parking lot at Huntington State Beach at 2:00pm, enter at Magnolia and proceed to the southern most parking lot (the cement lot closest to the Santa Ana River), bring waders, stripping basket, rod in the 7-9 wt range with sinking line 9 or 300g(shooting taper or intergrated line). Flies such as Croaker Candy, small clousers, rubber legged Foxee red clouser and Crazy Charlie type flies. Leaders should be within 5-8 pound tippet range. And if it's raining, don't bother! Kids Academy

Like many of you, I grew up on the San Gabriel River West Fork. On weekends my father would take the entire family to fish and picnic along the river. Over the decades I've seen the changes Mother Nature carved out in the canyon. In the 60's, floods ripped nearly every tree from their footings along the river's edge to massive landslides where hundreds of millions of tons of rock slipped from the side of the mountain (right where the West Fork flows under the West Fork Bridge). In both cases the visual picture left in my mind was the aftermath of a nuclear blast. With time, Mother Nature and the National Forest Service have healed the canyon. The rockslide was removed, a new bridge was built and the trees grew back.

Today the first mile of river faces a whole new set of challenges that neither Mother Nature nor the National Forest Service can succeed at alone. Every weekend the river is over taxed with too many people, hundreds of pounds of trash left behind and graffiti on anything that doesn't move. We've all seen it and can remember when this stretch of river was as Mother Nature had intended it to be.



As the Conservation Chairperson I was tasked with identifying a long term project that could be supported by the Orange County Fly Fishers Club. I knew that it would have to address local waters and touch the hearts of everyone involved. Melinda and I went through the Conservation Websites and found a newly formed conservation group called West Fork San Gabriel River Conservancy. In August 2011 Melinda and I joined the Conservancy and quickly felt the compassion and the commitment each member has for healing the river. Within four months Melinda and I were asked to become board members. Melinda accepted the position of Secretary and I am the acting Vice President. Both of us have committed

to taking several Sunday's out of each month for cleaning the river's edges, removing dams created by the visitors, patrolling the eight mile stretch of river, recording the health of the water through PH testing, documenting the water temperature, identifying bug types, as well as working with the National Forest Service to build strong relationships. As part of our education efforts we staff an information booth to answer question from anglers that are new to the canyon and we host a Kid's Academy designed to introduce young children into the world of fly fishing.

We have all attended various classes and training sessions sponsored by the Forest Service. Recently we attended a presentation titled "Leave No Trace". The training was designed to help us interact with the visitors in a non-threatening way while educating them on the importance of depositing their trash in the bear proof trash cans. This month the Conservancy was approved to begin graffiti removal along Hwy 39 including the West Fork.

As with any non-profit organization funding is always at the top of our discussions. The Fly Fishers Club of Orange County board has agreed to contribute funds in support of the West Fork San Gabriel River Conservancy. I have also received contributions from Club Members who support our efforts but are not able physically able to get involved.

It is Melinda's and my hope that our involvement in the West Fork San Gabriel River Conservancy representing the Fly Fishers Club of Orange County will make a difference. If you want to know more about the Conservancy please visit the website at:
