

Flies That Keep On Giving

By John Williams

Again I find myself with a decision of what to throw to those big trout that seem to evade me on occasion. This was a recommendation from a friend who has caught several in the size range twenty and above. This is an Orvis pattern.

Twenty Incher



Hook: #10 Nymph Hook (standard Length)

Thread: 6/0 Tan

Bead: 1/8" Gold Tungsten

Tail & Legs: Small Brown Round Rubber legs

Rib: Amber Medium wire

Abdomen: Peacock Herl

Thorax: Sparkle Hares Ear Dubbing

Wing case: Turkey Feather

Slide the bead on the hook small side hole first. Start the thread at the eye and trap the Amber rib wire as you run the thread to the top of the bend. Tie in a piece of Rubber Leg material at the bend and fold in half and secure with a few wraps of thread. Tie in three strands of peacock Herl and wrap forward to the ½ point forward. Counter wrap the wire over the peacock to trap and form a rib. Tie in the Turkey feather piece and let it lie to the rear for now. Tie in the legs a piece on either side of the shank at the 2/3 forward point. Dib the Thorax with Sparkle hares ear dubbing. Fold the Turkey feather piece over the dubbed thorax and tin in just behind the bead. Whip finish and apply head cement to the wing case and just behind the bead at the tie off point.

Head to the dark deep water your afraid to loose a fly in.

Fishing with George Peters, Arkansas 2012 By John williams

At last years auction we purchased a trip to fish with George Peters a long time friend and club member who relocated to Cotter Arkansas with his wife Sharon and are the owners of Roundhouse Shoals, a lodge and guide service. Joe Wheat and I only had a few days available and George suggested May should be a wonderful time to visit and catch some fish, so off we went after tying more flies than I needed. We arrived in Springfield Missouri and were met by George at the airport which is not the norm, Thank You George.

Upon arrival to Cotter Arkansas George took us on a tour of the local fishing spots and historic sites then we headed to a nice dinner and then to the lodge for a good nights sleep, The Lodge, a comfortable old building circa1905 that was The Bank Hotel and has been refurbished by George and Sharon. There is sleeping for twelve and big screen T.V., two bathrooms, complete kitchen and very roomy. George said be ready around 8:00 a.m. and we were set for a day of fishing the Whit River. George is outfitted with a boat to drift but we preferred to wade.

George has some power in the area; he managed to have the power generation shut off at two dams so we could have some great fishing, just kidding, by sheer luck the dam flow for generation of electricity was shut off and by natural seepage around the dam it crated a great small river of what can be a massive flow of water. Being a tail water fishery helps with a healthy population of bows, browns. Let's set the story straight now George likes to dry fly fish almost at all costs, I will do anything necessary and Joe as well to hook fish.

Joe was the first to hook a fish and the day was off to a great start, I was not hooking anything so I moved down the river a bit and managed to hook a small one, we then moved about seventy yards down river below a couple who were hooked up all the time, then the fishing got fun we landed several each. That afternoon we fished farther down river with greater success, I managed to catch a twenty incher and a sixteen and several smaller browns and rainbows.

Regarding involvement in Kern area issues, most of our activity centers on club projects in the Golden Trout Wilderness. Last year we funded two grants to support individual club projects on the Kern Plateau. The SWC is also a stakeholder in the upcoming review of grazing allotments on the Kern Plateau. We make an effort to stay informed regarding regional conservation issues and events, and distribute that information to all SWC clubs through our conservation network. We are eager to distribute to our membership "calls for volunteers" from any club.

The federation offers two classes per year for teachers in the SoCal area one in the fall and one in January. In the Central Valley the DFG sponsors multiple training sessions per year. We also provide a very comprehensive amount of TIC training materials. These are donated by the Federation for teachers and the clubs. Included is a three hundred page TIC syllabus. We provide help and troubleshooting with TIC aquariums. We have and will continue to be a liaison between the clubs and the DFG. We have made some headway with the hatcheries keeping us informed about availability of trout eggs. This is a work in progress and will be for quite some time. And as you stated we will give financial help to the clubs.
