

## **This Month's Speaker**

## **Guide Flies for Tough Trout**

## By Landon Mayer



You will see in Landon Mayer's latest presentation that it takes skill, luck and the right flies. **Fly choice is often an agonizing and time-consuming process**. Using what Landon aptly describes as **"guide flies**", may tip the odds in your favor. The good news is that these patterns do not require great tying skill or hours spent at the vice.

When you spend as much time on the water as our speaker Landon Mayer, you need simple, easy-to-tie patterns that get the job done, day in and day out. *In his presentation Landon shares his top patterns for trophy trout that have been perfected on rivers and still waters in the Rockies and across the globe*. Patterns include the **Tails Up Trico**, **Mayer's Mini Leech**, **Titan Tube Midge**, **Mini Leech Jig Damsel**, plus many more. His program explains in detail how leech patterns, long associated with streamer fishing for warmwater species are deadly effective for trout. Each pattern is demonstrated in innovative and often surprising ways. This is a "must attend" presentation/meeting. As a bonus, copies of Landon's latest book Guide Flies: Easy-to-Tie Patterns for Tough Trout will be available for purchase at our Club meeting.

One of the leading (and certainly busiest) fly-fishing guides in the Western United States, Colorado based guide Landon Mayer makes a welcome in-person return to the SoCal speaker circuit. He last spoke to our Club via Zoom on January 13, 2021.

Landon Mayer's angling success is fueled by an addiction to pursuing large trout with small flies and lightweight fly-fishing equipment. He enthusiastically teaches and demonstrates his techniques and on-river knowledge and has developed innovative strategies for sighting, hooking, and landing selective trout. His passion for fly-fishing has allowed him to make several noteworthy contributions to the sport on and off the water. This has included travels to fly-fishing related organizations of the Mid-Atlantic,

West, Pacific Northwest, Southwest, and Southern states, as well as teaching through guided trips, fly-fishing classes, presentations, and demonstrations of his unique techniques. Mayer has been guiding in Colorado full time on the *South Platte River* for the last 22 years, while also experiencing one full season on the *Nak Nek River* in AK.

Born and raised in Colorado Springs where he began his fly-fishing career in the 6th grade when his middle school offered fly casting lessons. Throughout his teens, Landon's love of the sport grew when he spent all his free time hanging around local fly shops and watching VHS tapes by *Gary Borger* and *Doug Swisher* until the tapes actually wore out! After graduating from high school, Landon pursued a career as a full-time guide in Colorado, learning from great Colorado anglers such as *Ed Engle, Pat Dorsey* and fly tyer *John Barr*.

Mayer is a contributing writer for *Fly Fisherman* and *High Country Angler* magazines. His contributions also have been featured in publications such as *Fly Rod and Reel, American Angler, Southwest Fly Fishing, Field and Stream,* and *Fish and Fly* magazines. As an ambassador in the fly-fishing industry, Mayer represents several lines including Simms Fly Fishing apparel and is a royalty fly designer for Umpqua Feather Merchants. He is also an advisory team member of Simms, R.L.Winton, Bauer, Scientific Angler, Smith Optics, Fish Pond, Yeti Coolers, Regal Vise, and Casio Pro Trek watches.

Landon's techniques are contained in his publications and DVD's which include: The Hunt for Giant Trout: 25 Top Locations in the US to Catch a Trophy Trout, Trout Tips: A Guide's Secrets, Tactics and Techniques, Colorado's Best Fly Fishing, Sight Fishing for Trout, and How to Catch the Biggest Trout of Your Life, plus his two DVDs: Landing the Trout of Your Life and Weapons of Bass. His latest book is Landon Mayer's Guide Flies: Easy-to-Tie Patterns for Tough Trout. Landon continues to live near his home waters of the South Platte River in Colorado where he teaches fly fishing through guiding and classes; he also appears around the country giving presentations of his innovative, successful and popular techniques. I fished three days as streamkeeper for the Sespe Club and did not get a bite. Prior to that, I had never been skunked at Pyramid. Bob Samaru won the jack pot with an 8 pounder and also caught the most with five. Ten people totaled 19 fish.

Orange County Club arrived on Sunday and we caught 10 fish that day. Kurt Morris got a 9 pounder. Terry Imlay had a 9 1/2 pound Summit, which is very large for that strain, and I caught 9, 10 and 12 pounders. The next day, we only caught 7, and the last day, we caught none. Ten guys, three days, four different spots, and only 17 fish.

Long Beach came in after us, and 10 guys only got 14. Eric Yamada's 8 pounder was the largest.

The weather was not bad, plenty of wind and waves, just no fish. The water was too cold according to everyone we talked to. Maybe all three Clubs should try to go later. But in the distant past, these were prime dates.




## **Club News - Fish Tales**





## 2023 Outings - Yellowstone

## Yellowstone National Park - Northeast Corner August 6-13, 2023

#### Deadline: Sign ups CLOSED on March 30, 2023

#### **Overview:**

The storied streams that fill flyfishing lore - Slough and Soda Butte Creeks, Lamar and Yellowstone Rivers and their tributaries will be reaching peak fishing in August. Come experience the Northeast corner of Yellowstone National Park after being closed for a year due to flooding in 2022. Most of the fishing will be wading. We will have guides for the first few days, then fish on our own the second half of the week. Many spots are a few hundred yards from a parked car. For the adventurous, some wonderful spots will require hiking a few miles at 9,000 feet. We will adjust the itinerary to suit attendees.

Fish in the Park have a long winter and short summer. So, they readily feed on large flies and especially hoppers in August. You can expect to be pushed out of the river when a bull bison decides it is time to drink or cross. It is all part of what makes the Park so special. I have caught 25" cutthroats and 8" brook trout with equal joy in this unique and beautiful place. I have interrupted fishing many times to photograph bison, bears, goats, elk, eagles, otters, fishers, and other animals that are hard to see anywhere else. Experience Yellowstone across many facets on this trip.

#### Guides:

We will use Yellowstone River Guides for three days. They accommodate both float and wading. The group will decide how much of each.

#### Lodging:

We will stay in rental house in Gardiner, MT. You will leave early each morning to beat traffic through the entrance gate and return whenever we choose. Some nice hatches happen at sunset (about 8:45pm in August.)

#### Group Size:

Group is limited to the first 5 people.

#### Meals:

We will prepare breakfast at the house each day. Box lunches will be catered in the day before. Dinner will be a local restaurant on guide days and catered on self-guided days.

#### Transportation:

You are responsible of booking your own transportation to Bozeman, MT (airport code BZN).

We will use rental cars to move from Bozeman to Gardiner and around the Park during the week.

## 2023 Outings - Yellowstone

#### Itinerary: (tentative depending on conditions and members' interests)

Sunday 8/6 - drive from Bozeman to Gardiner and check-in to rental house.

Monday 7th to Wednesday 9th - Guide with YRO, either float on Yellowstone River or wade streams in Park.

Thursday 10th to Saturday 12th - Wading on our own in the Park.

Sunday 8/13 - Drive to Bozeman airport and Fly out.

#### Estimated Costs per person:

Estimate Total: \$3,200

#### Gear:

Rods - 5wt or 6wt work well. I prefer 6wt because the mountain winds can be strong. A 3wt will occasionally be nice for a delicate dry fly presentation but not essential.

Waders - the water will be cold, and the air might be too.

#### Streamkeeper:

Larry Behm

#### Background:

I have been visiting Yellowstone National Park since the 1960s and fishing in it since the 1970s. I have fished most of the rivers, a few of the lakes, and hiked many trails. I am not a guide, but I'm happy to share what I know about getting around and finding fish in the Park.

I plan to coordinate this trip based on what the attendees want. There are many ways to approach fishing in the Park and we will match these to everyone's needs.

Some of the best fishing will be at the end of 2–3 mile hike. If you want the best experience, start walking to prepare yourself for the altitude and terrain.

I find the Greater Yellowstone Area to be a place of awe in fullest sense of the word. It is a spiritual home for me, just as it was for earlier native inhabitants. I hope to share that special feeling and sense of place with fellow anglers.

The area of Southern Utah we are going has four mountains that surround it and has numerous lakes and streams.

I have fished the area in the spring, summer, and fall; I have found the most productive time is in the fall

#### Where We Are Going:

**Loa Utah** Home of the **Quiet Fly Fisher** and is located in a beautiful valley at 7064" elevation, which hosts a few small towns like Loa, Lyman, Bicknell and Torrey. This is farming and livestock country and is surrounded by mountain ranges of which we will be fishing. There are National Parks near by that offer spectacular scenery, Bryce Canyon to the South West and Capitol Reef to the East, Fish Lake National Forest to the North West along with Boulder Mountain with an elevation of 11,317 which provides many fishing locations, and spectacular views.

#### **Guide Contact Information:**

Our head guide in Loa, Utah is Mike James owner of the Quiet Fly Fisher their address is 200 N. Main Street Loa, Utah 84747 Contact Phone Number is 435-616-2319.

#### Weather & Clothing:

We will be lodging at approx. 7,000' elevation. Nights are cold and days are warm usually, I have experienced rain, snow, hail, and hot and cold days. Bring clothing you can put on in layers that wick moisture, nothing more uncomfortable than moisture under your clothing, which either keeps you hot and sweaty or cold and sweaty. Bring a lightweight rain jacket. Most days you will be wearing your waders but on hot day I wet wade with light shirt nylon pants and my wading boots on, don't forget the neoprene booties if wet wading. Be flexible, bring both cold and warm weather gear and adjust as needed. Weather at high altitude can change rapidly be prepared. The weather will not stop your guide from fishing unless it is dangerous and or access is limited. They will advise if there is a problem. Mother nature sets the parameters we must always be aware of our surroundings and climate.

#### Lodging:

There are many options in the region of Loa, Utah both in town and adjoining hamlets like Lyman and Bicknell. I would suggest The Mill Cabins 1500 S. HWY 24 Lyman, Utah (435) 491-0426 as a wonderful place with individual cabins that can sleep two and are very reasonably priced, **Bruce & Dana Chappell** are the owners. In Loa the Snuggle Inn is pricy but luxurious by small town standards. In Bicknell the Sunglow Motel and Restaurant is comfortable and reasonably priced. Lodging in these areas can be limited so make your lodging reservation early; I do not take responsibility for making anyone's lodging reservations due to last minute cancelations and family emergencies. I recommend you book you're lodging early, as lodging will be harder to fine closer to the trip dates. Many travelers hit the road after school is in session and before winter.

#### **Physical Demands:**

Where we are lodging at 6500' to 7,000' elevation we can be fishing and hiking at as high as 11,000'. If you have problems at altitude let the guide and streamkeeper know in advance of our trip. Most fishing locations involve some hiking and wading. I would suggest arriving a couple of days early to acclimate to 7,000' not hiking hard and drinking plenty of water, it easy to dehydrate in higher elevations, the guide has water and soft drinks along in their vehicles so ask for the water.

#### Gear:

**Rods & Lines.** The entire trip can be done with a 9-foot 5-weight rod and a floating line and a sinking line, one rod is all you need.

Waders. Good pair of breathable waders is required in most situations.

Boots. Wading boots are part of the package. No restrictions on felt as yet.

## 2023 Outings - Fly Fishing Southern Utah (Con't)

**Wading Staff**. Many of us find having a wading staff necessary for stability in slippery or rocky situations, or just find a long stick, don't fall, the rocks are unforgiving.

**Terminal Tackle**. I use a 9 foot 5x leader and have along 2,3,4,5,6x tippet. I as well bring an assortment of lead free shot to use as needed if nymphing.

**Flies**. We will be fishing many lakes and a few streams and possibly a couple of rivers. I carry dries, nymphs and streamers but the guide will provide you with flies. If the guide suggests a fly or gives you a fly use it with the full understanding you will catch fish, they are quite experienced on these waters. If you are like me I bring many more flies than I will ever use. I have hoppers, caddis, mayflies, and damselflies in adult and nymph stages. I find a callibaetis mayfly nymph very useful in the lakes. Bring what you own and the fly shop offers all the working patterns you will be using if you want to purchase some.

First Aid Kit: I carry a basic first aid kit in my tote bag for simple emergencies, minor cuts and abrasions.

#### Transportation:

From L.A. Southern California is a 9 1/2-hour drive including gas stops and a lunch stop to Loa, Utah. Sharing a ride is more fun to get to know you friend or partner better and listen to each other experiences along the way. When in Loa the guides provide the transportation to and from the days fishing locations. Salt Lake City is approximately 3 hours away from Loa and is serviced by many airlines and rental car companies.

#### **Float Tubing:**

There will be opportunities to float tube in the area if you so desire. **The Quiet Fly Fisher** in Loa can provide you with a float tube if they are guiding you. If you wish the comfort of your own float tube please feel free to bring yours.

#### Food:

In Utah many of their dinning locations close on Sunday, it is best to call ahead or ask you guide where and what is open, most areas have a couple options on Sunday but it is best to inquire. Guides provide lunch during the days guiding. Many of us BBQ at the Mill Cabins for dinner, to curb the costs of eating out every meal, the grocery in the town of Loa is open Mon.- Sat. Breakfast is your choice of eating at a local restaurant or at your lodging, the guide provides lunch the days you are fishing.

#### Libations:

You are responsible for any liquor you wish to purchase either bought from the local Liquor store in Bicknell or for beer (3.2) in some of the gas stations, or bring from home. BYOB.

#### **Costs and Payment:**

The guide requires a <u>Non-refundable</u> \$200 deposit to secure your reservation and the final payment is due upon completion of your final day.

## 2023 Outings - Fly Fishing Southern Utah (Con't)

#### **Tipping:**

It is customary to tip the guide daily; I tip \$50 per day of guiding at the end of the day. Tipping is not based on your ability or the number of fish caught, but for good service and the ability of the guide to lead you doing everything in their ability to make the experience enjoyable. Fish are a bonus. I have negotiated quite reasonable rates for the group of six and feel a percentage tip is quite unfair to the guide considering the extreme road conditions, locations and wear and tear on their vehicles. These extreme road conditions keep most of your competition for fish away.

#### **Fishing License:**


Utah state fishing license can be obtained on line prior to your trip, which is the easiest. Licenses can be purchased in Loa at the local store Monday through Saturday, closed Sunday. Yearly licenses last from the date you purchase them for a complete calendar year.

#### **Emergency Services:**

Bicknell near Lyman has a clinic available for minor emergencies.

A deposit of <u>\$200 Non Refundable</u> is sent to John Williams to hold your spot and sent then forwarded to the guide. The total cost of the trip is \$1,250 for five days of guiding. The staff of The Quiet Fly Fisher of Loa Utah will guide us.

**Dates:** October 13-17. Arrive on a Friday (10/13), and Depart on a Tuesday (10/17). Three full days of fishing the Bridgeport area (Saturday, Sunday, and Monday)! At the request of last year's attendees, this Outing has moved to October!

**Waters:** There are numerous great fishing opportunities in the area; including stream fishing the East Walker River, West Walker River, Virginia Creek, Buckeye Creek, Robinson Creek, and more. Stillwater fishing on Bridgeport Reservoir, Kirman Lake, Lundy Lake, the Upper or Lower Twin Lakes, or on the Virginia Lakes. Private waters are also available for a fee (Sceirine Ranch, Nevada).

**Fishing:** Independent fishing format. Members disperse to their desired fishing locations in the morning (as singles, or buddy up). Guided fishing is also available; Ken's Sporting Goods in Bridgeport has a list of recommended local guides for hire to put you on fish! Then after a day's fishing, the group will rendezvous at the evening campfire at our host Lodge to discuss the day's fishing, and plans for the next day.

**Lodging:** Willow Springs Motel and RV Park (<u>Willow Springs Resort, Bridgeport, California</u>), approximately 5 miles south of Bridgeport off Hwy 395, is our home base for the outing. Standard single rooms (queen bed), Kitchenette rooms (one queen and one double bed) for those who wish to buddy up and share a room/expenses, and 30A full hook-up RV sites are available for your lodging choices.



<u>Standard Single Rooms are \$150/night</u>. The Standard Room includes: One queen bed, Private Bathroom, Wifi and Satellite TV, Heating and Air Conditioning, Mini refrigerator, Microwave, and Coffee maker.



<u>Kitchenette Rooms are \$200/night</u>. Kitchenette Rooms include: One queen bed, One double bed, Private Bathroom, Wifi and Satellite TV, Heating and Air Conditioning, Coffee maker and Toaster, Microwave, Mini refrigerator, Stove top range, and Silverware/dinnerware/cookware.







## **Fly Fishing Educational Series**

## The Spirit of Dame Berners - Still Water Fishing By Larry Behm



This month we are looking at still water. While many anglers think that trout are the only fish to target on a fly rod, any fish is worth pursuing. It may take different tactics and especially if the fish live in lakes or ponds. To help sort this topic I've asked Lyman Kennedy to share his experience. Lyman began fly fishing 25 years ago and has been a club member most of that time.

#### You are known in the club as a tier. Why did you take up fly tying?

**Lyman**: When I first started fly fishing, I was overwhelmed with the numbers and variety of flies available in fly shops and what they represented. So, I took up fly

tying, mainly to educate myself about insects, the stages of their development and the flies that represent those insects. That education has helped me to become a much better fisherman.

#### Lyman where do you like to fish?

**Lyman**: I enjoy fly fishing on streams, small and big rivers, ponds, lakes, saltwater bays, and saltwater charter boats. I do a lot of Stillwater fishing and I enjoy the challenge that each new body of water presents.

#### What do we mean by "still water"?

**Lyman**: Stillwater fishing usually refers to fishing on ponds, lakes, and reservoirs without a discernible current except for intake and outflows. However, there are a few exceptions such as Lewiston Lake and Baum Lake in northern California where there is a channel and definite current for all or much of the extent of the lake, and these sections can be fished like any moving water.

#### Why is still water fly fishing different?

**Lyman**: To successfully fish stillwater, I highly recommend a fish finder. Not only to find fish, but more importantly to look at the contours and structure of a lake. Likely spots to find fish are the intakes and outflows, the edges of weed beds, along old channels, drop offs, wherever deep water meets shallow water and in shallow water when fish are actively feeding.

#### How do you approach a still water?

**Lyman**: There are many different approaches and techniques for fishing stillwater and these vary from lake to lake and according to personal preferences. A common technique is the use of a sinking line that sinks at a specific rate (i.e., 3 inches a second for type 3 line) and stripping in various flies such as woolly buggers, bait fish imitations, and nymph imitations. There are many different sinking lines on the market from very slow to very fast sink, and various sink tip lines. We also frequently use

floating lines to occasionally fish dry flies, usually in shallow water near inlets and edges of weed bets. Floating lines are also used to suspend flies under an indicator, such as midge and mayfly patterns as well as leech and baitfish patterns.

#### What equipment do I need?

**Lyman**: Fishing from shore in a lake is sometimes possible, especially if you find a drop off within casting distance. I prefer to fish from a watercraft such as float tube, pontoon boat or a rental boat so that I can access more water, different water depths, and different parts of the lake. When I am fishing from float tube and pontoon boat, I use force fins to propel myself through water.

I like to use 9-foot, 6-weight rods for lake fishing but a five weight would usually be adequate. One rod with a separate spool for two different set ups would work, but I always bring three rods, rigged with different lines and setups so that I don't have to change reel and rod setups on the water. I always bring an anchor for when I want to remain stationary in a certain spot and usually when using indicator and suspended flies. Of course, you need sunglasses, plenty of water, snacks, and inflatable life vest and net.

#### What flies work best?

**Lyman**: The flies you will need will vary tremendously from lake to lake because the food sources are so varied. Besides leech and baitfish imitations, other insects you might encounter are midges, may-flies (callaebatis, PMD, tricos, Hexgenia), caddis, damselfies, dragonflies, water boatman, scuds. Midges commonly found in lakes vary in colors and range from size 20 to size 10.

#### Any unique safety concerns?

**Lyman**: Wind can be a help or safety concern. A slight chop on the water is good for moving food items around in the water and for helping fish to feel more protected and less aware of our presence on the water, especially in shallow water. Wind however can create a dangerous situation as on some lakes, it can come up very fast and without warning. I always check for weather and wind report before heading to a lake. I recommend going with a fishing buddy, preferably with one that is already proficient at fishing stillwaters. And always wear a Personal Flotation Device (PFD)!

#### Where is the closest still water to OC?

**Lyman**: There used to be several local waters to fish, but most have ceased to exist. Silverwood Lake is an option for both trout and bass. San Diego County has several bass lakes. Bishop and Mammoth Lakes give us the most opportunities to find places for stillwater fishing.

## Flies That Keep On Giving!

## **Atomic Worm**

By John Williams

Spring can be a bugger to fish with the heavy runoff and off colored water. While fishing a small stream in Wyoming when the stream was chocolate I tried a new fly and began to catch fish in the ugly water condition. Don't laugh even Andy could tie this fly.



#### Material:

Hook: Nymph Hook of your choice, this is a size 14
Thread: Red 6/0
Bead: This one is black but I also use red tungsten
Lighter: To singe and secure ends of Chenille
Cement: Super Glue Gel Formula

#### Instructions:

- 1. Start by sliding the bead onto your hook, either end first. Place the hook in your vice.
- 2. Cut a piece of the braided Chenille four times the length of the entire hook.
- 3. With a lighter, singe either end of the chenille to secure it from unraveling.
- 4. Smear super glue on either side of the beading start your thread on the eye side of the bead and tie in the chenille then move the thread to the rear and tie in the chenille on the rear side of the hook.
- 5. Cut your thread free.

Definitely works in off colored water. They don't get much easier than this one.
