The Waters of Western Montana

with Tony Reinhardt

Almost all fly fishers love Montana. Montana is the state that is written about and shown in many famous novels, memoirs and movies and most often fly fishing is either a focus in the story or at least a diversion. Although the name Montana comes from the Spanish term Montaña Relucientes, which means, "shining mountains," to many people it means "great fly fishing." We've all had to listen to friends who go on and on about the great days of fishing the Missouri, or the Big Horn, or the Beaverhead, or the Big Hole, or the spring creeks, or the . . . you get the idea.

This month Tony Reinhardt, a guide out of Missoula with 15 years experience, will give us a beautiful and informative presentation about fishing the waters of western Montana. The four main rivers here include the Blackfoot, the Clark Fork, Rock Creek and the Bitterroot. Flies That Keep On Giving

I'm headed to Arkansas in April and I have talked to George Peters the guide and listened carefully to his instruction on what flies are usually available the dates we have scheduled. George mentioned scuds and they are both available in streams, rivers and lakes, what an all round fly. He told me they were an olive gray and I happen to have the materials, surprise. I am demonstrating a key component of hiring a guide, communication if you plan to fish with your own flies; I do acquire a few of each fly the guide uses to see what works in their world. I have asked they send me one of each pattern and tie them prior to my trip; they will not always accommodate my wishes unless they know me and realize I'm a repeat customer. Ask your question even the dumb ones they can always say no.

Easy Scud



Hook: Daiichi 1250 #14 **Thread:** UTC 70 Dark Olive

Wire: UTC Small Fluorescent Orange or Small Copper

Scud Back: Swiss Straw Gray

Dubbing: Olive Gray Antron and Orange Antron

Start the thread at the eye and catch your wire and wrap mid way down the bend leaving the wire to the rear. Tie in a small bunch of Olive dubbing with the fiber protruding to the rear to form the antennae and run the thread up just short of the eye. Swiss straw preparation, I unravel it and cut it in half length wise, a piece about four inches long, that is enough to tie several scud. Tie in the Swiss Straw just behind the head and secure with thread all the way back to the mid way point on the bend, keeping the Swiss straw on top and centered on the hook. Dub the body with the Olive Gary and add a little of the Orange to sit near the front of the fly. Lay the Swiss straw over and secure just behind the head. Carefully wrap the wire forward trapping the Swiss straw, use a bodkin to help keep thefibers of the dubbing being trapped on top of the Swiss straw, tie off just behind the head, whip finish and head cement. Now pick out from the bottom of the fly to form legs.

There is more to come with the Arkansas fly selection.

SAN JUAN RIVER, NEW MEXICO MARCH 22-26, 2013

Last year nine club members traveled to Aztec, New Mexico to fish the San Juan River, and we had a great trip. We are planning a return trip in 2013 and now is the time to get your name on the list for some fantastic fishing.

The San Juan River is located in Northwest corner of New Mexico, about 20 minutes from Aztec, New Mexico. The San Juan River is a tailwater, famous for it's large fish, eating tiny midges and baetis mayflies. It fishes well year round trip. Guide prices are \$375 for two people/full day and lodging is 85-90/night for two people. Participants can elect to use a guide for 1-3 days or wade on their own, all or some of those days. If you have never fished the San Juan River before, it is recommended that you use a guide for at least 1-2 days.

Participants have the options of A. driving (750 miles=12 hours), B. flying to Farmington, New Mexico (about \$462 with two stops) and driving to Aztec (about 20 miles) C. flying to Albuquerque (\$360-\$410) and driving to Aztec (about 3 hours). Kern River Plateau Golden Trout Conservation Update

In February of 2001, Invo National Forest issued a Decision Notice that implemented a 10-year period of rest on the Templeton and Whitney grazing allotments in the Golden Trout Wilderness to facilitate recovery of watershed and channel conditions. The Notice indicated that grazing on the two allotments would be reconsidered at the end of the 10-year period. The Inyo National Forest has initiated an analysis and review of the Monache, Mulkey, Templeton and Whitney grazing allotments in the Kern Plateau/Golden Trout Wilderness on the Mt Whitney Ranger District. This review will culminate in proposed actions that are analyzed through the NEPA process (EIS) that involves analyzing different alternatives to the proposed action, requires public notice and comment, and results in a NEPA decision. Final NEPA decisions are subject to administrative appeal.




Figure 2. Grazing Allotments in the native range of the Volcano Creek golden trout, Inyo National Forest (Click on the map to SWCFFF webpage for a

ods of fishing each watershed. Tony is also experienced at fishing and guiding some of the smaller streams in the area, along with a couple very nice lakes. Missoula is in the center of all these waters, so Tony will inform us about options for lodging, dining and other activities offered by this metropolitan center.

And who is Tony Reinhardt?

He is one of the busiest and most respected fly fishing guides in western Montana. Tony was born and raised in Council Bluffs, lowa where his father taught him to hunt and fish on the family farm. While still a teenager, Tony was looking for different ways to catch the bass and pan fish throughout the Midwest, so he picked up a fly rod. Shazam! He has never been the same. He got his first taste of trout fishing while attending college in Oklahoma and driving on weekends to the productive tail-waters in Arkansas -- the White, the Little Red and the Norfolk. After his freshman year of college he spent that summer fishing and traveling with his grandfather in Alaska. They had an Airstream camper and a canoe, spending most days exploring as many fishing opportunities as they could. It was a life changing experience, and Tony quickly traded a full ride scholarship back in Oklahoma for tuition bills and a tiny apartment in Missoula, MT.

Tony started working at Missoula's Grizzly Hackle Fly Shop in '97 while earning a degree in English from the University of Montana. He was hired as a "shop rat" and by the following summer he was promoted to Outfitting Manager and started his guiding career as well. He split time between both positions for a few years until a once in a lifetime opportunity came along.

In 2001, a guest ranch was being developed in southwest Montana by the Grizzly Hackle's original owner, and Tony was hired as a staff guide for the initial year. When not guiding for the ranch, his mandate was to go fishing and learn as much as possible about *all* the rivers of Montana. Since he only guided six days for the whole season that left a lot of time to explore the state. Being paid to just go fishing was an unbelievable experience, but at the end of that year, Tony chose to return to Missoula. While he had witnessed some great fishing all across Big Sky country, he felt that the rivers around Missoula offered the best overall angling experience in the state.

Tony rejoined the Grizzly Hackle (www.grizzlyhackle.com) as a full time guide in 2002. Since then he has spent as much time on the rivers of western Montana as any other guide in the area, averaging more than 130 guide days a season. While the majority of his guiding is still for the Grizzly Hackle, Tony started his own outfitting business in 2010. During a rare day off you are likely to find him exploring some of the lesser known waters in the area or testing new fly designs for his clients to use in the coming days.

Fly tying started as a passion for Tony when he moved to Missoula and he has become a skilled tier who is often asked to demonstrate at local events. He tied flies commercially for area fly shops and the majority of flies in his guide bag were created at his own vise.

Along the way, in 2002 Tony married his wife, Brandy. They met while both working at a drug store in high school, and when Brandy realized Tony wasn't ever leaving Montana, she moved out to join him. They have two children, Thomas (7), and Kaitlyn (3), and a black lab, Gunner.

Join me in welcoming Tony Reinhardt on November 7, 2012 at the FFCOC monthly meeting as we explore the waters of western Montana... and remember to pursue your fly fishing dreams!
