to offer, including sea mammals, turtles, birds and a touch of local culture.

Gary's photos and words will entertain and teach us about the opportunities near Baja's Cerralvo Island and amaze us with some exhilarating action from small boats. Whether you are new to fly fishing or an experienced freshwater or surf fisher ready to move into larger, warmer waters, this program is for you. Gary Bulla grew up on the beaches and waters of the southern California coast. From when Gary was a toddler, his father camped, hunted and fished with him. By his early 20s, Gary learned to scuba dive and then free dive and spear fish in the Channel Islands and southern Mexico and was exposed to fly fishing while backpacking in the Sierra and living in the mountains of Colorado. By age 23, Gary had returned to the foothills of southern California to make his home. In 1989 his friend Yvon Chouinard introduced him to the concept of casting a fly into the surf. Gary found saltwater fly fishing perfectly com-

bined his lifetime love for the ocean and his passion for fly fishing. In those days there was not a great deal of information about targeting Pacific saltwater species, but Corbina seemed to hold the possibility of becoming an exhilarating and challenging fish for southern California. So Gary began observing and experimenting on the shoreline. He spent many mornings and evenings patrolling the beaches, paddling the kelp beds in his kayak and developing flies and techniques for the salt. He combined his knowledge of the tides and beaches with his observations to understand how to catch not only corbina, but also halibut, yellowfin croaker, perch and striped bass. All these were found in the surf near Ventura and Santa Barbara. Today long rods are a common sight on these beaches -- a dream come true for Gary. Also, in 1989 Gary began accompanying his wife Theresa, a teacher of marine biology, on trips with middle school students to Baja's Magdalena Bay, Loreto and La Paz areas. He brought his fly rod and was astounded at the incredible fly fishing available so near to southern California. Thus began a second quest and more years of experi-

Flies That Keep On Giving

I watched in awe as one of my friends caught a monster brown and I caught its little sister, I mean little. The difference was the depth I was fishing. On some occasions you have to be rolling along the bottom or close to it. I learned my lesson and created this stone fly that when it hits the bottom the ground shakes.

Willie's Black Bottom Dweller

Hook: Daiichi 1270 #4-8 Thread: UTC 70 Black Eyes: Medium bead chain eyes Black Weight: 035 Lead Tail & Antennae: Medium Round Black Rubber Legs Dubbing: Spirit River Black Pseudo Seal Abdomen Wrap: Black Round Hollow Tubing Wing Case: Dark Mottled Turkey Tail Feather back side coated with flex-a-ment Wing Cement: UV Clear Cure Goo brush-able UV Light or Daylight




Start your thread just behind the eye and tie in your eyes just to the rear of the eye, take several wraps and add a smear of super glue to secure. Start your lead weight at the hook point and

wrap forward to a point three head spaces behind the eyes, take several securing wraps on both sides of the lead and over it as well, add a smear of super glue to secure in place. Cut a 6-8 inch piece of rubber leg material and fold it in half, tie in the loose ends to the rear about two thirds of the hook shank extending beyond the bend, keep wrapping forward and leave the folded end forward beyond the eyes wrapping and securing at the eyes. Cut the loop on the rubber legs to form the antenna. Tie in the hollow black tubing at the back side of the lead and wrap to the rear just over the hook barb. Dub the abdomen and thorax with the dubbing from the barb to just behind the eyes. Wrap the tubing forward allowing a few of the fibers to show through between wraps, all the way to the two thirds forward point and tie off and cut the remainder free. Coat a dark mottled turkey tail feather with Dave's Flex-a-ment and allow drying,


SPRING TIME CHIRONOMID STILLWATER FLY FISHING TACTICS BY ERNIE GULLEY

Hello friends and welcome to my stillwater fly fishing column for our wonderful club, The Orange County Fly Fishers. I will be writing to you every month about stillwater fly fishing tactics and will try to keep you ahead of the curve so to speak throughout the upcoming year. Our general season for trout fishing in the Sierra will start this year on Saturday, April 27th, and I hope some of this information I will be sharing with you will help you get ready for the upcoming stillwater fly fishing season.

The trout we seek in our stillwaters are normally very large and very well fed. This is one of the reasons why I only fish stillwaters so please don't hold this against me. I am grateful that not everyone only wants to fish lakes or streams, this way it won't get too crowded on whatever fly fishing environment we seek and enjoy in our upcoming adventures. The reason these fish are so well fed is because they have a lot of opportunities to eat many different meals throughout the season starting from when the ice comes off a lake until the ice covers the lake for the winter.

The main players in a stillwater environment can be seen on this chart I have included (productive stillwater chart annual food source) and are as follows: Chironomids or Midges, Mayflies or Calibates, Damsels, Baitfish or Fry, Scuds, Leeches and Snails.

As you can see the main staple in the Spring is Chironomids, (see productive stillwater chart listed as Spring). I am going to discuss a few tricks on how to fish and present this fly and why this is the main food source for all trout in the Spring for most lakes and stillwaters you will be fishing in the beginning of the season. In most stillwaters the very first food source the fish will find immediately after ice off is the chironomid or midges. Chironomids are the trout's main food source for the entire year, however in the spring it can be as high as 80% of a trout's source of food and you as fly anglers can take good advantage



of this if you spend some time learning the proper tactics to present this small-in-size but large-inquantity bug to these hungry trout.

Chironomids can be presented to the trout in many different techniques and strategies. Floating lines, Hover lines, Intermediate lines and full sinking lines in type 3's all the way into the fast sinking type 7 lines. Floating lines have fast become the most productive and more popular way to present a chironomid along with an indicator, however more seasoned and skilled anglers prefer to use their hands and feel the fish take the chironomid instead of watching an indicator disappear into the depths of the water column. Indicator fishing is so deadly because it will allow you to have the perfect presentation for the chironomid. Its depth can be perfectly controlled by the indicator, holding it in a perfect vertical position and the perfect depth from the bottom while waiting for an unsuspecting trout to swim by and filter feed on the thousands of chironomids that will hold 12" to 24" off the lake floor. When these bugs finally pupitate they will make their journey like a mini hot air balloon to the surface of lake. Floating lines with very long leaders, well into the 20 to 25 feet lengths are also very productive in helping to suspend and making the chironomid look like it's starting its journey to the surface and to hatch into the adult. This technique is completed by casting out your floating line, with a long leader and letting it sink to the bottom floor of the lake. You will then slowly hand or finger twisting your floating line allowing your bug to slowly ascend up through the water column and to the surface. The takes on this technique are very hard and the fish will sometimes break the leader before you can allow the fish to run or get them on the fly reel. You must try to keep your hands as soft as possible on the fly line for this technique.

For deep water chironomid fishing you can use a slip indicator or a type 7 sinking line and fish the

Rod Building Class to Be Offered Spring 2013

Building your own rod is a good way to get the rod you always wanted, customized as you want it. You can save on the cost of a ready made rod and have fun doing it! This class is more than how to assemble a rod. You will learn about the uses for different types of rods. You will learn about rod action. You will learn why rods perform the way they do. We will show examples of the various types of components out there. You can choose the blank, the guides, the wrapping thread, the reel seat and the grip for your project. The club will provide the tools and consumable supplies needed to complete your rod. It's not hard - but it does require good eyesight and hand coordination.

There will be three class sessions.

The first session will be an introduction to the class and will focus on the components each student will need to bring to the following sessions. Suggestions will be made on what components to get and where to buy them. You will be given a Rod Building Manual and a Rod Design Worksheet to help in documenting your choices. Your homework will be to buy your components before the second session. For this class we will be assembling 4-piece rods. (There is a gap between the first two sessions to give you time to purchase your rod building components.)

The second session will be a working session where you will prepare your blank, install your grip and reel seat and locate and temporarily install your guides.

The third session will be devoted to wrapping you guides. You will go home with the materials needed to finish wrapping if needed and epoxy coat the wraps.

I'll have a sign-up sheet and final dates at the March club meeting. The following dates are tentative:

Gary fished the mangroves of Magdalena Bay, pursued big fish all over southern Baja and kayak fished the islands near La Paz. When he showed up with his fly rods at Punta Arenas, near Cerralvo Island, the guides didn't know what to think – they had never seen one before. For the last 21 years, Gary has been leading lodgebased fly fishing expeditions every year to Baja and kayak fly fishing expeditions to the Espiritu Santo Island, San Jose Island and lately to Magdalena Island. And he teaches local surf and saltwater casting clinics as well as guiding clients in the surf. He has caught more than 150 saltwater species on the fly and has guided and fished



the Channel Islands, Belize, North Carolina and the Bahamas. But his home waters are truly the islands and blue waters of the Sea of Cortez, where he spends most of his guiding year. Idylwilde Flies signed Gary as one of their



"Signature Tiers" and has been distributing his saltwater flies since 2008. The "Tuna Tux" has proven to be one the best all round flies in southern Baja and his Papagallo is one of the go-to flies for trophy rooster fish. With his "family" of captains and large groups of repeat client/friends, Gary is constantly developing and tweaking new patterns and methods for the multitude of species in the salt. When he hosts his many trips, Gary coaches his clients *and often fishes* with them, constantly adding to his knowledge. Articles about his trips and his photos have appeared in Patagonia catalogs, *California Fly Fisher, Fly Rod and Reel, The Drake, Saltwater Fly Fishing* and *Fly Fishing in Saltwaters*. STILLWATER FISHING AT LAGO FIG April 6th

Pyramid Lake Outing April 13th, 14th &15, 2013

New updated information!

In what has become an annual event, this year's Pyramid Lake outing will be Sunday-Monday, April 14th & 15th Saturday the 13th optional (see below). After consulting with Rob Anderson from the Reno Fly Shop (now closed) we decided to make it a Sunday-Monday outing in an attempt to miss the bulk of the weekend crowd which usually clears out by Sunday afternoon.

If you have never done this trip before you are missing out on a chance to catch what may be the biggest trout of you life. The lake's native Lahontan Cutthroats average 3-5 pounds, with many fish pushing 10 pounds or more. In the past a fish 10 pounds or bigger was considered a trophy. Now thanks to the introduction of the longer living Pilot Peak strain that is much longer living fish over 20 pounds are being caught! If you are new to fly fishing the techniques are simple and easy to learn. We normally fish from ladders placed in the water at the proper distance from shore. There usually is nothing around you, but water. There is nothing to interfere with a back cast and nothing on the bottom to snag. You do not need to be a long distance caster as fish are sometimes hooked right at you feet.

Equipment that is appropriate for both kinds of fishing is usually two rods. A 6-7 weight rod with floating line for indicator fishing and a 8-9 weight rod for streamer fishing (a Rio DC 24ft. 250 gr. line is perfect). I will provide a more extensive list of what to bring that includes equipment, lines, flies, leaders, tippet and clothing in an upcoming e-mail.

Daytime temperature will likely be around 50 degrees F. This is a very variable temperature as we have experienced 30-75 degree temperatures in past years

You make your own travel arrangements to Reno, fly or drive. It is best to arrive by Saturday (Friday if fishing on Saturday) to check in with our guide/host Rob Anderson (775-742-1754) AND myself Jim Wright (714-679-6638). I will be staying at the Silver Legacy Resort in downtown Reno. Others have stayed the Atlantis Casino (800-723-6500). Rob will be providing breakfast and lunch on Sunday and Monday, as well as step ladders to fish from. Cost of the trip is \$160 per person for both days of fishing. If you would like to join Rob and myself for a half day of guided fishing on Saturday the cost is a \$50 donation paid directly to the Club through me. I will e-mail a list of all attendees so you can communicate as to carpools, car rentals and lodging. E-mail me (jrwright1@earthlink.net) with any questions or to sign up. I will also have a sign-up sheet at the Meetings in December, January, and February.

FFCOC Steelhead Outing November 4 - 8, 2013 - Steelhead on the Trinity River, Lewiston, CA

In November 2013 ten fortunate Club members will travel to Lewiston, CA in search of Steelhead (sometimes called 'the fish of a thousand casts'). We will be the only guests at the Trinity River Adventure Inn, which is on the river about one hour northwest of Redding. We will float the river with guides from The Fly Shop for three days and find our own spots on the river (or explore other activities in the Trinity Alps) other days. Fishing is available from the bank at the Inn.

The Inn and your guide will provide all meals while in Lewiston (bring your own adult beverages). The total cost will be about \$900 for four nights lodging, meals and three days of guided fishing on the river. If you would like the "all inclusive" package, there is an additional charge (usually \$50 per day, but we may be able to have this reduced).

5 DOT RANCH STILLWATER CLINIC

Hello friends, my name is Ernie Gulley (stream keeper) and I am a guide in the Eastern Sierra and a proud member of your Orange County Fly Fishers Club. I wanted to share what I feel is a very unique opportunity for all of my fellow "Stillwater" fly fishers and anyone who would like to learn "Stillwater Fly Fishing Tactics" This would be an excellent opportunity to get ready for the opening season of stillwater fishing and tools you can use for the rest of the year!

5-DOT Ranch is the largest working cattle ranch in the state of California. On the ranch there is a 400 acre private lake (Round Valley Reservoir) which is located between the town of Susanville and Eagle Lake. This reservoir is locally known as "5 DOT Res." and has very limited access. It is full of powerful Triploid Rainbow Trout and is the perfect place for any level of fly fisher to hone their stillwater skills.

Doug Ouellette who owns **Calvada Fly Fishing**, runs all of the clinics and guide services at 5 DOT. He has been fly fishing and teaching anglers advanced stillwater techniques for over 30 years. Doug is well known nationally for his expertise on stillwaters. He has fished many lakes and reservoirs across the United States, Canada, and New Zealand. He grew up learning his skills at California's Eagle Lake, Davis Lake. and Frenchman Res. He wrote a piece in John Barr's book "Barr Flies" pg.6 on the **"Floater no Cator"** technique. This year Doug will be accompanied by **Ernie Gulley who owns Ernie Gulley Fly Fishing Guide Service** is a premiere guide at the famous California stillwater Crowley Lake. His 30 years of "Stillwater" fishing, 15 years of these as Fly Fishing has acquired him a wealth of knowledge and his passion for stillwater fly fishing is unmatched and will be a tremendous asset to the "Outside the Box Clinics".

The clinics are a **2 1/2** day fishing event which will cover advanced stillwater techniques, including aquatic entomology, presenting food items, reading water, and fly selection. The clinics will also cover knot tying, leaders, and proper rigging. Along with the "Floater no Cator" technique Doug and Ernie will teach shoreline wading, float tube, pontoon boat, small pram, and large boat techniques including **"Loch Style"** fishing. These clinics offer plenty of "on the water" instruction as well as many hours of angling time to practice these techniques. This year Doug will be accompanied by **Ernie Gulley**. Ernie is a premiere guide at the famous California stillwater Crowley Lake. His years 30 years of "Stillwater" fishing, 15 years of Fly Fishing has accumulated a wealth of knowledge and his passion for stillwater fly fishing will be a tremendous asset to the "Outside the Box Clinics".




OSF BEACH SPOTTERS:

All catches are to be recorded on your scorecard only by an OSF spotter to be official! For extra safety, OSF spotters will watch for bystanders and insure anglers maintain a safe distance from neighboring anglers and pedestrians. Anglers must be at least 100 feet from each other. If you lose your fly, you must turn in your card to the nearest spotter. FLIES:

Each participating angler is to provide ONE saltwater fly pattern. Only sizes #6, #4 or #2s will be accepted. One hook per fly! Each fly must be weighted and tied clouser-style!!! Each fly will be inspected and deemed fishable before it can be entered. All flies will be logged in, enveloped and thrown into a brown paper bag. Additional proven patterns will be added to sweeten the pot for those that do not wish to enter a fly. Each angler will pick ONE mystery fly prior to fishing. All contestants must use only one fly for the entire tournament time slot of two and a half hours. A lost fly terminates your tournament session! No exceptions! (Continued from page 4 Willies Bottom Dweller) cutting a piece free the width of the thorax and tying it in dull side up. Cut a piece of rubber leg material and tie one on either side of the thorax. Use your thumb nail to press down on the turkey feather and fold it forward forming the first wing case and tie it in just behind the eyes. Fold it back to the rear and take several wraps of thread to secure it to the rear to form the second wing case. Add a smear of super glue to your thread wraps and wait a few seconds and cut your thread free. Brush the wing pads/case with UV goo and cure either in daylight or a UV flashlight. If you wish your wing pads to be darker use a felt tip marker. Tight lines and sore arms ~ John Page 9

chironomid straight down under your tube or boat. Because you will be fishing this technique in depths of water in excess of 20 feet or greater, the full sinking thin line will give you an advantage of feeling the trout take the chironomid and this is very exciting. On this technique you will only need a 4 foot leader or less with one chironomid attached to the end of your leader. You must attach a weight to the end of your leader and drop this straight down to the bottom. After you have found the correct depth to the bottom, cast this away from the boat and allow it to slowly sink down under the boat or float tube. You will then slowly start your finger twist, less than an inch at a time, and ascend your bug from the bottom back up through the water column and await the trout to take your offering. If you make it back up to the surface, cast the line back out away from the boat or pontoon let it drop the bug back down to the bottom and repeat the process again. Be very careful, these takes are massive and the fish will break off the leader if you don't let the fly line slip through your fingers and get the line back on the fly reel as quickly as possible. THESE TAKES WILL WAKE YOU UP IMMEDIATELY!

Learning a few new tricks will help you present your chironomids this Spring and allow you be much more productive and bring you more pleasure out on the water. utilize efficient methods of brook trout removal that could be completed within two or three seasons has resulted in the lost opportunity of angling for a native Walker Basin cutthroat trout in this mountain meadow stream." Removal of the voracious brook trout will be accomplished with the introduction of an Alaskan weir, modified to fit the stream, within one mile from the headwaters of Silver Creek. Immediately downstream of the headwaters, block nets with approximately 1/4-inch mesh will be placed within the channel, where brook trout removal will occur incrementally within block netted sections, working downstream to the weir. NATIVE LAHONTAN CUTTHROAT TROUT AIDED BY FLY FISHING CLUBS, SWC-IFFF

BRIDGEPORT, CA – California Lahontan cutthroat trout, squeezed out of their native Sierra habitat by illegally planted brook trout, will be reestablished and nurtured by a consortium of local fly-fishing clubs and the Southwest Council-International Federation of Fly Fishers (SWC-IFFF) in cooperation with the California Department of Fish & Wildlife (CDFW).

Target area is Silver Creek in the West Walker River watershed near Bridgeport. A base camp will be established at the headwaters of Silver Creek and a team of 4-5 people will assist the CDFW with electrofishing. The goal of this multi-year event is to eradicate the non-native brook trout so the stream can sustain a currently imperiled population of Lahontan cutthroat trout. Upon competition, Silver Creek will be opened to angling.

The project is being spearheaded by Debbie Sharpton, Oak Park, conservation chair of the San Fernando Valley-based Sierra Pacific Flyfishers and conservation director of the SWC- IFFF; and Gary Applebee, president of Deep Creek Flyfishers. CDFW coordinator is fisheries biologist Dawne Becker Emery. A project lead gift of \$5,000 from the Sierra Pacific Flyfishers club was shepherded by Sharpton. Funding is being sought from all clubs within SWC-IFFF and other interested organizations or individuals. Volunteers are needed to assist with this effort. The brook trout elimination will take place from late July to late Sept., said Emery. According to the Bishop-based biologist, "Silver Creek, a tributary to the West Walker River in Mono County, is Lahontan cutthroat trout recovery water that was illegally stocked with brook trout. Brook trout were discovered in Silver Creek in 2004 during a survey intended to collect baseline population information to support opening the stream to regulated angling. Lack of ability to
