Northern California's Trinity River watershed is a magnificent, four-season fly fishing destination for trout and steelhead. Anglers travel to the Trinity River yearround for many reasons and many types of fish. Fly fishers know the Trinity River is a top-notch steelhead destination during fall and winter, but that's not the whole story. Anglers flock to the watershed in the summer months to chase trout in high country lakes and streams. Other fly fishers target salmon on the fly in early fall. Stillwater fly fishers head to Lewiston Lake during every season for excellent trout fishing. And spring is the time for thick

Flies That Keep On Giving

I'm headed to Arkansas in April and I have talked to George Peters the guide and listened carefully to his instruction on what flies are usually available the dates we have scheduled. George mentioned scuds and they are both available in streams, rivers and lakes, what an all round fly. He told me they were an olive gray and I happen to have the materials, surprise. I am demonstrating a key component of hiring a guide, communication if you plan to fish with your own flies; I do acquire a few of each fly the guide uses to see what works in their world. I have asked they send me one of each pattern and tie them prior to my trip; they will not always accommodate my wishes unless they know me and realize I'm a repeat customer. Ask your question even the dumb ones they can always say no.



Easy Scud

Hook: Daiichi 1250 #14 Thread: UTC 70 Dark Olive Wire: UTC Small Fluorescent Orange or Small Copper Scud Back: Swiss Straw Gray

Dubbing: Olive Gray Antron, Orange Antron

Start the thread at the eye and catch your wire and wrap mid way down the bend leaving the wire to the rear. Tie in a small bunch of Olive dubbing with the fiber protruding to the rear to form the antennae and run the thread up just short of the eye. Swiss straw preparation, I unravel it and cut it in half length wise, a piece about four inches long, that is enough to tie several scud. Tie in the Swiss Straw just behind the head and secure with thread all the way back to the mid way point on the bend, keeping the Swiss straw on top and centered on the hook. Dub the body with the Olive Gary and add a little of the Orange to sit near the front of the fly. Lay the Swiss straw over and secure just behind the head. Carefully wrap the wire forward trapping the Swiss straw, use a bodkin to help keep thefibers of the dubbing being trapped on top of the Swiss straw, tie off just behind the head, whip finish and head cement. Now pick out from the bottom of the fly to form legs.

FFCOC FLY TYING CLASSES By: Cheryl Moore




What a fantastic time we had. I'm referring to the FFCOC Spring fly tying

5 DOT RANCH STILLWATER CLINIC

Hello friends, my name is Ernie Gulley (stream keeper) and I am a guide in the Eastern Sierra and a proud member of your Orange County Fly Fishers Club. I wanted to share what I feel is a very unique opportunity for all of my fellow "Stillwater" fly fishers and anyone who would like to learn "Stillwater Fly Fishing Tactics" This would be an excellent opportunity to get ready for the opening season of stillwater fishing and tools you can use for the rest of the year!

5-DOT Ranch is the largest working cattle ranch in the state of California. On the ranch there is a 400 acre private lake (Round Valley Reservoir) which is located between the town of Susanville and Eagle Lake. This reservoir is locally known as "5 DOT Res." and has very limited access. It is full of powerful Triploid Rainbow Trout and is the perfect place for any level of fly fisher to hone their stillwater skills.

Doug Ouellette who owns **Calvada Fly Fishing**, runs all of the clinics and guide services at 5 DOT. He has been fly fishing and teaching anglers advanced stillwater techniques for over 30 years. Doug is well known nationally for his expertise on stillwaters. He has fished many lakes and reservoirs across the United States, Canada, and New Zealand. He grew up learning his skills at California's Eagle Lake, Davis Lake. and Frenchman Res. He wrote a piece in John Barr's book "Barr Flies" pg.6 on the **"Floater no Cator"** technique. This year Doug will be accompanied by **Ernie Gulley who owns Ernie Gulley Fly Fishing Guide Service** is a premiere guide at the famous California stillwater Crowley Lake. His 30 years of "Stillwater" fishing, 15 years of these as Fly Fishing has acquired him a wealth of knowledge and his passion for stillwater fly fishing is unmatched and will be a tremendous asset to the "Outside the Box Clinics".

San Juan River Trip Report

Sixteen club members and family traveled to Navajo Dam, New Mexico last month to fish the San Juan River and for some to do some sight seeing. Saturday morning we drove to the river with outside temperature of 11 degrees and winds 20-30 mph with gusts much stronger. It didn't get a lot warmer that day but winds got much worse. Many of the boats couldn't make it down the river due to the strong winds. The weather did improve every day and despite cold weather and winds, the fishing was very good. Although there were some smaller fish caught this year, the average was 16-18 inch rainbows and browns with larger ones up to 24 inches. There were several stories of the big one that got away. Most of us stayed at Fisheads and the feedback was that the guides and accomodations were very good. The weather report for the day that we left was 55 degrees high with no wind. One Surf Fly Beach Classic Huntington State Beach April 27th

The early gray morning was greeting with a buzz between surfers wondering what was going on and surf anglers eager to get registered and in the water. We had 56 anglers fishing the event this year. The fishing began at 7:25am and went to 9:30am. There was plenty of good structure to go around for everyone. 129 fish were caught ranging from micro perch to a 22.5" halibut. The biggest fish landed was actually a 28" snagged halibut, but the angler did a wonderful job of fighting the fish to get his fly back. The first fish was landed at 7:27am.; a couple minutes after the start of the event. The most fish caught was at 14, with a mix bag of barred surf perch, walleye surf perch and yellowfin croaker. The biggest fish landed that counted was a 22.5" halibut. Club members Steve, John, and Gil helped out with the judging and other jobs for the event, and with that a big thanks.

Seventh Annual Rush Creek Cleanup



Saturday, June 22nd, 2013 Rush Creek, Silver Lake Resort, June Lake Loop, CA

Trash, from monofilament to old bait containers, will be picked up from Rush Creek, Silver Lake and down the canyon as far as Grant Lake by member club representatives of the Southwest Council Federation of Fly Fishers (FFF) on Saturday, June 22nd. The Seventh Annual Rush Creek Cleanup is slated for 8 a.m.noon, according to Joe Lemire, a member of the Streamborn Fly Fishing Club and SWC IFFF representative. Silver Lake Resort in the June Lake loop will provide a free barbeque lunch following the cleanup. Volunteers will pick up and dispose of trash along an approximately five-mile stretch of the eastern Sierra along the shoreline of Silver Lake and Rush Creek from the power plant above Silver Lake down the canyon to Grant Lake. "We've previously filled as many as 60 trash bags on our Rush Creek cleanup; this year we expect to haul out 30 to 40," Lemire said. Club volunteers are expected to carry out coolers, sun glasses, broken bottles, automobile hub caps, hundreds of feet of fishing line, hooks, lures and bobbers that are a death trap to wildlife. If enough volunteers show up this year, the cleanup can continue up the canyon and impact the environment as far as the Gull Lake area. Anglers who will be in the area and want to volunteer should meet at the Silver Lake boat ramp at 8 a.m.; bring gloves, hat, sun screen, trash pick-up sticks, boots and waders if you have them. Trash bags will be provided by Silver Lake Resort.

hatches of mayflies and stoneflies that bring big browns to the surface. So this watershed truly has something for everyone.

Our guide to this productive and scenic fly fishing destination is Andrew Harris, a northern California guide with 15 years of experience. Andrew began his career at Clearwater House on Hat Creek in 1997, guiding clients on the rivers surrounding Mt. Shasta and Mt. Lassen, including the Fall River, Pit River, Upper Sacramento River, McCloud River and Hat Creek. He gradually expanded his venues to include drift boat trips on the Lower Sacramento River, Feather River, Yuba River and Trinity River.

Andrew's guidebook to the Feather River country, <u>Plumas National Forest Trout Fishing Guide</u>, was published in 1999 by Frank Amato Publications. Andrew is a regular contributor to California Fly Fisher magazine and has also written for Sierra Fisherman and Northwest Fly Fishing magazines. He is a regular speaker at fly fishing clubs throughout northern California and has traveled extensively, spending time fly fishing the Bahamas, Belize, Costa Rica, Mexico, Venezuela, New Zealand, Chile and Tasmania.

Andrew graduated from U.C. Davis in 1998 with a degree in Environmental & Resource Science. Like many fly fishing guides, he wears more than one hat. Andrew created <u>LodgeRunner.com</u>, a web-based booking system for fly shops and lodges. This software is used by some of the leaders in the fly fishing world, including Silver Creek Outfitters and Henry's Fork Lodge in Idaho and Spotted Bear Lodge in Montana. LodgeRunner allows these businesses to schedule guides, take online bookings for guiding and lodging and manage all booking-related guest correspondence.

Andrew and his wife Katie live in Red Bluff with their daughters Mackenzie, 4, and Madison, 3. Andrew and Katie also manage Eagle Canyon Trophy Trout Lakes, a private catch-and-release fly fishing destination in the foothills of Mt. Lassen. The 2012-13 season was their third season managing this productive stillwater fishery. The fish at Eagle Canyon average 7 pounds and some weigh more than 15 pounds! Eagle Canyon is open from mid-November through mid-April.

Andrew and two of his colleagues took their guide business to the next level in 2008 by creating Confluence Outfitters, a regional guide service focused on the best trout and steelhead destinations in northern California and southern Oregon. Confluence Outfitters has six guides that work from the Lower Sac to the Lower Rogue and everything in between. Andrew's seasonal rotation includes year-round drift boat trips on the Lower Sac, summer trips on Fall River and nearby fisheries, and lots of guiding on the Trinity River. The Trinity is one of his top three guide destinations, keeping him very busy from mid-September through early March.

Andrew's presentation will cover the Trinity River watershed from top to bottom. He will show and explain high-country trout fishing, stillwater opportunities, steelhead fishing with both single and two-handed rods, salmon fishing and techniques for catching the plentiful wild brown trout on the Trinity.
