## Flies That Keep On Giving

### The Birds Nest

Hook: #16 1x long can be tied #8-#20

Optional: Lead wire wraps

Thread: Olive 8X or 70

Rib: Fine copper wire

Tail: Light olive mallard flank feather

Dubbing: Olive Opossum

Legs: Light olive mallard flank feather

If you want a lead weighted fly add it first about 12 wraps will do. Start your thread at the eye and run it to the bend. Tie in 8 to 10 olive mallard flank feathers barbles  $\frac{1}{2}$  the shank length extending to the rear of the hook, this can easily be done by clipping the center tip of the mallard flank feather. Tie in the copper wire for the rib. Dub the hook forward to the  $\frac{2}{3}$  point. Rib the abdomen and tie off in front of the  $\frac{2}{3}$  point. To create the legs take the mallard flank feather you just cut the tip out of and remove any webby material from both sides and lay the feather first side toward you and hold with your thumb the other side with the index finger and start your thread wrap this will distribute the feather evenly around the hook, the legs should extend to  $\frac{1}{2}$  way down the tail. Dub the head leaving it very buggy looking with loose fibers all round, Pick out fibers with Velcro or wire brush. Whip finish and head cement.

A great western fly for just about anywhere.

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## FFCOC By-Laws Update

The FFCOC Board of Directors have been working to update the Club’s by-laws. The by-laws were last updated eleven years ago in April 2002. The main revisions to the by-laws being recommended by the Board are:

1. Specifying the use of electronic communications and voting whenever possible while allowing members to continue to receive hard copy materials and to vote by mail if they choose.
2. Making the by-laws gender neutral.
3. Raising the minimum age for club members to eighteen for insurance and liability reasons. The current age limit for Regular Members is “the age limit for legal California fishing license”. This change eliminates the category of Junior Members. However, children of family members would continue to be Associate Members as specified in the by-laws.
4. Specifying that the Annual Meeting of the general membership is normally held in January *or* February.

As stated in [ARTICLE XIII, AMENDMENTS, Section 2 of the by-laws](#), the Board of Directors can amend the by-laws by majority at regularly scheduled board meeting. However when the by-laws were amended in 2002, the following provision was included in ARTICLE XIII, AMENDMENTS, Section 2:

# To Net or Not to Net

I'll start by saying that there are some fly fishermen who scoff at the notion of carrying a net, and rightly so in *some* specific cases. There are also many great reasons to carry a net. We'll explore the pros and cons of this oftentimes misunderstood accessory. We'll also cover some dos and don'ts of netting fish.

### Cons To Using A Net

Let's begin with when you *shouldn't* use a net. (Enter cricket sounds.) All joking aside, I have a fly fishing buddy who swears by *not* using a net. His technique is to gently cradle the fish with one hand against his leg. Being that he only ever uses barbless flies, removing the hook is a snap, and the fish is quickly on its way. This keeps the fish in the water, ideally with his mouth pointed into the flow, and puts little stress on him. A quick lift provides a good photo opportunity, albeit a risky one if the fish decides to buck. As you can imagine, *it's easier to get around without having a net slowing you down. They can fall off, drift away, or get snagged at inopportune moments* (This is why you always should have it tethered to your person) and have you backtracking or paddling to recover it. I have done this and learned my lesson! A good net will cost you a few dollars that you could potentially spend on other things.



### Pros To Using A Net

A net that is the right size, length, and material, can be a blessing when you most need it. Carrying a net is really about being prepared for the big one. Take last year for instance. My friend and I were on a Sierra Creek that was full of fat 15+ rainbows. Our guide had large long-handled net that I made specifically for him and this type of fishing, so I chose to travel light and leave mine in the car. Turns out, he went home early and I ended up hooking a 23" cutthroat. The only net we had was a smaller version that my buddy was carrying downstream.

The fish really didn't fit in this small net, but we were able to get his head in the net, and safely remove the hook. Then, we clicked off a few photos, and released him safely. I doubt I would have gotten the shot if I hadn't had a net, as he was barely hooked on the flesh of the lip. A net allows you to revive the fish in the water without undue pressure caused by holding the fish. This may also end up with him getting swept away in the current, or swimming away while still out of it and turning belly up moments later. *Here is the most important reason though, in my opinion,* to carry a net. If one uses no net, it is likely that he will have to play out the fish longer in order to get a solid grip on him. This is bad for the fish! During a fight, lactic acid builds up in the fish's muscles. A lengthy fight can kill a trout long after the supposed successful release. This phenomenon is exacerbated by warm water and larger fish which tend to build up lactic acid faster, and release it slower. Next, it is likely that the fish will buck as soon as you touch it, and trout are notoriously difficult to hold. Many anglers, at this point, may even have the leader in their other hand. By doing this, you have removed the spring (your rod) from the line, and it is likely the fish will break the tippet. He then swims away with your fly and possibly some tippet in its mouth, and you haven't got a photo to even prove you caught it. There is nothing very good about this scenario.

we will be seeing examples of this from many diverse places, including Montana, Colorado, the Great Lakes and Alaska.

There is no one better to teach us these skills than Landon Mayer.

Landon was born and raised in Colorado Springs where he began his fly fishing career in the 6th grade when his middle school offered fly casting lessons. Throughout his teens, Landon's love of the sport grew when he spent all his free time in local fly shops and watching VHS tapes by Gary Borger and Doug Swisher until the tapes actually wore out!

After graduating high school, Landon pursued a career as a full time guide in Colorado, learning from great Colorado anglers such as Ed Engle, Pat Dorsey and fly tyer John Barr. At the same time, Landon began publishing articles in magazines *High Country Angler*, *American Angler*, *Fly Rod & Reel*, and *Fly Fisherman*.

Passion and love for the sport are what motivates Landon and drives him to continually learn more and perfect his fly fishing skills. His success has also been fueled by an addiction to pursue large trout with small flies and lightweight fly fishing equipment. His travels take him to Mexico, Alaska, Belize, and all around the United States where he constantly develops new and successful tactics.

In 2007, Landon's first book, *How to Catch the Biggest Trout of Your Life*, was published by Wild River Press, followed by his DVD *Landing the Trout of Your Life*. With his own guide service going full tilt, Landon went on to share even more techniques and secrets in his books *Sight Fishing for Trout* (Stackpole Books 2010) and *Colorado's Best Fly Fishing* (Stackpole/Headwater Books 2011), as well as the 2008 DVD *Weapons of Bass Production*.

Landon is an ambassador for Simms fly fishing apparel and an advisory team member of Simms, Ross Reels, Scientific Anglers, Smith Optics, Fishpond luggage and accessories and Outcast pontoon boats, float tubes and rafts. Landon has also designed flies currently produced and distributed by Umpqua and is working on his fourth book, *On the Water with Landon Mayer*, that is scheduled for publication in 2014 from Headwater Books.

Together with his wife Michelle (who shares his passion for the sport) and their four children, Landon continues to live near his home waters of the South Platte River in Colorado where he teaches fly fishing through guiding, fly fishing classes and by giving presentations on his techniques throughout the country. MAMMOTH LAKES, Calif. – Club members have an early opportunity to register for the 2013 Fly Fishing Faire, “but you have to hurry” as stated by your president Melinda B.

The Faire, sponsored by the Fly Fishing Club of Orange County and 22 other clubs in the Southwest Council, will be Sept. 20-22 at Cerro Coso Community College, Mammoth Lake.

“It will be a cornucopia of all things fly-fishing in the heart of California’s fly-fishing world; an introduction to all aspects of the sport including beginner and intermediate fly casting, fly tying demonstrations and both classroom and on-the-water instruction,” announced Connie Bullock, Santa Clarita, Faire coordinator.

Fly Fishing Faire 2013 will feature programs, demonstrations and hands-on lessons by writer, photographer and champion fly-caster Brian O’Keefe.

“Classes and seminars will be presented by the ‘best in the game’ including fly-casters, fly-tiers, Eastern Sierra professional guides, entomologists and fisheries biologists,” said Bullock.

Program highlights include –

Improving casting distance, O’Keefe;

Presentation and Accuracy, Steve Osterman;

Extended Body Flies by Naomi Okamoto;

Learning to casting with either arm, Marshall Bissett;

Flyfishing Hot Creek, Owens River, Lake Crowley, and Walker River Basin; and Wildlife photography.

Conservation fund-raising raffles and auctions will feature rods, reels, angling art and guided fishing trips.

Fly Fishing Faire admission is \$15 adult or \$20 per family; ages 16-years and younger are free. Eastern Sierra residents receive a \$5 rebate. A single admission is good all Faire days. Select classes and seminars have additional registration fees.

**Any amendment relating to membership voting by mail must be submitted to all members for their written vote by mail, as prescribed in these By-Laws.**

Because the amendments currently recommended by the board allow use of electronic voting in addition written ballots, the board believes the above provision requires that the recommended changes be submitted to the full membership for vote by written ballot.

Therefore, in the coming weeks, each Club member with voting rights will be receiving a ballot to vote on the acceptance or rejection of the amendments recommended by the Board of Directors. ### **Things To Do**

Carry a net that can handle 90% of the fish on a given body of waterwater.

Carry a "rubber" net that easily gives back your hooks, saving precious time preparing for your next fish. These types of bags also dry with a quick shake and won't remain smelling like the quarry.

Do leave the fish in the water and facing the current while removing hooks and taking pictures.

Wet your net and hand before ever touching a fish. This will preserve their slime coat, and therefore, their life.

Use barbless hooks or pinch down the barb. You will find you don't lose any more fish so long as you keep a bend in the rod. This will make it that much easier to remove the hook(s) form the fish and the net without damaging either or your fly.

Always tether your net to your person.

Net the fish head-first

Carry a nice looking wooden net. It makes for a much better photograph!

### **Things Not To Do**

NEVER lay a trout on grass or especially dirt/ sand even while in a net.

Don't carry a net without it being tethered to your person.

*Don't use imported nets. They are ugly. (I may be a bit biased on this one.)*
