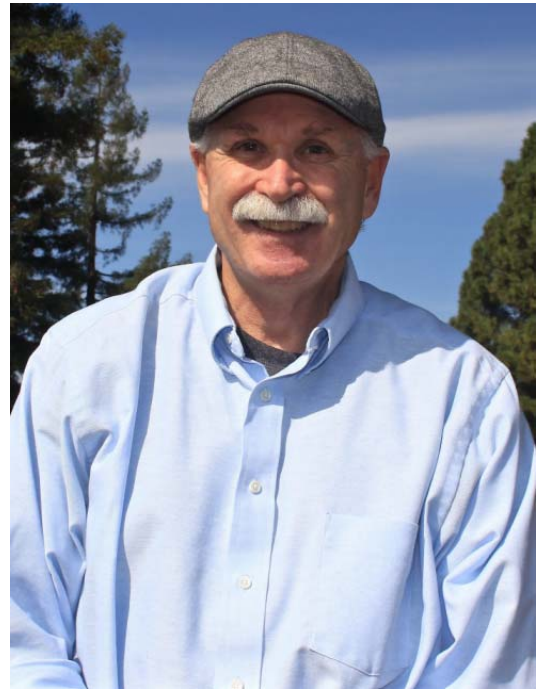
This Month's Meeting

YUCATAN'S BABY TARPON

Ken Hanley

I have always wanted to catch a Tarpon on a fly rod. As I read and watched videos of Stu Apte, Billy Pate, and Lefty Kreh catch these monster fish, I knew that someday I wanted to catch a Silver King... but living in southern California I really never had the right opportunity to fish for these silver torpedoes. For many fly fishermen Tarpon are among the most desired game fish in the world, and I had shared this fever and was determined to catch one.

It was our 25th wedding anniversary- my wife, Lisa, wanted to relax on a Caribbean cruise. It was the perfect situation... we could fly to Puerto Rico a few days early before our ship departed for the Caribbean, and I could fish for Tarpon in San Juan. We arrived in San Juan and the next morning I was walking down a long dock to meet Roberto my guide for the day. This is where I met my first challenge- a 3-1/2 foot iguana was sunning itself right in the middle of the dock. I hate anything that crawls or slithers, but I managed to step around the beast without having a heart attack. I got into the boat and Roberto and I departed for Tarpon water. We entered a mangrove lined lagoon- the water was the color of tea and appeared lifeless. Roberto instructed me to cast near the bank... my heart was pumping and I was stripping line very, very fast. "Slow down" Roberto said softly—"Let your fly sink". All of a sudden the water exploded, and I had hooked my first baby Tarpon. The fish never did jump- it stayed deep and after about fifteen minutes I landed a nice 15 lb fish. Roberto pinched off one scale from the Tarpon's body and gave it to me. It was the size of a large quarter, and I still have that scale today as a remembrance of my first Tarpon caught on a fly rod. I managed to catch two more Tarpon that day, including a 60 lb fish that jumped several times and just plain tore me apart. I could only imagine catching a 100 lb Tarpon and what it does to a novice Tarpon angler.



Our speaker this month is Ken Hanley. Ken is one of the most dynamic and enthusiastic speakers I know. He is going to take us to the Yucatan and share with us one of the most exciting experiences with a fly rod that you will ever encounter... fishing for baby Tarpon. Ken has been a fly fishing ambassador since the early 70's. He is a guide, instructor, and has worked with thousands of students in the field. He is the author of seven fly fishing books, and he also writes and photographs for both international and regional publications in the outdoor industry. Ken's extensive field experience spans the globe from Tibet to the remote wilderness regions of Asia, New Zealand, Mexico, Europe and North America. Ken's presentation will cover tackle, field tactics, the Tarpon's life cycle, and he will take us into the thick jungles, rivers and estuaries of Mexico's Yucatan.

This will also be the FFCOC's Christmas evening celebration. It will be a great time to share with each other the spirit of Christmas and enjoy the holiday excitement. I am sure that Santa will have some Christmas "cheer" for all the members in attendance, so you do not want to miss this special evening. See you there.... and remember to pursue your fly fishing dreams.

Five Days of Backcountry Fishing

June 10-14, 2017

Itinerary:

***Day One:** Meet at the Pack Station in June Lake at 7:00 a.m., when breakfast will be served. We will partner you up with a horse to match your ability and then ride into the beautiful Ansel Adams Wilderness. Our lunch and fishing stop will be beside Crest Creek, where there will be plenty of Spawning Rainbow from Gem Lake. We will then continue to our first camp at Clark Lakes. There will be plenty of time to fish that evening for Brookies in the four nearby lakes.

***Day Two:** After breakfast, we will take a day ride to Thousand Island Lake and the headwaters of the San Joaquin River. There, you will fish for Rainbow/Golden hybrids. Our emphasis is on catch-and-release, but you are always welcome to enjoy your freshly caught backcountry trout with your dinner. After dinner, we will be fishing the Clark Lakes.

***Day Three:** We will break camp in the morning and travel to Algers Lakes, stopping along the way to fish beautiful Rush Creek, known for both Brookies and Rainbows. At our base camp, you will have the best opportunity for catching large Golden Trout. We will spend the balance of the day fishing near camp and rounding off the evening with stories from the campfire.

***Day Four:** The group will have the whole day to fish Algers Lakes and find your favorite spot. You can expect to catch Golden's from 10-16 inches.

***Day Five:** Fish in the morning. After having lunch at the camp, we will return to the Pack Station, arriving at 4:00 p.m.

What to Expect:

- Check in time is 7:00 a.m. at Frontier Pack Train in June Lake.
- Breakfast is served the first day while gear is packed on the mules. The last meal furnished is lunch on the last day.
- Dunnage limit is **40 lbs. per person**. This includes sleeping bags, fishing gear, liquor.

- We provide a saddle bag for trail essentials. We do not suggest bringing saddle bags or backpacks unless pocket size.
- No alcoholic beverages served or included in trip fee but you can BYOB but the weight counts against your 40lbs limit.
- Transportation provided for return to June Lake for trips terminating at other road heads.
- Trips will terminate at 4:00 p.m. the last day.
- FRONTIER does **not** treat the water. Bring your own filter pump or purification tablets.
- We furnish stock, packer, cook, food, and camping equipment. Private tents for couples or singles will be reserved by request. All trips are outfitted with chairs, solar showers and privy.

The Pack Station can Supply Bear Boxes \$5.00 each per day.Box Size 16" x 16" x 24"

Wilderness Permit \$5.00 per person additional

Personal Checklist

- Sleeping bag/foam pad or air mattress
- Flashlight/extra batteries
- Coffee mug
- Broad brimmed hat (must have string to keep from blowing off)
- Camera, extra SD card and extra batteries
- Rain pants & coat or slicker
- Riding boots & camp shoes
- Insect repellent
- Sun Screen and Chap Stick
- Polarized Sunglasses
- Bathing suit
- Hat protector from rain
- Heavy Jacket
- Canteen

- Personal hygiene kit (including towel)

Please use biodegradable soap and shampoo.

- Bring gear in nylon duffels - sleeping bag and pads separate
- Liquor should be labeled and checked in separately

We will be traveling to 9,000' elevation the first day and eventually to 11,000' elevation. Please come a day or two ahead of the trip to acclimate to at least 7,000'. Drink plenty of water and limit the alcohol intake prior to the trip; Altitude sickness can ruin a trip.

- **Fishing equipment:**

4-6 weight Rod and Reel with floating line.

7 to 9 foot leaders 5x bring 4,5,6 and 7 X tippet

Split shot BB and smaller

Flies:

- Parachute Adams #14-18
- Stimulator in orange #12-16
- Caddis #16-18
- Hopper #10-14
- Griffith Gnat #16-22
- Klinkhammer #16-18
- Glo Bug #16 Orange
- Wooly Bugger #8-12 Black & Olive
- Bring what you own already; there are many flies that work well in the high altitude backcountry of the Sierra's. The above list of flies has worked well for me in the past.

Fly Tying

Flies That Keep On Giving

Montana has beckoned; a week in June of 2017 is on the ticket. If all goes well major hatches of some of my favorite large dries will be on the water. Last month was the Green Drake and this month using the same technique to form the abdomen, here is another favorite to fish. I plan on being ready whatever is in the water .

Willie's Stone Adult



By John Williams

This fly is tied in two stages, the extended bodies and the rest of the fly to finish. This extended body technique can be used for Mayflies, Hoppers, Damselflies, Dragonflies, and Stoneflies.

First the Extended Body:



Extended Body

Needle:	A Robust Needle that comes to a sharp point
Tail:	Turkey Biots Black
Abdomen:	Craft foam 2mm thick cut to 1/4" wide in Tan and Orange cut 2" long one piece of each per tail required.
Thread:	UTC 140 Fluorescent Fire Orange
Coloring:	Pantone Permanent Marker PMS 62
Glue:	Super Glue

Place the needle in your vice and secure level. Make a few warps around the needle very near the point and wrapping back down the needle about 1 1/4" away from the point sparsely and run the thread back to the point. Trim the pieces of foam to a rounded point. Place a smear of super glue on the bottom orange piece of foam at the tip area and lay your splayed biots extending beyond the end of the foam to form the tails under the needle and secure with a couple of wraps of thread to hold it against the needle point. Place a slight smear of super glue on the brown foam tip of the opposing foam piece that will match to the previous foam piece and sandwich together to form the abdomen with a few wraps of thread and press together the two pieces of foam. Make for or five wraps of thread at the point to secure

the sandwich and move the thread away from the tip over the top of the tan foam a small ways back down the needle with four or five wraps of thread, doing this in succession to form five or six body sections that get larger as your space between each increases. At this time color the foam with the permanent pantone marker leaving an orange section exposed on the underside of the foam, the marker will not stick well to super glue so be sparse. Add a slight smear of super glue to your hanging thread and make three wraps of thread on the last section and make two whip finishes to secure. Add a slight smear of super glue to the base of the tail biots at the foam to secure them. Make several of these and set aside to dry, give them an hour so everything is dry. *Warning you will get super glue on yourself, be prepared, acetone gets it off. You have to work fast or the super glue sets and the abdomen section and is stuck to the needle, you can smear the needle with wax to help it from sticking prior to this build.*

Now Finish the Fly:



Hook:	Daiichi 1710 Nymph Hook
Thread:	UTC 140 Fluorescent Fire Orange
Extended Body:	From previous section of instruction
Under Wing:	Crystal Flash Pearl
Wing:	Deer Hair White or similar
Head:	Dark Natural Deer Hair
Tool:	Pen barrel with guts removed, find the correct size to match
Leg fibers:	Medium Round Rubber Legs Black
Coloring:	Pantone Permanent Marker PM 62
Glue:	Super Glue

Slide the hook point between the two pieces of foam on the opposite end from the tails and slide it between about 1/4" and force it out the middle of the orange foam. Slide the abdomen piece up the shank so you can get the hook in your vice level. Slide the abdomen piece now down the bend and start your thread at the eye and make touching wraps of thread to the bend while holding the two sides of foam apart in this process. Cut the excess foam off 1/8" beyond the last tie off point of the abdomen. Smear a small drop of super glue on 1/4" of the hook shank from the bend forward. Slide the abdomen section forward and secure with several wraps of thread making sure it is in place as the super glue sets. Cut a

small clump of crystal flash and secure to the top of the hook shank on top of the tie off point of the foam. Cut a small clump of deer hair from the white and secure over the crystal flash extending to the split of the tail at the base of the foam as we did with the crystal flash. Cut a slightly larger clump of deer hair from the darker deer hide and clean and stack to align the tips, cut the butts to a length that lets you fold the shank of the deer hair back to form the bullet head. Place the bundle of hair on the hook shank behind the eye with the butts facing to the rear and the tips over the eye and secure with several wraps of thread letting the bundle spin and flair around the shank. Draw the fibers to the rear grabbing all of them and slide the pen barrel over the eye and to the rear slightly to form a bullet head. Make several wraps of thread to secure the hair leaving a beautiful bullet head. Tie in two rubber legs on either side with the legs to the rear the length of the body and the fronts cut 2/3 the length of the rear. Rotate the fly 180 degrees in the vice with the bottom facing upward. Trim off any bullet head fibers hanging below the body so the fly rides on the surface. Rotate the fly back and smear super glue on the thread and make several wraps and whip finish and trim off thread. I use a magnet to hold the fly as it dries so I can move on to the next one.
