

This Month's Meeting



25 Ways to Elevate Your Trout Game by Ed Engle

In June we welcome back Colorado angler and author Ed Engle. His new program offers 25 tips that he believes will raise your trout fishing to the next level. Fly fishing is full of game changing small details and tricks of the trade. Ed's tips come from the more than 40 years he has spent writing and speaking about fly fishing tactics, studying trout behavior, tying flies, guiding fly fishers and just fishing. Some are so obvious they may not have occurred to you. Others are more complicated. Some are controversial. But all of them will get you thinking about your fly fishing game and what you can to improve it. You'll learn that having the ability to let go of all your preconceived notions often results in success and may ultimately carry over into a more thoughtful and innovative approach to all of your days on the water.

Ed Engle has been an avid fly fisherman for the past 40 years and has fly fished throughout the continental United States, Alaska, Mexico, Chile, Argentina, Canada and Europe for a variety of game fish species, but with a special emphasis on trout. He was born in Virginia, though has lived most of his life in Colorado. He got into fly fishing when he saw people catching fish using this method, expressed a desire to do it and was fortunate when his dad gave him a starter kit. Ed attended the University of Colorado in Boulder and graduated with a degree in biology. Living in Colorado, Ed has had ample opportunity to perfect his skills on all kinds of streams, using all types of flies. Today his home and office are just west of Colorado Springs, within 40 miles of the South Platte River, one of Colorado's premier tailwaters.

Ed's fly fishing articles have appeared regularly in newspapers and magazines for more than 35 years. In the 1970's, his articles on nymphing techniques were among the first to appear in national fly fishing magazines. Since that time he has taught thousands of fly fishers the subtle art of nymphing through his books and articles, on-the-water seminars and at his popular nymphing class sponsored by the Fly Fishing Show. Ed is especially interested in small fly tactics and techniques. His small fly research has taken him to many of the west's famous tailwater and spring creeks across the country. He is also dedicated to fly fishing small streams for beautiful wild trout. Ed balances his interest in the "small side of fly fishing" with the avid pursuit of king salmon on the fly.

Ed is a regular contributor to the *Boulder Daily Camera* and *Gray's Sporting Journal*. In addition, he has written for *American Angler*, *Fly Fisherman*, *Fly Rod* & *Reel*, *Flyfishing* & *Tying Journal*, *Trout*, *Fly Tyer*, *Sports Afield*, and *Saltwater Fly Fishing*.

If we look at the books he has authored we can see yet another reason he is so qualified to lead us on this journey. Ed's most recent book, *Trout Lessons* (Stackpole, 2010), considers what to do when your usual fly fishing solutions don't work. His interest in tying and fishing small flies led to the publication of *Tying Small Flies* (Stackpole, 2004) and *Fishing Small Flies* (Stackpole, 2005). The two-volume set is credited with helping create the current surge of interest in pursuing trout with small flies. Ed's dedication to fishing bamboo fly rods resulted in the publication of *Splitting Cane* (Stackpole, 2002) which chronicled the life and craftsmanship of sixteen working rod makers. His first fly fishing book, *Fly Fishing the Tailwaters* (Stackpole, 1991), was a groundbreaking explanation of how to fish the regulated rivers found below dams.

Ed's current projects include writing posts for his popular, *Lone Angler Journal* blog, work on a new book, coming up with new small fly patterns, and teaching at fly fishing seminars throughout the country.

Trip/Event Reports

We Got Braided and Furled!

The announcement of a class offered by Young Kwon on the mysteries of braiding leaders caught the attention of a group of curious FFCOC members. We met on two Saturdays and found that Young is a zen master of braiding. It is an art also known as furling and was utilized centuries ago by the earliest fly fishers for their lines and leaders.


During the first class, we learned how to hand braid/furl Mongolian horsehair into amazing small stream dry fly leaders. This entailed a degree of hand dexterity and visual acuity that challenged us all. It is an interesting process to learn to take two long pieces of horsehair and twist them and have that skill produce an effective trout leader. It can additionally be a great way to keep your hands and mind exercised.


The next Saturday introduced us to another technique that can create tapered leaders made from a variety of materials ranging from fine silk thread to monofilament. The technique developed by Young can produce a variety of fishing tools ranging from very fine small stream dry fly leaders, to Tenkara lines, to a 40' or more limp fly line. Young explained the formulas and demonstrated the technique of turning a spool of Uni-thread 3/0 into a very sweet 9' knotless tapered leader.

On a personal note, I had experimented with making heavy braided/furled fluorocarbon salt water leaders and still have a 12' jig board hanging from the ceiling of my garage. I spent a lot of time on Google trying to learn about the furling process. Young has developed skills and methods much advanced from any I had known about previously. I definitely found the class rewarding and I now own more horsehair and will build a Bic Pen jig like Young has designed.

Trip Report - The Green River and Loa - Tom Sakai

Here's a recent trip report on a trip to the Green River and Loa. We fished with Gordon Therrian of On the Fly Utah at Green River, takin advantage of a 2 for 1 deal offered to the Club (offered at auction recently). Gordon is one of the most experienced guides on the Green. The Green has been on my bucket list for years, so I had to take advantage of this offer. We arrived at Green River on a Sunday afternoon and checked into our room at Flaming Gorge Resort. FGR is a "one stop shop" offering rooms, a good restaurant (we ate all of our meals there), and a store with a decent fly shop. The next morning we met our guide Gordon. Here's our launching point, below Flaming Gorge Dam.





Action on Day One was pretty good, in spite of challenging weather. The wind was blowing, up to 50 knots at times. But, we caught our share.





Day Two was pretty slow in spite of Gordon's best efforts. Later, we found out that Utah Fish and Game had electroshocked the river that morning and hadn't notified any of the guides. To make things worse, they had adjusted the flows on the river to enable Fish and Game to use their jetboat. As a result the river ran off color and mossy all day!





Day Three we walked and waded the "A" section below the dam for a few hours. Caught some nice fish on dry flies and emergers.





In spite of the challenging fishing on day two, I'd definitely go back to the Green and fish with Gordon, probably on my schedule for next spring!

After a one night, ½ day stop in Heber City (between Park City and Provo) with minimal success on the Middle Provo River, we decided to make a stop in Loa Utah at the end of our trip. Loa is a small town (two restaurants, one hotel) located about 45 miles south of Interstate 70 and 70 miles northeast of Zion National Park. We contacted with Mike James, of Quiet Fly Fisher. Mike was booked but we used his guide Troy for a day of great fishing in a couple of the lakes on Thousand Lakes Mountain. Mike had advised us that the streams in the area were not fishing well. FFCOC Goes to Deep Creek for the First FiT (Fishing in Town) Trip

On Sunday, April 22, six hardy fly fishers made the trip to Deep Creek for the club's first Fishing in Town (FiT) event. FiT is the new series of trips created by member Young Jik Kwon and designed to add more shorter day trips that members can participate in at local fisheries. We met at Jensen's Minute Shoppe in Cedar Glen, and then drove out Hook Creek Road—which transitions from pavement to dirt road (4x4 and high clearance recommended)—to park and hike the rest of the way in.

Deep Creek is at altitude but the weather was good, starting in the morning at a cool 58 but transitioning to 70s and sunny by midday. Deep Creek flows in a boulder-filled canyon with cliffs rising on either side, and with willow, nettles, and other brush and scrub growing wildly. As well, downed trees and limbs sometimes block paths and blackened wood from the fire of a decade ago remains, often piled where flash flooding has left it. It's a gorgeous landscape but also a challenging negotiation as one moves from pool to pool.

The water was 50 degrees and almost crystal clear, with only a little color, and so the fish were skittish and easily spooked, but approaching pools from below and casting dry flies ahead of the small wild rainbows elicited strikes and the group landed several pretty wild rainbows.

Our six fly fishers, Young Jik Kwon (trip leader,), Larry Behm, Matt Werner, Nelson & Laurie Arroyo, and Andy Gottlieb, split up into teams of two and chose sections of the stream to fish. Deep creek is narrow water, with broader and deeper pools in places; even two people fishing together are smart to take turns casting.

The best places to cast to were predictably in fast water bubbling below falls, and the seams as the quicker water tailed out into deeper pools. Even as the sun rose high in midday, the little rainbows rose to hit the dries, so nymphing really wasn't needed. The largest fish brought to hand topped about ten inches, with many in the six-inch range. Flies used included Elk hair caddis, Adams, and Stimulators usually in size 14 or 16.

There's other wildlife in the area, and aside from a lone Arroyo toad, the group ran into one Western Diamondback, who rattled then moseyed away into the brush. When in Deep Creek, use caution and keep your eyes open, and as Larry reminded us, don't reach your hands onto any ledge you can't see onto. There were a few other people hiking around the creek, though, and chances are good wildlife will hear you before you see them. Also watch out for fire ants that can be on the ground or in trees.

A wading staff is a good idea, as rocks are slick when algae covered, and studs or aluminum bars on wading boots can be a plus. Bring plenty of water or a filter pump. Deep Creek is a great place to always travel in a group in case something happens. The rewards in exercise, scenery, and beautiful wild fish in hand can be worth it.

To get there, from Cedar Glen, travel out Hook Creek road. Park at the first lot, (bring an Adventure Pass for the car,) then hike the quarter-mile in to the bridge, and hike upstream or downstream.

Any member can propose and lead a FiT trip. The FiT trips are FFCOC members only, and all members must have a completed insurance form on file with the club. The trips will usually have a limited number of slots. Speak to Young or Art if interested if you want to create and lead a trip.

Fly Tying

Flies That Keep On Giving

By John Williams

Mayflies are an abundant source of protein for fish. I'm headed to Utah in June and again in September and know they love mayflies. I can fish this as a dropper below a hopper or in a nymph rig by itself. Easy to tie and cheep.

Willie's Mayfly Emerger



(Sorry, the photo washed out the color of silver.)

Hook: Daiichi 1120 #14
Bead: Tungsten 3/32 Nickel
Thread: UTC 140 Black

Shuck/Abdomen: Silver Satin Cord unraveled strand from Joann's fabrics.

Rib: Small Copper Wire

Opening Wing: CDC feather in Cream or White

Thorax: Peacock Herl

Slide the bead on small hole first. Start the thread at the head and then start the copper wire rib and run the thread down into the bend stopping 1/3 into it, let the copper wire lie to the rear for now. Cut a piece of satin cord and break it down into a single strand of cord about 3" long, unravel the twists and cut the strands even with you scissors. Tie the cord in with the unraveled end extending a hook length beyond the bend. Wrap the remaining cord forward to form the abdomen to the 2/3 forward position and secure with a couple wraps of thread. Counter wrap the copper wire forward to rib the abdomen and wrap to the bead, secure with thread and helicopter off. Run the thread back to the 2/3 forward position. Pick a light colored CDC feather and stroke the barbs forward to gather them and tie the tip section of the feather in at this point, leave it to the rear for now. Dub the thorax wit two-peacock herls and tie off behind the bead. Pull the CDC feather over the thorax and secure with several wraps of thread with a whip finish and trim off any straggler barbules from the CDC.
