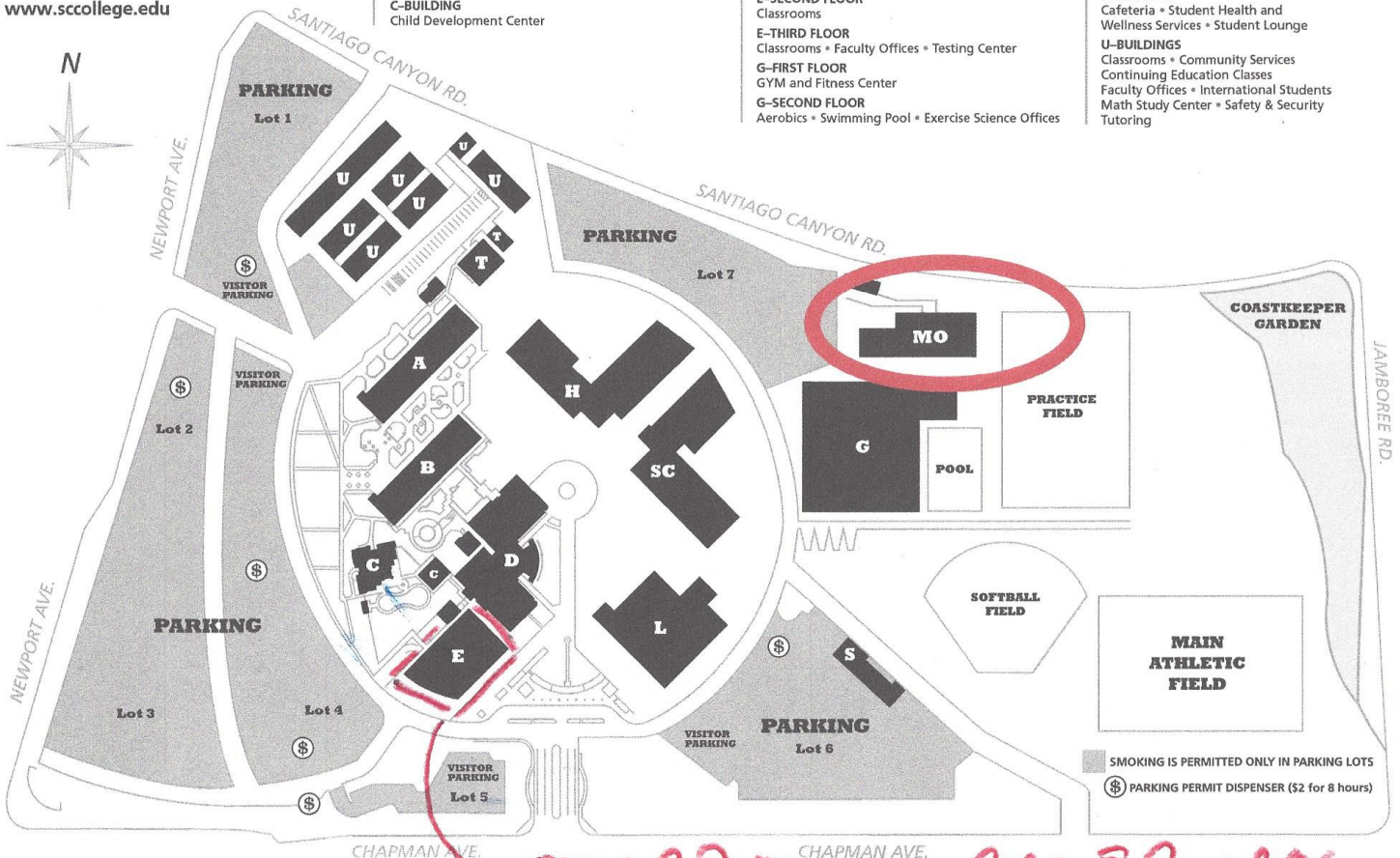

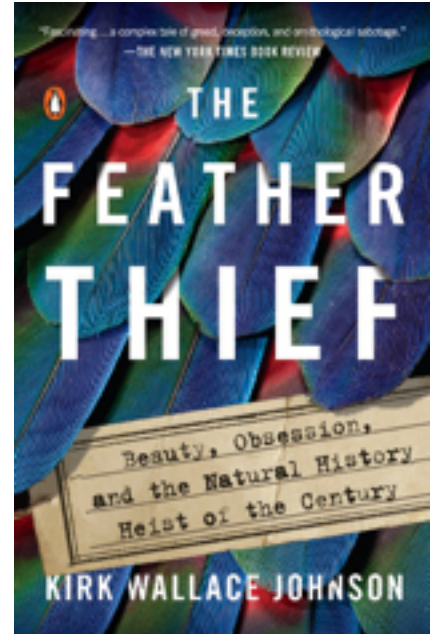
This Month's Meeting

THE FEATHER THIEF – KIRK W JOHNSON

The publication of Kirk Johnson's book:

The Feather Thief: Beauty, Obsession, and the Natural History Heist of the Century

sent shockwaves through the fly fishing and especially the fly-tying world. The book, which reads more like crime fiction than history, reveals the lengths to which fanatics can go in search of authentic materials to tie classic salmon flies. Kirk will discuss Edwin Rist's transformation from a young fly-tying prodigy into the perpetrator of one of the largest natural history museum heists in a century. After a blow-by-blow of the heist, the police investigation, and the resulting sentencing, he will walk through his own descent into what he jokingly refers to as the "feather underground," in a years-long search for the missing birds. He'll also give a sense of how the community has reacted or changed in the wake of the book's publication, and what the future looks like for classic salmon fly-tiers. There will be plenty of time for questions. He will also be selling and signing books (cash or check only).



Here he sets the scene:

On a cool June evening in 2009, after performing a concert at London's Royal Academy of Music, twenty-year-old American flautist Edwin Rist boarded a train for a suburban outpost of the British Museum of Natural History. Home to one of the largest ornithological collections in the world, the Tring museum was full of rare bird specimens whose gorgeous feathers were worth staggering amounts of money to the men who shared Edwin's obsession: the Victorian art of salmon fly-tying. Rist had been there before, months earlier, posing as a student photographer. He was granted access to the collection, and used his time to case the place, taking photographs of the layout of the museum, and making a mental map of the location of each species. After scaling a wall behind the museum and breaking out a window, the champion fly-tier climbed inside and set out to work. He grabbed hundreds of bird skins—some collected 150 years earlier by a contemporary of Darwin's, Alfred Russel Wallace, who'd risked everything to gather them—and escaped into the darkness.



Not too long after that, I was waist-high in a frigid river in northern New Mexico, fly-fishing for trout, when the guide I'd hired for the day mentioned a recent museum heist, carried out to feed the insatiable demand for rare feathers in the salmon fly-tying community. The whole story was so strange as to be almost unbelievable.

I had never written a book when I first heard about the Tring Heist, but thought it sounded like a whale of a story, and started poking around, not realizing how quickly I'd be dragged into the feather underground.

What followed was a sprawling, six-year investigation, taking me around the globe in search of Edwin, the missing skins, and some measure of justice. *The Feather Thief* is that account.

Kirk W. Johnson is the author of

The Feather Thief: Beauty, Obsession, and the Natural History Heist of the Century

and

To Be a Friend is Fatal: the Fight to Save the Iraqis America Left Behind.

which covers his work coordinating the reconstruction of Fallujah and his subsequent efforts on behalf of Iraqi refugees as the founder of The List Project to Settle Iraqi Allies.

His writing has appeared in *The New Yorker*, the *New York Times*, the *Washington Post*, the *Los Angeles Times*, the *Washington Post Magazine*, the *Wall Street Journal*, and *Foreign Policy*, among others.

Johnson previously served in Iraq with the U.S. Agency for International Development in Baghdad and then Fallujah as the Agency's first coordinator for reconstruction in the war-torn city.

He is a Senior Fellow at the USC Annenberg Center on Communication Leadership and Policy, and the recipient of fellowships from the American Academy in Berlin, Yaddo, MacDowell, and the Wurlitzer Foundation. Prior to his work in Iraq, he conducted research on political Islamism as a Fulbright Scholar in Egypt. Johnson received his BA from the University of Chicago in 2002. A resident of Studio City, Kirk is an avid fly fisherman.

Fishing in Town (FIT) Announcement:

Mouth of Santa Ana River

- When: March 30, 2019 6:30 AM – 10:30 AM
- Where: Santa Ana River mouth, Huntington State Beach corner of Magnolia and PCH. The main entrance may be closed for construction. If so, go south to Brookhurst and PCH.
- Where to meet: Southern parking lot, Huntington State Beach, (GPS: 33.632528, -117.960592) past the restrooms
- Rigs: 6-8 wt rod; floating line with sink tip or sinking lines; salt flies to imitate baitfish (e.g. clousers) and crabs. Waders suggested, stripping basket mandatory, CA license required. Sea water temperature is about 65F. Air temp should be mid 50s at sunrise and warming to mid 60s
- Transportation: cars can be parked within a few hundred yards of the river jetty. Drive south to the fence. Parking is \$15.
- Respond by: March 28, 5pm to larry.behm@cox.net; 949-235-4466
- Note: bring suntan lotion, sunglasses, hats, snacks and water

Lower Owens River

March 29-31, 2019

This is a mix & match trip on a “local” water. Come when you can- a portion or all of it.

We will meet together three times each day, with a focus on mentoring and buddy fishing. There will be three meetings each day; Friday, Saturday, and Sunday. Attend any that you want. Meeting 1 will be 8:00am at the River each day. We will partner up to match experienced with less experienced anglers.

Meeting 2 will be 12 Noon to eat lunch and mix partners.

Meeting 3 dinner in Bishop. Details to follow.

The Lower Owens is near Bishop, CA. In late March, the weather should be sunny 65-70 F during the day, with occasional freezes at night – perfect fishing weather.

We will have a mix of anglers and will try to match up some of new members with the more experienced “old hands.” It should be a good time for everyone to fish and learn together. Everyone will need to arrange their own accommodations. We are working on dinner plans and will update as they become confirmed. We encourage ride sharing to minimize our carbon impact.

No limit on number of people; we have 6 signed up so far. The costs will only be your transport costs to Bishop, your meals, and your hotel.

Golden Trout at Cottonwood Lakes

July, 2019

The first time I stood on a high bank looking into the lake and saw hundreds of black lines slithering and snaking around each other, I was surprised and a bit wary. It was pure amazement and awe as my eyes adjusted to the scene, and the bodies of Golden Trout with that black dorsal line came into focus. Their golden skin blended so beautifully with the background soil that I understood how they have survived for so long with so many birds of prey hunting them. The Cottonwood Lakes are full of these gorgeous fish. Stock from these lakes are used for restoring other watersheds in the Sierra. They are thought to be the purest Goldens.

Fishing the Cottonwood area is not about catching the biggest fish; 12-14" will be a big one. It is about stealth and beauty. These fish are wary of predators, and you will have to use all of your skills to catch one. When you do, they are unique and a sight to behold!

This trip is a backpacking trip. With the snow pack this year, I'm guessing ice out will be mid to late June. So, the fish will be hungry and the air warming. I want to accommodate as many people as possible, so please contact me with your preference on timing. A long weekend would probably fit the most schedules.

We will park at the Horseshoe Meadows trailhead and hike in about 4 miles to the Cottonwood Lakes area. With the altitude and terrain, it should take about 3 hours of hiking to reach a suitable basecamp site. You will have to camp overnight in bear country. We will set camp and then hike to different lakes or streams for fishing opportunities.

Timing for the trip will depend on everyone's preference. We will need a wilderness permit, so I need a head count by June 1 to allow time for permitting.

Colter's Hell or Yellowstone Park

September 15-20, 2019

Mid-September in Yellowstone National Park (YNP) is my favorite time. The animals are getting ready for winter, the days are warm, and the nights are crisp. Snow occasionally decorates your morning view. This trip will target the Lamar Valley and Meadows area. This is the high, eastern side of YNP, the last area to ice-out. I always encounter plenty of bison, deer, and moose; occasional wolf and bear; and lots of fish in this area.

Most of the waters in YNP have been rehabilitated to carry only native fish: the Yellowstone Cutthroat and some Rainbows. The fish have a short "growing" season, so they test anything that looks like food. The bugs are big, and hatches can be heavy, making dry flies the most common choice. Some of the water I would like to visit include, Slough Creek, Soda Butte Creek, Cache Creek, Lamar River, and of course the Yellowstone River.

This trip will require camping and walking. The lodges in YNP are booked out a year ahead of time. Lodging outside the perimeter of the park is more available but makes for a much longer drive to fishing water. My plan is to find a campsite near fishing water and use it as a base. Each day we will drive to a new stream, hike upstream, explore the fishing opportunities and return to base for dinner.

My initial plan is not to use guides or horses. However, I'm very willing to adjust to the group's interests. The base costs are limited to your transportation and meals. If everyone wants to add guides or horses, I will let you know the prices.

I need a head count by August 1. I will need to know by June if you want guides or horses.

This year, we are planning for fishing on the weekdays when all the kids have returned to school and we won't have to compete with the local weekend fishers. Plan to arrive on Sunday, March 31. If you arrive early enough, you may have the opportunity to wade fish the lower quality water. The general plan is to fish Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. These are the days that you should consider arranging guides. I strongly recommend you get a guide for at least two days to thoroughly enjoy all the fishing the San Juan Quality Water has to offer. Loa I met Mike James of the Quiet Fly Fisher in 2007 through the Internet and he opened up my love affair with one of the best-kept secrets in my fly-fishing world. There are streams and lake and many more places to fish than we have time to fish in one trip, every year mike shows me some new water and I marvel at the numbers of great places to fish. For the past six years our club has been fishing the Southern Utah area as a group limited to six fishermen or women staying in the Mill Cabins in Lyman Utah or near by towns and fishing with Mike James in Loa as our head guide. The prices were negotiated as a group and for the duration of the advertised dates. Deposits are sent to me and I forward them on to the guides. I do recommend both guide locations but have spent more time with Mike James only because I met him years before I met Emmett.

Loa Utah Trip 5 days September 16-20 Cost \$1000 a \$200 non-refundable deposit is required to hold your spot.

Circleville Anglers 4 days September 23-26 Cost \$780 a \$200 non-refundable deposit is required to hold your spot.

Preparation for Fishing Southern Utah

Where We Are Going:

Loa Utah Home to the **Quiet Fly Fisher** and is located in a beautiful valley at 7064" elevation, which hosts a few small towns like Loa, Lyman, Bicknell and Torrey. This is farming and livestock country and is surrounded by mountain ranges of which we will be fishing. There are National Parks near by that offer spectacular scenery, Bryce Canyon to the South West and Capitol Reef to the East, Fish Lake National Forest to the North West along with Boulder Mountain with an elevation of 11,317 which provides many fishing locations, and spectacular views.

Circleville Utah is home to **Circleville Anglers** and is located at 6600' elevation and in farming/ cattle country in a valley and home to the Sevier River and tributaries along with many lakes and streams in the near by mountains. Its location is closer to Bryce Canyon and north of Panquitch.

Guide Contact Information:

Our head guide in **Loa, Utah** is **Mike James** owner of the **Quiet Fly Fisher** their address is 200 N. Main Street Loa, Utah 84747 Contact Phone Number is 435-616-2319.

Our head guide in Circleville in **Emmett Doane** owner **Circle Valley Anglers** their address is 350 S. Hwy 89 Circleville, Utah 84723 Contact Phone number is 435-577-2168.

Weather & Clothing:

We will be lodging at approx. 7,000' elevation. Nights are cold and days are warm usually, I have experienced rain, snow, hail, and hot and cold days. Bring clothing you can put on in layers that wick moisture, nothing more uncomfortable than moisture under your clothing, which either keeps you hot and sweaty or cold and sweaty. Bring a lightweight rain jacket. Most days you will be wearing your waders but on hot day I wet wade with light shirt nylon pants and my wading boots on, don't forget the neoprene booties if wet wading. Be flexible, bring both cold and warm weather gear and adjust as needed. Weather at high altitude can change rapidly be prepared. The weather will not stop your guide from fishing unless it is dangerous and or access is limited. They will advise if there is a problem. Mother nature sets the parameters we must always be aware of our surroundings and climate.

Lodging:

There are many options in the region of Loa, Utah both in town and adjoining hamlets like Lyman and Bicknell. I would suggest The Mill Cabins 1500 S. HWY 24 Lyman, Utah as a wonderful place with individual cabins that can sleep two and are very reasonably priced. In Loa the Snuggle Inn is pricy but luxurious by small town standards. In Bicknell the Sunglow Motel and Restaurant is comfortable and reasonably priced. In Circleville, Utah the picking are fewer. Circle Valley Anglers has a house with sleeping for three and a full kitchen and living area. The other option is across the street the Butch Cassidy Inn and Motel. They have comfortable rooms and a café and are reasonably priced that sleep two. Lodging in these areas can be limited so make your lodging reservation early; I do not take responsibility for making anyone's lodging reservations due to last minute cancelations and family emergencies.

Physical Demands:

Where we are lodging at 7,000' elevation we can be fishing and hiking at as high as 11,000'. If you have problems at altitude let the guide and streamkeeper know in advance of our trip. Most fishing locations involve some hiking and wading. I would suggest arriving a couple of days early to acclimate to 7,000' not hiking hard and drinking plenty of water, it easy to dehydrate in higher elevations, the guide has water and soft drinks along in their vehicles so ask for the water.

Gear:

Rods & Lines, the entire trip can be done with a 9-foot 5-weight rod and a floating line. I bring along for fun an 11' switch rod 5 wt. and a 6'6" 5 wt. rod as well but by no means buy additional rods just for this trip; one rod is all you need.

Waders, good pair of breathable waders is required in most situations.

Boots, wading boots are part of the package. No restrictions on felt as yet.

Wading Staff, Many of us find having a wading staff necessary for stability in slippery or rocky situations, or just find a long stick, don't fall, the rocks are hard.

Terminal Tackle, I use a 9 foot 5x leader and have along 3,4,5,6x tippet. I as well bring an assortment of lead free shot to use as needed if nymphing.

Flies, We will be fishing many lakes and a few streams and possibly a couple of rivers. I carry dries, nymphs and streamers but the guide will provide you with flies. If the guide suggests a fly or gives you a fly use it with the full understanding you will catch fish, they are quite experienced on these waters. If you are like me I bring many more flies than I will ever use. I have hoppers, caddis, mayflies, and damselflies in adult and nymph stages. I find a callibaetis mayfly nymph very useful in the lakes. Bring what you own and the fly shop offers all the working patterns you will be using if you want to purchase some.

First Aid Kit: I carry a basic first aid kit in my tote bag for simple emergencies, minor cuts and abrasions, headaches and back pain.

Transportation:

From Southern California near the Ontario airport it is a 9 1/2-hour drive including gas stops and a lunch stop to Loa, Utah. To Circleville it is 8 1/2 – 9 hour drive including stops. Sharing a ride is more fun to get to know your friend or partner better and listen to each other experiences along the way. When in Loa the guides provide the transportation to and from the days fishing locations. When in Circleville you provide your own transportation to and from the fishing locations following the guide. Salt Lake City is approximately 3 hours away from Loa and 3 3/4 hours from Circleville and is serviced by many airlines and rental car companies.

Float Tubing:

There will be opportunities to float tube in the area if you so desire. The Quiet Fly Fisher in Loa can provide you with a float tube if they are guiding you. If you wish the comfort of your own float tube please feel free to bring yours.

Food:

In Utah many of their dinning locations close on Sunday, it is best to call ahead or ask you guide where and what is open, most areas have a couple options on Sunday but it is best to inquire. Guides provide lunch during the days guiding. Many of us BBQ at the Mill Cabins for dinner, to curb the costs of eating out every meal, the grocery in the town of Loa is open Mon.- Sat. Breakfast is your choice of eating at a local restaurant or at your lodging, the guide provides lunch the days you are fishing.

Libations:

You are responsible for any liquor you wish to purchase either bought from the local Liquor store in Bicknell or for beer (3.2) in some of the gas stations, or bring from home. BYOB.

Costs and Payment:

Both of the guides require a Non-refundable \$200 deposit to secure your reservation and the final payment is due upon completion of your final day.

Tipping:

It is customary to tip the guide daily; I tip \$50 per day of guiding at the end of the day. Tipping is not based on your ability or the number of fish caught, but for good service and the ability of the guide to lead you doing everything in their ability to make the experience enjoyable. Fish are a bonus. I have negotiated quite reasonable rates for the group of six and feel a percentage tip is quite unfair to the guide considering the extreme road conditions, locations and wear and tear on their vehicles. These extreme road conditions keep most of your competition for fish away.

Fishing License:

Utah state fishing license can be obtained on line prior to your trip, which is the easiest. Licenses can be purchased in Loa at the local market Monday through Saturday, closed Sunday. Yearly licenses last from the date you purchase them for a complete calendar year. In Circleville Utah you can purchase your license from the fly shop.

Emergency Services:

Bicknell near Loa has a clinic available for minor emergencies.

Panquitch is the closet emergency services to Circleville.

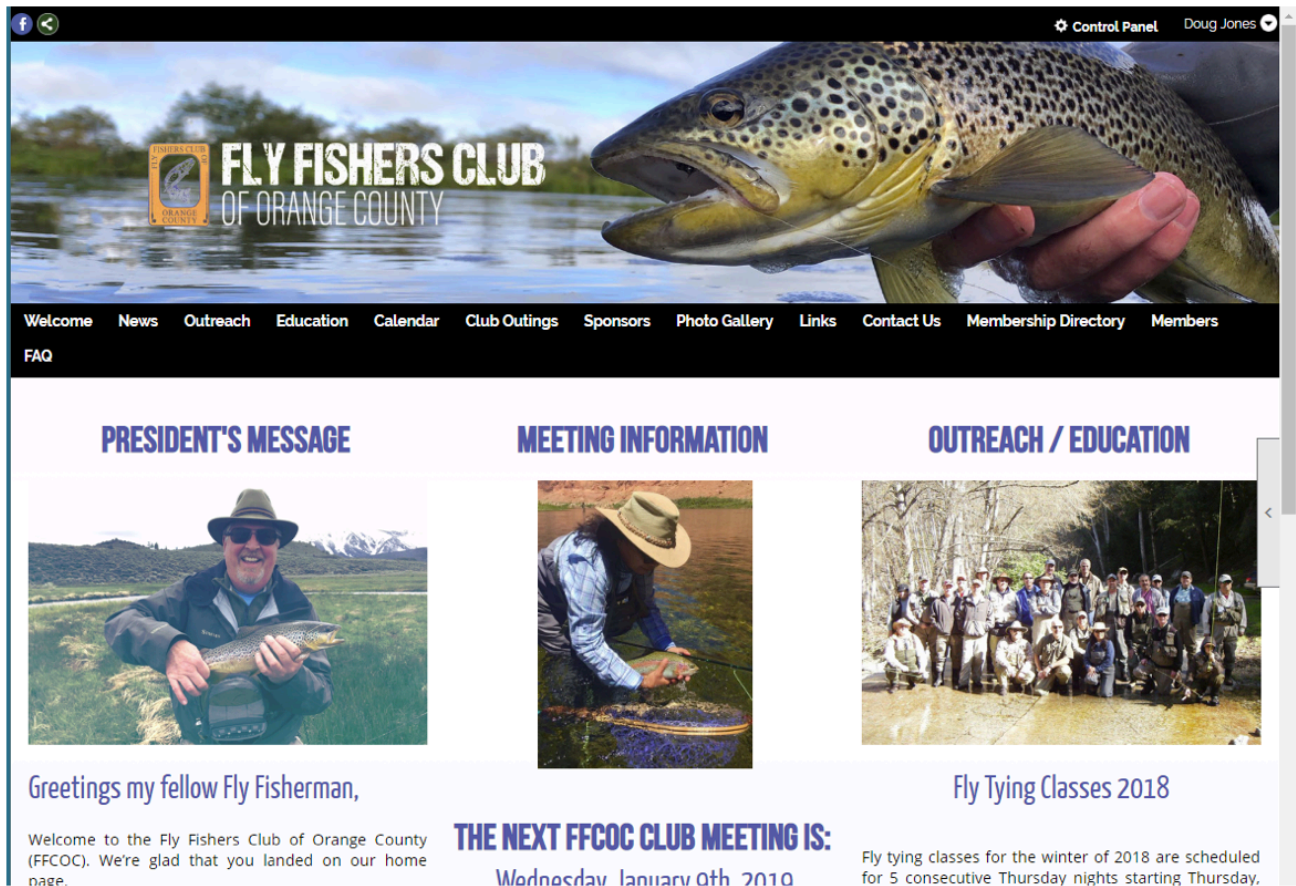

Need New from
John

Flies That Keep On Giving

By John Williams

South Central Utah bugs were hitting the water surface and swim in a long log covered stream and the fish had a great time feeding on the little guys. When they hit the water they are appearing black iridescent with a shellback and long legs.

Say hello to the **Water Boatman**



Hook: Daiichi 1160 size 16
Bead: 3/32" Black Tungsten
Thread: UTC 70 Black
Shellback: Flash Back Olive Brown cut to 1/8"
Dubbing: Ice Dub Black
Legs: Floss-Flex Black
Head Cement: Super Glue Gel

Slide the bead on the hook small hole first up to the eye and secure your hook in the vice. Run your thread from the bead to the bend of the hook and tie in the Flash Back material and leave to the rear for now. Dub the abdomen with the ice dub forward to the 2/3 forward position creating a football abdomen. Pull the flash back material over the football and secure with several wraps of thread. Tie in the legs so the sweep outwards as shown in the picture. Dub behind the bead and cement your thread wraps, cut thread and go fishing. This is an easy tie and effective fly.
