Colter's Hell or Yellowstone Park

September 15-20, 2019

Larry Behm, Streamkeeper

Mid-September in Yellowstone National Park (YNP) is my favorite time. The animals are getting ready for winter, the days are warm, and the nights are crisp. Snow occasionally decorates your morning view. This trip will target the Lamar Valley and Meadows area. This is the high, eastern side of YNP, the last area to ice-out. I always encounter plenty of bison, deer, and moose; occasional wolf and bear; and lots of fish in this area.

Most of the waters in YNP have been rehabilitated to carry only native fish: the Yellowstone Cutthroat and some Rainbows. The fish have a short "growing" season, so they test anything that looks like food. The bugs are big, and hatches can be heavy, making dry flies the most common choice. Some of the water I would like to visit include, Slough Creek, Soda Butte Creek, Cache Creek, Lamar River, and of course the Yellowstone River.

This trip will require camping and walking. The lodges in YNP are booked out a year ahead of time. Lodging outside the perimeter of the park is more available but makes for a much longer drive to fishing water. My plan is to find a campsite near fishing water and use it as a base. Each day we will drive to a new stream, hike upstream, explore the fishing opportunities and return to base for dinner.

My initial plan is not to use guides or horses. However, I'm very willing to adjust to the group's interests. The base costs are limited to your transportation and meals. If everyone wants to add guides or horses, I will let you know the prices.



LOa I met Mike James of the Quiet Fly Fisher in 2007 through the Internet and he opened up my love affair with one of the best-kept secrets in my fly-fishing world. There are streams and lake and many more places to fish than we have time to fish in one trip, every year mike shows me some new water and I marvel at the numbers of great places to fish. For the past six years our club has been fishing the Southern Utah area as a group limited to six fishermen or women staying in the Mill Cabins in Lyman Utah or near by towns and fishing with Mike James in Loa as our head guide. Mike employs several other guides, which are well versed in the area.

Circleville Emmett Doane is the owner of Circleville Anglers located in Circleville Utah a place you might drive by and not know where the fishing was wonderful but they know and are happy to share the experience with you. The opportunity to fish the Severe River, Streams and Lakes is another location I fish when in the area with Emmett.

These guide services are quite professional and friendly, I wouldn't use them unless they were, and several of our club members have used both of the guides both with the club and solo and can give you recommendations. If you have questions please feel free to call my cell phone 951-236-0862 and I should be able to answer any of your questions and if not the guide numbers are listed below.

Stream Keeper: John Williams contact me if you have interest, my cell 951-236-0862 You must be a club member with a signed liability release signed prior to any of our club trips. The prices were negotiated as a group and for the duration of the advertised dates. Deposits are sent to me and I forward them on to the guides. I do recommend both guide locations but have spent more time with Mike James only because I met him years before I met Emmett.

Loa Utah Trip 5 days September 16-20 Cost \$1000 a \$200 non-refundable deposit is required to hold your spot.

Circleville Anglers 4 days September 23-26 Cost \$780 a \$200 non-refundable deposit is required to hold your spot.

Preparation for Fishing Southern Utah

By John Williams

Where We Are Going:

Loa Utah Home to the **Quiet Fly Fisher** and is located in a beautiful valley at 7064" elevation, which hosts a few small towns like Loa, Lyman, Bicknell and Torrey. This is farming and livestock country and is surrounded by mountain ranges of which we will be fishing. There are National Parks near by that offer spectacular scenery, Bryce Canyon to the South West and Capitol Reef to the East, Fish Lake National Forest to the North West along with Boulder Mountain with an elevation of 11,317 which provides many fishing locations, and spectacular views.

Circleville Utah is home to **Circleville Anglers** and is located at 6600' elevation and in farming/cattle country in a valley and home to the Sevier River and tributaries along with many lakes and streams in the near by mountains. Its location is closer to Bryce Canyon and north of Panquitch.

Guide Contact Information:

Our head guide in **Loa**, **Utah is Mike James** owner of the **Quiet Fly Fisher** their address is 200 N. Main Street Loa, Utah 84747 Contact Phone Number is 435-616-2319.

Our head guide in Circleville in **Emmett Doane** owner **Circle Valley Anglers** their address is 350 S. Hwy 89 Circleville, Utah 84723 Contact Phone number is 435-577-2168.

Weather & Clothing:

We will be lodging at approx. 7,000' elevation. Nights are cold and days are warm usually, I have experienced rain, snow, hail, and hot and cold days. Bring clothing you can put on in layers that wick moisture, nothing more uncomfortable than moisture under your clothing, which either keeps you hot and sweaty or cold and sweaty. Bring a lightweight rain jacket. Most days you will be wearing your waders but on hot day I wet wade with light shirt nylon pants and my wading boots on, don't forget the neoprene booties if wet wading. Be flexible, bring both cold and warm weather gear and adjust as needed. Weather at high altitude can change rapidly be prepared. The weather will not stop your guide from fishing unless it is dangerous and or access is limited. They will advise if there is a problem. Mother nature sets the parameters we must always be aware of our surroundings and climate.

Lodging:

There are many options in the region of Loa, Utah both in town and adjoining hamlets like Lyman and Bicknell. I would suggest The Mill Cabins 1500 S. HWY 24 Lyman, Utah as a wonderful place with individual cabins that can sleep two and are very reasonably priced. In Loa the Snuggle Inn is pricy but luxurious by small town standards. In Bicknell the Sunglow Motel and Restaurant is comfortable and reasonably priced. In Circleville, Utah the picking are fewer. Circle Valley Anglers has a house with sleeping for three and a full kitchen and living area. The other option is across the street the Butch Cassidy Inn and Motel. They have comfortable rooms and a café and are reasonably priced that sleep two. Lodging in these areas can be limited so make your lodging reservation early; I do not take responsibility for making anyone's lodging reservations due to last minute cancelations and family emergencies.

Physical Demands:

Where we are lodging at 7,000' elevation we can be fishing and hiking at as high as 11,000'. If you have problems at altitude let the guide and streamkeeper know in advance of our trip. Most fishing locations involve some hiking and wading. I would suggest arriving a couple of days early to acclimate to 7,000' not hiking hard and drinking plenty of water, it easy to dehydrate in higher elevations, the guide has water and soft drinks along in their vehicles so ask for the water.

Gear:

Rods & Lines, the entire trip can be done with a 9-foot 5-weight rod and a floating line. I bring along for fun an 11' switch rod 5 wt. and a 6'6" 5 wt. rod as well but by no means buy additional rods just for this trip; one rod is all you need.

Waders, good pair of breathable waders is required in most situations.

Boots, wading boots are part of the package. No restrictions on felt as yet.

Wading Staff, Many of us find having a wading staff necessary for stability in slippery or rocky situations, or just find a long stick, don't fall, the rocks are hard.

Terminal Tackle, I use a 9 foot 5x leader and have along 3,4,5,6x tippet. I as well bring an assortment of lead free shot to use as needed if nymphing.

Flies, We will be fishing many lakes and a few streams and possibly a couple of rivers. I carry dries, nymphs and streamers but the guide will provide you with flies. If the guide suggests a fly or gives you a fly use it with the full understanding you will catch fish, they are quite experienced on these waters. If you are like me I bring many more flies than I will ever use. I have hoppers, caddis, mayflies, and damselflies in adult and nymph stages. I find a callibaetis mayfly nymph very useful in the lakes. Bring what you own and the fly shop offers all the working patterns you will be using if you want to purchase some.

First Aid Kit: I carry a basic first aid kit in my tote bag for simple emergencies, minor cuts and abrasions, headaches and back pain.

Transportation:

From Southern California near the Ontario airport it is a 91/2-hour drive including gas stops and a lunch stop to Loa, Utah. To Circleville it is 81/2 – 9 hour drive including stops. Sharing a ride is more fun to get to know you friend or partner better and listen to each other experiences along the way. When in Loa the guides provide the transportation to and from the days fishing locations. When in Circleville you provide your own transportation to and from the fishing locations following the guide. Salt Lake City is approximately 3 hours away from Loa and 33/4 hours from Circleville and is serviced by many airlines and rental car companies.

Float Tubing:

There will be opportunities to float tube in the area if you so desire. The Quiet Fly Fisher in Loa can provide you with a float tube if they are guiding you. If you wish the comfort of your own float tube please feel free to bring yours.

Food:

In Utah many of their dinning locations close on Sunday, it is best to call ahead or ask you guide where and what is open, most areas have a couple options on Sunday but it is best to inquire. Guides provide lunch during the days guiding. Many of us BBQ at the Mill Cabins for dinner, to curb the costs of eating out every meal, the grocery in the town of Loa is open Mon.- Sat. Breakfast is your choice of eating at a local restaurant or at your lodging, the guide provides lunch the days you are fishing.

Libations:

You are responsible for any liquor you wish to purchase either bought from the local Liquor store in Bicknell or for beer (3.2) in some of the gas stations, or bring from home. BYOB.

Costs and Payment:

Both of the guides require a Non-refundable \$200 deposit to secure your reservation and the final payment is due upon completion of your final day.

Tipping:

It is customary to tip the guide daily; I tip \$50 per day of guiding at the end of the day. Tipping is not based on your ability or the number of fish caught, but for good service and the ability of the guide to lead you doing everything in their ability to make the experience enjoyable. Fish are a bonus. I have negotiated quite reasonable rates for the group of six and feel a percentage tip is quite unfair to the guide considering the extreme road conditions, locations and wear and tear on their vehicles. These extreme road conditions keep most of your competition for fish away.

Fishing License:

Utah state fishing license can be obtained on line prior to your trip, which is the easiest. Licenses can be purchased in Loa at the local market Monday through Saturday, closed Sunday. Yearly licenses last from the date you purchase them for a complete calendar year. In Circleville Utah you can purchase your license from the fly shop.

Emergency Services:

Bicknell near Loa has a clinic available for minor emergencies.

Panquitch is the closet emergency services to Circleville.

Bridgeport

September 29 - October 3

We are putting together a club trip to the Bridgeport area. These are our preliminary plans. As we firm up details we will provide updated plans in future Club Newsletters or through email. The trip will be from Sunday, September 29th, fishing Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, and returning home on Thursday, October 3rd.

The trip will be one that allows "free planning" on where you want to fish and whether you want to hire a guide or fish on your own. There are numerous great fishing opportunities in that area, including stream fishing the East Walker, West Walker and Robinson Creek. Also, fishing by boat, float tube or from the shore on Bridgeport Reservoir, Upper or Lower Twin Lakes or float tubing on the Virginia Lakes.

We will provide you with a list of guides in the area and contact information for boat rentals. You will need to make your own reservations ahead of the start of the trip.

We are researching lodging options and will let you know where we would like to stay as a group. Once we do this and have names of participants we will reserve the rooms for the group. We are also researching restaurants and will provide these details when available.

We believe the Bridgeport area offers wonderful and varied fishing opportunities for the club and hope you will join us in the inaugural trip, which we plan to limit to a lucky dozen. 

Participants can fly into Denver on Sunday October 6 and rent a car for the drive to Kremmling and then back to Monument for the second half of our trip. In Kremmling we will be staying at the Allington and participants need to make their own reservations there. While in Kremmling we will be doing a float trip on the Colorado River one day, and we will be wading the Williams Fork River on the alternate day. Pyramid Lake Outing

November 21,22,&23 2019

In what has become an annual event, this year's Pyramid Lake outing will be November 21,22,&23rd. We will be fishing a new location on the lake where the crowds are expected to be lighter. The location is further up the lake at Monument Rock. We will still be fishing from ladders.



If you have never done this trip before you are missing out on a chance to catch what may be the biggest trout of you life. The lake's native Lahontan Cutthroats average 3-5 pounds, with many fish pushing 10 pounds or more. In the past a fish 10 pounds or bigger was considered a trophy. Now thanks to the introduction of the longer living Pilot Peak strain that is much longer living fish over 20 pounds are being caught! If you are new to fly fishing the techniques are simple and easy to learn. We normally fish from ladders placed in the water at the proper distance from shore. There usually is nothing around you, but water. There is nothing to interfere with a back cast and nothing on the bottom to snag. You do not need to be a long distance caster as fish are sometimes hooked right at your feet.

Equipment that is appropriate for both kinds of fishing is usually two rods. A 6-7 weight rod with floating line for indicator fishing and a 8-9 weight rod for streamer fishing (a Rio DC 24ft. 250 gr. line is perfect). I will provide a more extensive list of what to bring that includes equipment, lines, flies, leaders, tippet and clothing in an upcoming e-mail.

Daytime temperature will likely be around 50 degrees F. This is a very variable temperature as we have experienced 30-75 degree temperatures in past years.

You make your own travel arrangements to Reno, fly or drive. It is best to arrive by Wednesday as we start fishing EARLY on Thursday. Please let me know that you have arrived safely, Jim Wright (714-679-6638). Rob will be providing breakfast and lunch on Thursday and Friday, breakfast on Saturday, as well as step ladders to fish from. Cost of the trip is \$275 per person for 3 days of fishing. I will e-mail a list of all attendees so you can communicate as to carpools, car rentals and lodging. E-mail me (jrwright1@earthlink.net) with any questions or to sign up. I will also have a sign-up sheet at the Meetings in December, January, and February.



"The Peter Koga Award"

For Outstanding Contributions to the Fly Fishing Club of Orange County by a current club member.



As many of our members know, Peter Koga was a major force in the success and prosperity of our club during his active years as a member. Peter passed away recently, but his memory and contributions to our club are not forgotten. With the encouragement of members and friends of Peter, the board has created an award, starting in 2020, to recognize outstanding efforts that a current member makes to contribute to our club's success.

Peter Koga Biography:

Peter was a true ambassador to the Club and to sports fishing. A certified Federation of Fly Fisher caster, he was an expert in both saltwater and freshwater. He was a pioneer in introducing Spey casting to Southern California and his fly tying skills and speaking engagements were well received nationwide. He performed his tying skills as an invited guest at Fly Fishing Shows throughout the Pacific Southwest, Colorado and New Jersey.

Peter served the Club as a Board Member at Large in the 80's and as its President in 1993. Through Peter's leadership, he was instrumental in the development and implementation of the Club's current 501c(3) Non Profit status. He helped implement the Club's Trout in the Classroom Program which has reached thousands of students as part of the County of Orange Outdoor Education Curriculum. Peter was a key member of the committee that worked with Bill Blackstone to create and fund The Bill Blackstone Foundation and was instrumental in developing the relationship with Humboldt State to create a scholarship opportunity for future students. Many will also remember Peter's involvement and attendance at various outings and activities for the club.

The Peter Koga Award:

This award will be given periodically to an individual club member that demonstrates a level of commitment and contribution to our club, reminiscent of Peter, maybe over years and in different ways.

Criteria for selection include:

A record of leading activity in multiple club projects

Notable supporter and advocate of the club and the sport of fly fishing

Demonstrated willingness to aid and get involved when needed


Peter Koga Award Continued:



Fly Tying

Flies That Keep On Giving

By John Williams

Fish trigger on movement, noise and familiar objects. This fly is designed to leave a wake and with the skill of the angler trigger a strike. This is not my pattern but part of a series of flies headed to Labrador in search of large Brookies, Pike and land locked Salmon.

The Skater



Hook: Tiemco 8089 #4
Thread: UTC 140 Red

Tail & Wing: Deer Hair, color of your choice

Thorax & Head: 2mm Craft Foam color od your choice

Thorax under dubbing: Ice Dub color of your choice

Cement: Super Glue Gel

Start by smashing down the barb, I bend the shank slightly to give the fly better hooking and staying power by pointing the point of the hook toward the eye. Place the hook in the vice with the shank level and smear a light coat of super glue on the entire shank. Start your thread at the eye and wrap to the bend of the hook. Cut a clump of deer hair, clean and stack it and tie in at the bend letting it extend one half the length of the shank to the rear. I do not cut the butts off square but leave them random to create a taper toward the front as I wrap thread forward to the 2/3 forward position. Cut a piece of craft foam to ½" wide the color of your choice. Tie it in at the ¾ forward location and leave to the rear. Dub a ball just in front of the foam tie in point with Ice Dub.

Cut a clump of deer hair clean and stack, place a small amount of super glue just in front of the ball and tie in the clump of deer hair tied in on top of the shank. Dub another ball of Ice Dub just in front of the deer hair. Separate the deer hair down the center and pull to either side of the shank to form the wings. Pull the foam over and tie down just behind the eye with a few wraps of thread. Fold the foam back to form a head and secure with a few more wraps of thread. Smear super glue on the thread and make several wraps and whip finish to complete the fly. Cut your thread free. The super glue base and use along the tying process ensures a durable fly with such large toothy fish.

Results are yet to be determined, one who has used it and has recommended this fly. Tight Line All,
