President's Message

President's Message by Terry Roznos



Vegas Baby! I write this month's message from the road again. Janna and I have just completed our October fishing outing; up Highway 395 to Reno (fishing along the way), due East to Dutch John, UT, to fish the Green River in Flaming Gorge, then a short trip to the Heber Valley (UT) to fish the Provo and Weber Rivers, then on to home with an overnight stop in Las Vegas (photo).

While out on the road, and thanks to remote meeting capabilities (Zoom), your 2022 Venue Selection Team and Board of Directors, with great dedication and diligence, have selected our General Meeting Venue for 2022.



Our last meeting at the Phoenix Club will be on December 8, as they will be moving to a new location in Brea. Beginning <u>January 12, 2022</u>, our monthly Club General Meeting will be hosted by the <u>Los Caballeros</u> <u>Sports Village</u> in Fountain Valley (approximately a half-mile east of Mile Square Park). Los Cab is located at 17272 Newhope St. in Fountain Valley. We will be meeting in the Terrace Room.

The Venue Selection Team (Terry Roznos, Larry Behm, Gill Realon, Tom Sakai, and Brian Mayer) evaluated more than 25 venue candidates to host our meetings. Early in the venue selection process, it was clear from the bids received, that the costs of our standard dinner meeting format were going to be higher than what we have been paying at the Phoenix Club and we had to rethink the evening layout and expectations. A change in meeting format was then considered, the Happy Hour format; later start (7 pm), snacks/appetizers, cash bar, followed by our guest speaker presentation at 8 pm. Revised bids from our candidate venues were solicited. Los Cab was the clear standout of the bids received.

President's Message (Con't)

With the new format and costs, we also had to rethink how we paid for this. To encourage participation at our General Meetings, a low meeting fee of \$10 per adult member or visitor is planned! Historically, pre-Covid meetings, the combination of meeting fee and annual dues generally paid the cost of the Phoenix Club venue, dinner, and speaker fee. After thoughtful financial analysis, an annual dues increase to \$60 for 2022 membership, in combination with the \$10 meeting fee, will result in a similar (pre-Covid) budgeted breakeven cost for presenting our monthly General Meetings at the Los Caballeros Sports Village.

The Board of Directors has now formally approved the 2022 Venue (Los Cab), a Happy Hour meeting format (no dinner, but with Cash Bar and snacks/appetizers), a \$10 Meeting Fee, and \$60 Annual Dues (effective 10/29). Those who have already renewed their 2022 membership at \$45; good for you, retroactive payment will not be required (except for Board Member renewals). I applaud the Venue Selection Team and the Board for their diligence and dedication in working the plan for our new meeting venue for 2022. Now it's time to execute the plan! We believe this is a good plan; it's sound financially, it encourages attendance at our monthly meetings, and it continues to provides value for your \$\$\$. Change can be unsettling, but as always, we encourage member comments, questions, and concerns as this is your Club! We, the Board, work for you!!

Lastly, as if a Venue and fee structure change isn't enough, and in light of the continually evolving Covid environment, the Club Policy for Covid Guidance is presented here in your newsletter, with link on our website. The Club Policy is fully compliant with the latest Orange County Health Officer's Orders (issued 10/12/2021).

Now, go out there and fish and share your stories with your fellow members in the newsletter (Fish Tales) or at a meeting!!! See you there!

FISHING THE LEGENDARY HENRY'S FORK IDAHO

with

KARLIE ROLAND

The *Henry's Fork* of the Snake River in Idaho is rightly known as one of America's Blue Ribbon trout fisheries. Located in Southeastern Idaho, it is about 127 miles long and is also known as the North Fork of the Snake River. Jim Klug of Yellow Dog Adventures describes it well. "People go to Henry's Fork because of its hallowed waters. It's legendary – known as a technical river with big fish, and famous for its hatches. If you're a trout fisherman, you need to make the pilgrimage to the Henry's Fork.

Our November presenter Karlie Roland is one of the most requested guides on this famous stretch of water. She will guide us through the seasons and hatches of a river that has become a favorite of many destination anglers in Southern California. Often touted as "technical" water, Karlie will unlock the secrets she has learned in her many years of guiding. For the dry fly fisherman, the river offers outstanding hatches through gentle

flowing ranch land, timber covered canyons and spring creek like sections, with tributaries that are spectacular fisheries in their own right.

Karlie grew up with a fly rod in one hand and a camera in the other. She spent her summers in Last Chance, Idaho, where her family has fished the Henry's Fork for multiple generations. Over the years, Karlie has traveled from the Rockies to the Pacific Northwest to Patagonia as part of her ongoing search for trout, salmon and steelhead. A tireless advocate for fisheries conservation and watershed protection, a passionate angler and educator, and a guide with extensive experience leading fly- fishing schools and hosted travel, she now works for TroutHunter on the river that started it all - the Henry's Fork.

2021-2022 Fly Fisher Club of Orange County Marine Studies Scholarship Awardee

We are proud to announce the winner of our 2021-2022 Fly Fisher Club of Orange County Marine Studies Scholarship is being awarded to Shannon Tarby of CSULB. To view Shanon's application for our scholarship, <u>click here</u>

Here is a brief bio for Shannon. She is currently a student at CSU Long Beach with a major in Biological Sciences. Here is one of her answers to our scholarship questions:

Growing up I was always passionate about the environment and when I arrived at the University of California Riverside (UCR), I chose to major in Environmental Science. At UCR, my introductory classes exposed me to material from physics, chemistry, and biology. My favorite classes were always in the discipline of biology and I was also interested in chemistry. I chose to study biological sciences because it has the potential to better our world. Specifically, I am studying the effects of weathered microplastics which is an important field of study due to the growing plastic pollution issue. Additionally, pursuing a M.S. in Biology would help me achieve my career goal of being a full time researcher in governmental agency laboratories. During my two years as an undergraduate research assistant I developed an interest in research and wish to continue doing work related to research well into my career.

Here is another answer from her application.

2. Briefly describe your commitment to community services in the fisheries biology field.

I have been committed to community services in the fisheries biology field since my time as an undergraduate student at University of California Riverside. During my time at UCR I became involved with volunteering at Fisheries Resource Volunteer Corps in Azusa, California. There I helped perform duties such as assessing fish populations in streams of San Bernardino National Forest and San Gabriel National Forest to monitor over-fishing, assess stream water quality monitoring through periodic turbidity, pH and total coliform of measurements, and help with community outreach education to provide information on National Forest conservation. Additionally, we would also perform periodic stream clean ups to prevent polluted areas from affecting fish populations. Since volunteering at FRVC I have been dedicated to research about toxicology and how it effects fisheries. My thesis focuses on how secondary microplastics with a sorbate can effect larval zebrafish health, growth, and behavior. This research will have profound impacts on our understanding of the threats that microplastics can pose on fisheries. Microplastics have become increasingly abundant in waterways across the country and they have also come into constant contact with many different species of fish. To further continue my commitment to community services in the fisheries biology field I am organizing a monthly beach clean-up in the downtown Long Beach area. The goal of that project is to help create cleaner beaches and to prevent re-entry of trash into waterways.

Please join me in congratulating Shannon on winning our scholarship.

The 3rd annual Club outing to Bridgeport is now complete with fishing days on Sep 25, 26 and 27. The trip was designed to allow for "free planning" by each angler for each of the three fishing days; including fishing location, with hired guide service, or on your own.

Fishing was difficult this year due to the low run-off season resulting in low flows in the local streams and rivers. Bridgeport Reservoir was extremely low leaving the dock at the marina high and dry. This year's hearty anglers made some significant daily drives (and hikes) in their quest for trout. Local waters fished included: Buckeye Creek, Robinson Creek, Virginia Creek, Virginia Lake, Rush Creek, Owens River (Big Springs), Lee Vining Creek and the Tuolumne River (Lyell and Dana Forks) in Yosemite. All anglers were able to land trout in these challenging skinny water conditions; a victory!! Fishing is not always about the quantities, but in the thrill of the hunt, the beauty of the surroundings, and in the company that you're with! As always, we met as a group on our final evening for a group dinner in a local restaurant. This year we made the walk across the street to the Virginia Creek Settlement Restaurant (pictured); a true gem in the area!

Home base was the Willow Springs Motel and RV Park, approximately 5 miles south of Bridgeport. Sleeper rooms and RV sites were available for our stay. Under the order of a National Forest Service fire restriction, each evening featured a group campfire (propane fired) hosted by our Willow Springs staff; complete with s'mores and a selection of wines to cut the chill off our cool evenings. The campfire provided a great opportunity for the group to gather and discuss the day's fishing successes (or not), with plans for the next day. This year we had 3 RVs make the trip, a new record! We were told by Mike James our head guide to fish that lake again just before dark and it produced quite well using a white streamer. The week produced some nice fish and we all had a wonderful time. The group consisted of Brian Mayer, Andy Frumento, Len Scarpace and myself John Williams. The weather cooperated most of the week with very slight showers one day. Many more fish pictures were taken but all have not been shared yet so here are the highlights. Pyramid Lake: Eric Kramer

I was planning on attending the Presidents Outing in Kernville , but since it was cancelled I went to Reno where I met Sam Snyder who was up there for a Tim McGraw concert.

We fished Pyramid on Sat., he from his pontoon boat at Warrior Beach and me off the rocks at Pelican Bay. He caught 2 and I never even saw a fish. On Sunday we had booked a trip with Hans Grotewald of Sierra Drifters Guide Service. We went to the far northeast part of the lake and fished bait balls in 80 feet of water. No indicators here!! We drop shotted with 100 feet of flouro on 7 weight fly rods. jigging chui chub imitation streamers. We caught fish at various depths, depending on where the bait was. We caught 46 fish, 23 each, not one under five pounds, more Pilots than Summits. I caught a 14,12, two 11 and 2 10s. Sam caught an 11 and 10. I had a double of a 12 and a 10.. Then Sam went home and I went to Eagle Lake for the first time. My friend Bill Goodwin and I trolled flies and grubs for two days, landing 12 fish out of numerous hits, keeping only four to eat. The fish were mostly 17-18 inches with the largest being 23 and weighing 3.8 pounds. Redist meat I have ever seen in my 65 years of trout fishing, and also the best eating. Eagle has good flyfishing by boat, tube, or shore.





Flies That Keep On Giving!

By John Williams

Off color water can be quite hard to fish, give the fish every chance to see your fly. Aquatic worms are a good choice and this pattern has proved it's self. This is an easy one.

Atomic Worm



Hook: Orvis Tactical Barbless 1P13 #10 or to your liking

Bead: 2.4 mm Tungsten Black

Thread: UTC 140 Fluorescent Pink

Worm Body: Hareline Pearl Core Braid Red

Cement: Gel Super Glue

Place the bead on the hook, either big hole or small hole first it doesn't matter. Place hook and bead in vice. Just forward of the center point of the hook place a slight drop of super glue and slide the bead to the just forward point and trap with thread wraps on either side of the bead and leaving the thread to the rear of the bead.

Flies That Keep On Giving! -continued

Singe the braid end with a flame and let cool before placing the singed end to the rear approximately 2 times the length of the hook. Tie the braid down behind the bead and move your thread forward to in front of the bead. Tie down the braid in front of the bead with a few wraps of thread. Smear a little super glue on your thread and whip finish at the base of the front tie in point and cut your thread. Cut the braid to approximately 1.5 times the length of the hook and singe the end with a flame.

This is a dirty water solution to catching fish.
